

MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports select board

Officers The Board elected Beth Downs as Chair of the Select Board.

Road and Driveway Frank and Jill Gulczinski appeared to discuss the road and a proposed driveway for property at Map 3 Lot 46. Steve Hall, Road Agent, recommended option three, where the owners will take care of road maintenance and snow removal from the point to which it is currently maintained, to their property. The Select Board had no major issues with the plan and encouraged the Gulczinskis to seek the approval of the Planning Board.

Community Power The Board authorized Beth Downs to sign the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire's Cost Sharing Agreement. The Signed agreement will be sent to the Coalition.

Treasurer Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, explained that at the 2024 Town Meeting it was approved the Treasurer would be appointed by the Select Board. The Position of Town Treasurer will now be an annually appointed position, not an elected position. The Board signed a form appointing Steve Pierce as Town Treasurer for one year.

Building Permit The Board signed a building permit for Map 17 Lot 12.

Transfer Station Updates Lois Kilnapp, Transfer Station Manager, reported there are 26 bales of cardboard and mixed paper ready to go to recycling. The price for paper and cardboard is higher than it has been. Metal coming to the transfer station will be inspected for combustible materials. Alkaline batteries are no longer recyclable at the transfer station.

On May 16th and 17th, Bradford Town Offices will relocate from the Bradford Area Community Center to the Bradford Town Hall at 75 West Main Street. This is a significant undertaking to accomplish. We will not be available by phone or email for those three days as all of our attention will be focused on the move. Please be patient and plan appropriately. We are looking forward to welcoming you to 75 West Main Street again!

As we shift operations and meetings back to the Town Hall, please be sure to check *bradfordnh.org* for updates and progress. Agendas posted on the website will contain

the location of meetings to help ease the transition.

Next, it's time to celebrate! The Town will host an Open House Celebration on Saturday, June 1st from noon to 2:00 pm.

Join us for music, light refreshments, a review of the project and an appreciation event for the many, many contributions that brought this project to its very successful completion.



Fire & Rescue Department Update

Since the Town Meeting the Department has submitted a grant to FEMA for equipment that is needed to support the Department's efforts. The FEMA grant request was for \$290,500. This would need to be matched if received with 10% town funds or \$29,050 which the Fire Department has budgeted and warrant article funding for. The Department is hopeful that FEMA would look favorably on our request. We will keep you posted as the grant proceeds through the review process. If we receive this grant we would be able to update both our delf contained breathing apparatus and our mobile and portable radios.

With spring right around the corner, it is time to think about renewing your seasonal outside fire permits. A fire permit is required anytime the ground is not covered in snow 100 feet around your fire.

The fire permits are free and can be obtained by contacting the Forest Fire Warden Hansen or Bradford Fire Department. There is no daytime burning unless it is actively raining. Fires can't be closer than 50 feet to a structure, they must be attended at all times, and be extinguished prior to 9am the next morning.

Visit the Bradford Town website and the fire department section to get contact information and more information about outside burning.

The Fire Department has been very busy the first several months of 2024. Since January first the Fire Department has responded to 76 Incidents (44 EMS call and 32 Fire calls). Compared to the same time period in 2023 the Department had responded to 56 incidents. That's a 26% increase in call volume.

The Fire Department and Parks and Recreation are partnering to teach CPR and AED to the citizens of Bradford. Currently there are several locations in town where AEDs are located. We are trying to increase the availability of AEDs and help educate people on how to use them and also perform CPR. If we are able to make this happen then Bradford will become a Heart Safe community and hopefully be better prepared if there is a cardiac issue that occurs .

Former Fire Chief Mark Goldberg retired from the Fire Department March 15th after 53 years of service, 34 years as Fire Chief. The Fire Department would like to thank Chief Goldberg for all his dedication and his leadership over the years.

