MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

SELECT BOARD

Unanticipated Revenue The Board approved motions to accept unanticipated revenue per RSA 31:95-b from NH Saves in reimbursement for energy saving measures at Town Hall. These funds will reimburse the Town Hall project for work already completed; \$4,215.00 from the New Hampshire Department of Safety for the Police Department Search and Rescue Equipment grant; \$8,714.28 from the State of New Hampshire for the Assistance to Firefighters Grant; \$1,200 in private donations for the Bradford Scholarship Fund, and \$500.00 from Bar Harbor Bank and Trust and \$250 from the Kearsarge Area Chamber of Commerce in support of Bradford's Independence Day Celebration These funds will be used to offset the 2024 expenses.

Fire Pond Easements Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, reported that town council has provided draft easements for the fire pond on Old Warner Road. The exact location of the water line needs to be added, which could involve a survey. The Board opted to have Dig Safe mark it out. Karen will wait until the snow melts to move forward.

Expense Review 2023 expenses are final. Just over \$159,000 is being turned back, 5.6% of the 2023 budget.

Community Power Andrew Hatch from the Community Power Coalition walked the Select Board through the sequence of events to put Bradford Community Power in business in June 2024. The Board reviewed with Andrew the Cost Sharing Agreement and Complete Service Bundle to be signed by the Board when the Town votes to accept the energy aggregation plan (Warrant Article 6). The Board

Bradford Town Meeting 2024

It was standing room only for the 2024 Bradford Town Meeting. Veteran Bob Selig started things off by leading the Pledge of Allegiance. Beth Downs gave heartfelt thanks to Marilyn Goldberg for

her 24 years of service as Town
Treasurer.
Bradford Fire
Department and Parks and Recreation gave a public service announcement about
CPR and
AED training for all.

Residents

reacted favorably to the 4 presentations of the evening: Kathleen Bigford for Bradford Community Power, Sue McKevitt about SB2, Kris

Foss reporting on the work of the Masonic Hall Committee, and Kim Firth explaining the work of the Budget Committee.

The big question of the night, "Why did

property taxes increase so dramatically?" was addressed by Firth who made good on a promise by the Budget Committee to be more transparent about the town budget. She presented slides and graphs showing the impacts of the town (up 18.5%), school (up 8%), and state education (up 41.5%) portions on property tax bills.



Articles Seven, Nine and Fifteen



Article Seven: Shall we adopt the provisions of RSA 40:13, known as SB2 to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the Town of Bradford on the second Tuesday of March. *Failed*.

Article Nine: To see if the Town will vote to retain as Town-owned and Town-maintained the building at 89 West Main Street (Map 16 Lot 87) known as the Masonic Building. This will be a ballot vote. *Failed*.

Article Fifteen: To see if the Town will vote to adopt the provisions of RSA 31:95-c to restrict one hundred percent (100%) of revenues from Bradford Police detail assignments to expenditures for the purpose of purchasing new police vehicles. *Passed*.

Land Acknowledgement Statement – We are on the unceded land of Nd'akinna which has long served as a site of meeting for Abenaki people from Pagôntegok (Contoocook), O'quasskikonaquan (Newbury) and beyond for thousands of years. Nebizonbik (Bradford Springs) provided healing waters and people exchanged goods at the village site behind Lake Massasecum, calling this land home. The town of Bradford honors, recognizes, and respects these Abenaki, as the traditional stewards of the lands and waters on which we gather today. In that spirit, today we will begin by acknowledging that we are guests in this land. We need to respect and help protect the lands within our use and share of the bounty with our Abenaki partners today.

Thank You, Harriet

Harriet (Harris) Douglass has worn many hats here in Bradford. She is a beloved fixture in our landscape, serving on many committees and holding many jobs. For certain, you have seen her knitting at Town Meeting, which she has attended for 75 years. This spring she is retiring from the staff of the Bradford Bridge, where she has been distribution manager for many years. Her vitality never wanes, but she feels it's time to pass her knowledge of the job on to others.

Harriet has lived here since 1945 when her family relocated from Braintree, MA during WW II. She was 16 at the time and entered Simonds School (the regional secondary school then located in Warner) for her senior year. Harriet loved the transition from a school of 200 students to the 20 in her graduating class. She would buy monthly tickets and take public transportation from Bradford (by train in the mornings and by bus on the return. Some classmates boarded in Warner during the week and paid for their lodgings by working for their hosts.) Upon graduation Harriet had to wait a year for the 18-year-old requirement to train as a nurse. After a year of training, she had to suspend her education since she had accepted a marriage proposal and married women were not allowed to enroll in nurse training.