It is with deep regret that the Bradford Fire Department announces that Deputy Fire Chief James Raymond passed away April 14, 2024. James William Raymond, 68 of Bradford, NH, died at Concord Hospital surrounded by loved ones on Sunday, April 14th. He was born in Concord Hospital on July 7,1955 to parents Sally (Danforth) and Edward Raymond Sr. After graduating from Kearsarge Regional High School in 1974, he went on to work with his brother, Bo, at the IGA in Bradford. Jim worked at various grocery stores throughout the years before retiring from Sully's Superette in 2022. Jim joined the Bradford Fire Department in 1974, he proudly and selflessly devoted 50 years of his life to helping others. Though his efforts as a

firefighter and EMT saved countless lives, he never sought or expected acknowledgement. Knowing that he had helped another person was thanks enough. Jim profoundly impacted everyone that he came into contact with. His smile was contagious and his laughter and kindness were inspiring to all who knew him. Jim was preceded in death by his parents and older brother, Bo Raymond

The Fire Department will deeply miss Jim's presence and thank his family for allowing him to help the Fire Department and the town of Bradford for all those years.

We currently have 17 active members on the Fire Department. Two of our Firefighters are enrolled in the EMT class in Henniker and another is wrapping up his EMR. We are currently waiting for the Henniker Rescue contract to move forward and get necessary signatures. We have been busy with life safety inspections and reviews of businesses in town.

Please visit our Facebook site and like us as we try and share important safety information and also happenings within the Fire Department and the Town. This July we will once again be supporting the July celebration with the FD Chicken BBQ.

Makes two loaves

Mix Dry:

3 cups flour (whole grain works well, or can sub gluten-free flours) 1 tsp. salt 1 tsp. baking powder 1 tsp. baking soda 2.5 tsps cinnamon ½ tsp. ginger

Mix Wet:

cup applesauce
 cup sugar
 (mix of white and brown)
 tbsp. honey or maple syrup
 cup vegetable or light olive oil
 tsp. vanilla

Add Dry mixture to Wet mixture.

Fold in:

3 cups grated or mashed raw vegetables (choose what's available) Beets Carrots Zucchini Kale or spinach Potatoes (cooked first is better) Could also include apples or pears if desired

Dough will be stiff, but if is too hard to mix, add a little water or juice.

Put into two oiled 9x5 loaf pans and pat down.

Bake at 325 for about an hour, or until knife inserted into center comes out clean.

Bradford Voters Embrace Energy Conservation and Efficiency for Municipal Buildings

Since 2021 Bradford voters have enthusiastically approved 5 warrant articles proposed by the Bradford Energy Committee. Voters also approved funds for the renovation and restoration of the old Town Hall in 2021, which included energy saving measures above the minimum required by the Building Code. These warrant articles passed by Bradford voters are summarized in Table 1. Below.

The weatherization of the Brown Memorial Library, the Highway Building and Fire Station were completed over the past three years. This work followed recommendations from Energy Audit Reports prepared for these facilities through the NHSaves Municipal Energy Efficiency Program – at no cost to the Town! This program offered financial incentives (rebates) to the Town for implementing energy saving measures such as sealing air leaks and adding insulation.

Weatherization is one of the simplest and most affordable ways to reduce energy bills – but it must be done before installing any new clean energy system. Reducing air leaks and adding more insulation helps to reduce operating costs, carbon emissions and provides better comfort to occupants.

Renovation and restoration projects fall under a different NHSaves program which looks at energy conservation measures that provide both electric and gas savings. Energy conservation measures implemented at the Town Hall included the following components:

- Interior lighting and controls,
- Upgrades to heat pumps, propane condensing boilers, the energy recovery system, and the hot water pump,
- · Building envelope insulation, and
- Building envelope storm windows and air sealing.

A summary of the Town's financial investments of the energy saving measures and energy conservation measures, and the incentives received from NHSaves are summarized in Table 2 below. The data indicate that the NHSaves incentives of \$40,619.86, reduced the Town's investment of \$101,538.10 by 40 percent to \$60,918.24. Not only did the Town reduce its initial investment by 40% but will continue to realize reductions in operating costs and improvements in occupant comfort year after year!

*The Energy Committee's request for \$8,000 did not cover the estimates provided by contractors for the work described in the Audit Report. The Friends of the Library contributed the shortfall

of \$6,301.

Ellen Barselle, Library Director, has this to say about the weatherization of Brown Memorial Library. "Brown Memorial Library was a recipient of several energy initiatives over the last few years. This included adding insulation in our attic and sealing air gaps around our windows through Shakes to Shingles, installing new Mini-Splits (also known as cold climate air source heat pumps) that provide both heating and cooling through AGS Services, and upgrading lighting to LEDs throughout our library. These additions have made the library a much more pleasant place to be throughout the four seasons. We have already seen savings in our heating and lighting bills, not to mention the rebates we received from NHSaves for each of these energy saving measures! Thank you Bradford Energy Committee for encouraging and assisting us in these projects."

Now that our Municipal Buildings have been weatherized, we can move forward with the installation of energy efficient cold climate air source heat pumps as did the Library in 2023 and as the Fire Department will be doing this year.

We can all start to reduce our energy use by planning to weatherize our own homes and switch to energy efficient appliances and heat. We can also install solar photovoltaic panels on our property or purchase an electric vehicle when it's time to trade in the old one.

Conserving energy helps the Town reduce its consumption of electricity and fossil fuels. This supports our energy goals to transition to 100 percent renewable electricity by 2030 and renewable sources of fuel for heating and transportation by 2050.

By joining the Community Power Coalition of NH (CPCNH), the Town has more local control of our sources of electricity. We can decide to purchase a higher percentage of electricity generated by renewable power as individuals and as a Municipality. Please join with the BEC in achieving these essential energy goals in all ways large and small!

ADVICE TO BUYERS

Be aware, inventory is still limited, and demand is still strong! So, how can you improve your chances of success?

• Work with an experienced real estate agent. An excellent one can be your secret weapon. Interview before committing. Get references and read reviews. Ask questions.



• Expand your search area. Don't let a few miles limit your possibilities for success.

• Try to look for houses under your budget, then you have room to bid up. Numbers of properties are still selling at over asking prices, but, generally, not by as much as they have in the past.

• "Cash" offers still dominate, so carefully examine any possibilities which might allow you to make a cash offer. Get pre-approved for a mortgage and consider putting down as much as you can. This would reduce the amount of the mortgage, which could help avoid any potential appraisal issues.







It's the middle of April. We are walking on bare ground again.

This morning, I shifted slippery, algae-green hay from the sun-starved, yellowed shafts of garlic. Bent and curled like yoga acolytes coming out of a difficult pose, they are now able to stand in a row at the front of their mats in tadasana pose.

Garlic arrived in North America with the European colonists. It's been under cultivation for so long that its origins have been forgotten and its wild progenitors misplaced. Likely it hails from somewhere vaguely between the Middle East and China. Some call it an herb for its powerful tang, some call it a food, and some call it a medicine. Botanists used to label garlic and all its Allium (onion) relations as members of the lily family, strange as that seems. Now they are thinking the whole onion clan is related to Amaryllis. This is all surmised by the structure of their flowers.

However, true bulb garlic doesn't flower. In mid-summer it certainly does a strenuous imitation of a plant about to explode in blossom. However, its plantness has been so altered and distorted by human selection for its juicy pale knobs that now all it does well is make cloves of garlic – sometimes not just at the base of the plants, but amongst the roots, and again at the tops of flower stalks.

These flower stalks, scapes, should be removed to send all energy into the future garlic cloves. If the scapes aren't beheaded, they tangle themselves in spirals with the presumptive flowerhead becoming tiny rolled up bulbs called 'bulbils'. These garlic-tasting bulbils swell to cut off any normal flower production.


Because there are essentially no functioning garlic flowers, and thus no seeds to replant, all the garlic we eat now are clones – ghosts from that distant past in that distant place. Garlic has mutated and been selected to form different varieties but the genetic breadth of this important plant is dangerously limited. This makes it vulnerable to any blight or adverse climatic change that comes along. This predicament has given a few people a strange living untangling bulbils before the flowers are choked off. Carefully they cross-pollinate the resulting emancipated flowers. The seeds thus produced will hopefully create some degree of diversity and resilience in future garlic.