She married Bradford native Don Douglass, who worked for the Boston and Maine Railroad. Harriet and Don had met at one of the popular dances at the Casino on Lake Massesecum, where big band music was played. They later worked at the dances held in Frank Fortune's Barn across the street from their home. These square dances were likewise very well-attended events and the couple was busy taking tickets and serving up hamburgers and hotdogs.

You may remember Harriet from her years as a postal clerk and then post mistress in Bradford, where she greeted everyone with a smile for 23 years. Before that she worked for 10 years for Dr. Anne Wasson who held a practice here in town. Harriet was finally able to resume her medical training through Dr. Anne. Harriet would often keep the practice run-

ning when the doctor was away, claiming "I liked working with people and being in charge. I think all firstborns might feel this way since they have to help out when a new baby is born." She also worked for Blue Cross/Blue Shield in Concord as a newlywed. And she was the hostess at the Pleasant View Hotel (now Rosewood Inn) in the early days.



Bradford in the 1950s and 60s held many public functions for folks to gather for some fun. One of the things Harriet wishes for Bradford is the revitalization of gathering places in town so people can connect and share good times. Bowie's Market, Dodge's Store, and the IGA used to provide this opportunity. The BACC serves seniors very well now and young families often meet new friends at the library but more multi-generational public gathering is what she wishes for in town. Perhaps, she says, the restored Town Hall will grow into this role, as well.

Harriet makes connections wherever she goes. She helps her friend Mary Derry lead a sewing group at the BACC on Tuesday mornings, where friends new and old gather to create a quilt each year to raffle off for the benefit of the Meals on Wheels program in town. Everyone is welcome to join! Harriet is famous for her knitted creations and her personal stylishness. (see photo) She has been knitting since a neighbor taught her the skill at age 11. She has made a virtual rainbow of sweaters that adorn her for

every occasion. One woman who didn't believe Harriet had made the one pictured here remarked that Harriet must be very rich to buy such a masterpiece. Harriet laughs as she recalls this and says she is rich only in the ways that matter, like feeling purposeful. "That is what we are put on this earth for... to help our neighbors."

Her wish for Bradford is that "new people will always feel welcome here." When she was a young woman awaiting news about the imminent adoption of a child, she was actually paged in the Boston train station by the telephone switchboard operator in Bradford to give her the good news. She says, "That's the kind of place Bradford has always been. You can always ask someone and get help. That's why Bradford is my town."

Harriet, who is remarkably healthy for any age, never expected to become 95. Her grandmother died at age 30 and her mother at age 50, so she figured she would be lucky to make 70. Well done, Harriet. Her secret: "I always take vitamins just in case I don't eat enough vegetables." She has also been an active ongoing participant in the Strong Living program at the Senior Center. She attributes much of her strength and mobility to this. She has a daughter Leslie, plus 4 grandchildren and 7 great grands, one of whom is engaged. Will there be a great-great grand?

If you haven't met Harriet, you may just want to seek her out. She is just one of those people who listens, who cares, who puts herself out to attend events, especially in her home town. It's a comfort to know that Harriet and other local contemporaries are still holding strong with hope for Bradford and the type of lifestyle that has always pervaded here. Harriet feels she is lucky with her health and lucky to witness the changing times. Somehow, she knows how to balance nostalgia for the past with adaptation for the future. Above all, she advises "Help each other."

Thanks for your help, Harriet, with the Bradford Bridge and all the other roles you continue to play here in town. You are a local treasure.

Bradford's 2024 operating budget shows a 4.5% increase over the 2023 budget largely due to expenses beyond Bradford's control such as employee health benefits, increased emergency dispatch expenses and others. Kim explained that during the budget process committee members worked closely with department heads to agree on expenditures that would allow Bradford to maintain the services residents have come to expect. Reducing expenditures further would mean reducing or eliminating services.

Warrant Article 3, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,937,259.00 to fund Bradford's 2024 budget was amended by \$5,479 (for a total of \$2,929,038) to fully fund the Brown Memorial Library and then passed unanimously. Warrant articles to put additional funds aside in expendable trust funds or capital reserve accounts for police, fire, highway, bridges and road repair passed quickly due to clear explanations of prudent fiscal responsibility by each department. The total 2024 overall budget, operating budget and warrant articles, is 1.63% (or \$58.128) less than 2023.

One Dedicated Recycler

Bradford resident Beth Thompson is one of our most dedicated recyclers at the Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center. She recycles a host of things a couple of times a week. One outstanding and helpful way that Beth recycles is to take all of our collected plastic film to Market Basket for recycling.

We ask that residents recycle only clean, dry plastic bags and film/and that they remove all receipts and other items from the bags. Recycled plastic film consists of:

- Bags for newspapers, bread, produce, dry cleaning, retail purchases (hard plastic and string handles removed), groceries, food storage (clean and dry), stove pellet bags emptied, and all clean bags labeled #2 or #4.
- Over wraps for toilet paper, napkins, furniture, electronic items, new diapers, and cases of snacks and water bottles and canned goods.
- Plastic cereal box liners, tyvek, bubble wrap, and air pillows.

In addition Ken and I appreciate that Beth occasionally contributes nourishment for our beloved flourishing crab apple tree at the Transfer Station.

Bradford Community Power

Coming Soon!

Bradford residents voted at the March 13th Town Meeting to adopt the Bradford Energy Aggregation Plan and move forward with Bradford Community Power. At this writing the Bradford Select Board is scheduled to sign the cost sharing agreement with the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire. With these last two pieces now in place, Bradford Community Power is set up to become the default energy supplier for all Bradford residents and businesses currently getting electricity through Eversource. We are aiming for a launch date of June 2024!

If you are a Bradford resident interested in getting the lower electric rates of Bradford Community Power, then there is nothing you need to do. Once we have an official launch date, mailers will be sent out to all Eversource customers in Bradford to provide notice of the upcoming changes. If you do nothing, your supplier will automatically change to Bradford Community Power and you will start receiving a lower electric rate. Note, you will still get all of your bills from Eversource. If you are interested in purchasing a higher mix of renewable energy, or if you are interested in opting out and remaining with Eversource, the mailer will provide instructions on how to make these changes. Stay tuned for more information and dates for information sessions you will be able to attend to ask your questions.

Town Hall Update

It feels like the Town Hall Project has gone from winding down to dragging on. On the bright side, the improved weather conditions that Spring brings will simplify the Town's move back into the building.

The few areas needing paint touch ups were done, the broken globe in the auditorium was replaced and the new door hardware for the historic front doors was installed. The final task is to complete installation of the security system. Two code access pads need to be mounted, the electric door strike (which had to be ordered) must be installed and then all three must be connected to the security system.

At Town Meeting, \$15,000 was approved in Warrant Article #34 to "fit-up, furnish and equip the Town Hall." On the list of items still needed for Town Hall and for which these funds might be used are: soap dispensers, area rugs for high traffic areas, rug protectors under desk chairs, a short fence by the drop off next to the right of way, repair of the parking lot light, a chimney cap, tables and chairs for elections and some sort of hard-pack surface for the parking lot.

Office staff have begun to identify all the moving parts that will need to come together to execute the move back into the Town Hall. Upon review by the Select Board, a move-in plan will be finalized and put in motion.

The Select Board has not yet set a date for a reopening celebration. Watch the Town's website and FaceBook page for a reopening announcement once a date is chosen. If you have any questions about the renovation, please reach out to the Selectmen's Office (938-5900) or administrator@bradfordnh.org.

Bradford Fish and Game Club





Highway Department Update


Now that Town Meeting is behind us and maple syrup is in the making, we are trying to gear up for spring. Along with that mud season has hit again with many loads of stone and gravel to make roads passable while waiting for the frost to come out.

The roads are posted for six ton load limit as happens every year about this time. While deliveries are scheduled you should contact us prior to having large trucks bringing items to your residences. Those big trucks can be 10-12 tons depending on size and loads they may be carrying. I appreciate your understanding and help with this although the roads are drying out. The weather will play a part in determining how long the posted signs will be up. The way things are drying out hopefully a couple of weeks may see the weight limit lifted.

Grading has started but not with the same approach as summer grading. Spring time smoothing allows the air to help dry out the dirt roads. We are trying to stockpile gravel at the pit so when we start grading and adding material we can haul from the pit as opposed to hauling from a vendor, saving time.

I wouldn't bet on winter being over yet, but trying to be hopeful and getting geared up for spring projects starting on Fairgrounds Road in the next week or so. When work is taking place on Fairgrounds there will be signs stating Road Construction Ahead. Possible road closures for through traffic are possible at times so please bear with us. The area of work will be approximately from Solitude Ridge Road to about 3500 feet up past Teele Residence. Spring maintenance is in full swing and, as always, if you have any questions, please call or email me.



agreed to send the Cost Sharing Agreement and Complete Service Bundle to legal counsel for review. Once documents have been signed by the Board the Coalition will then start the process of sending notices to Bradford rate payers with instructions for joining Bradford Community Power.

Highway Department Steve Hall, Road Agent, informed the Board that winter road maintenance expenses are currently at \$21,000, not including gravel. Line painting on Main Street is scheduled to happen during the next couple weeks. The Board agreed with Steve's proposal of selling the dump body off the one-ton truck. The price for a sweeping contractor has gone up. Steve has negotiated \$170/ hour. The Board and Steve agreed that decisions of these kinds will need to be made after town meeting.

Road Committee Steve Hall reported the committee has put together the plan with Central NH Planning. Planning is ongoing for driveway information and fire lanes, road build specifications. The committee discussed prepping and paving a section of Fairgrounds Road from Solitude Ridge Road to just past "Perry Teal's driveway." Prep work would cost about \$12,000. Grinding and repaying would cost about \$125,000. To pave West Road from Bradford Center to East Washington Road is estimated to cost \$325,000.

Fire Department Update 2024 Year to date, 46 incidents (29 EMS and 17 fire). Incidents from February 5 to date: 26 incidents, 11 EMS 15 Fire (including assists in Dunbarton and Warner). Forestry equipment is being purchased for \$2,000 from a grant with a 50/50% share. An interested Bradford resident is completing an application to join the Department. As of February 29, 2024 expenditures from the FD budget total \$12,883.40 for payroll, telephone, electricity and building repairs. Rescue squad has not seen any expenditures. Chief Nowell informed the Board the necessity of the chairs at Town Meeting being zip tied together for safety.

Police Department Update Year to date calls for service total is 726. Since the last update in February there have been 286 calls for service. Officers are completing training. Officer Hubbard is doing the DARE program at the elementary school. Crisis intervention training is being explored by the department.

Town Hall Update Occupancy date is February 22, 2024. Expenses outside the contract are

under review. Following Town Meeting planning will begin for moving.

BRADFORD ENERGY COMMITTEE

Community Power Update Town voted overwhelmingly to join the Community Power Coalition (CPC) at Town Meeting on March 13. The PUC has approved our aggregation plan. Our town council is reviewing the agreement now, and the Selectboard is set to sign it on Monday March 25th. This puts us in line to launch the program in June. Ahead of the launch, the CPC will send out a mailing in May to every resident/Eversource customer and a public info session will be held. CPC is now the 2nd most populous supplier in the state after Eversource.

Fire Station Shakes to Shingles has subcontracted the weatherstripping around one garage door. Still waiting on the garage door contractor to perform the work. Rebate from NH Saves of \$11,871.50 has been received. Heat Pumps passed at Town Meeting. Three heat pumps for the fire dept to allow for

> heating and cooling of the specific areas in use. Coupled with recent weatherization, this should result in great savings on energy use.

KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

National Finals The middle school all girls 8th grade **Drone Competition Teams** made it to the National Finals in Tennessee in May. They will soon begin some fundraising to send this team to the National Competition.

Election of Officers The Board approved motions to elect Alison Mastin as School Board Chair and Kristen Schultz as Vice Chair.

Software The Board approved a purchase recommendation for Financial Software for the 24-25 fiscal year for Tyler Technologies, Inc for the amount of \$93,828. This is the same vendor, saving money by not having to change module licensing.

Transportation Ben Cushing presented the Transportation Committee's recommendation regarding changing bus route times for the 2024-2025 school year. Proposed changes include having elementary schools start at the same time, Elementary students would not be on the same bus as older students, and 2 bus runs instead of one. Some busses currently are 3 to a seat, the new routes would create more seating space, and bus transfers would be very limited. Larry Elliott, Director of Student Support Services, stated that this was informational to the Board and the committee would now go to the public.