The garlic cloves we crave are structurally and originally leaves. (and why would they be named 'cloves' which are the dried seed heads of an Indonesian plant?) Garlic's original plan was to use them to store nutrients underground to get through prolonged cold, dry spells. Their roots are contractile, meaning that they lengthen and then contract, lowering the plant into the protective ground. The actual stem of a garlic plant is that hard core at the center of the cloves that we remove.

In other words, in the autumn we bury swollen knobs of ancestral leaf a few inches below ground – wedge-shaped segments that don't look at all like leaves. In spring, new leaves appear from these stubs of leaves and by mid-summer we are eating scapes that look like they should be flowers but they never quite get there. We wait till very late summer when the whole plant dies back and prepares itself for winter. We pry these clumps of leaf storage bits – that are for some reason called 'heads' – out of the ground. Broken apart, we eat most and save a few to replant in the ground and start the process all over again.

Some day there may be new forms and flavors of garlic grown from seeds that were coaxed from our elderly, overly-domesticated regulars.

Please be on the lookout for turtles crossing the road! If you do come across a turtle in the road, you can save that turtle's life by:

• pulling over to the side of the road

• when safe to do so, pick up the turtle and place them on the side of the road, ALWAYS in the direction they were already headed.

They are stubborn and know where they are going, so unfortunately turning them around does not work, even if you think they should be going the other way.

• Also, NEVER relocate - turtles are extremely tied to their local environments and should never be moved.





MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

(Continued from page 1) Composting at the transfer station has been popular with lots of food waste going to compost rather than the compactor.

Select Board Committee and Department Assignments Beth Downs is assigned to Budget Committee, Capital Improvement Program Committee, and Police Liaison. Marlene Freyler is assigned to Fire Liaison, Economic Development Committee, Planning Board, Energy Committee, Historic District Commission, and Budget Committee alternate. Chip Meany is assigned to Facilities Use Committee, Highway liaison, Roads and Bridges Committee, Transfer Station liaison, and Planning Board alternate.

Police Department Update There have been 483 incidents since the last report, this is a total of 1000+ for the year. There has been a 37% increase over 2023 of motor vehicle stops. 78% of the 2024 budget is remaining. The new police cruiser Durango has been ordered and will be delivered in 4-5 months. The Tahoe needs repair and is under warranty.

Paving Steve Hall has gathered three bids for paving West Road and Fairgrounds. The low bid total for the road projects is \$378,000, \$53,000 higher than the warrant article passed at Town Meeting. The Board approved a motion to fund the \$53,000 overage with the additional Highway Block Grant funds received in 2023 in the amount of \$25,283.66, and the balance to be funded by the 2019 Roads and Bridges Expendable Trust Fund.

Town Hall Update In July of 2023, the Board approved the replacement of the tin ceiling on the first floor as required by LCHIP and agreed to fund it with funds leftover from a 2020 warrant article for building repair and maintenance. The work was anticipated to cost approximately \$11,000, however the final total was \$16,213. The Board approved a motion to use \$16,656.89 of unexpended funds from the 2020 warrant article #29 to cover the tin ceiling and other final expenses.

Unanticipated Revenue The Board approved motions to accept unanticipated revenue per RSA 31:95-b for \$1,130 in private donations for the Bradford Scholarship Fund; \$9853.20 from the NH Department of Safety Search and Rescue Grant for the Police Department (this is the final payment for the 2021 grant award); \$1,800.00 from Work Invest NH – EMT Training Incentive Program Grant; \$566.98 from the restitution payment for the misuse of the gas card; \$1,000for the sale of the nine-foot body from the F550 truck.

Appointments The Board signed appointments for the Conservation

Commission for George Beaton, Doug Southard, Ann Eldridge, and Brooks McCandlish.

Junkyard License Signed for Lawrence McDonald, 78 Fortune Road.



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BUDGET COMMITTEE

Officers The Committee elected Jen Richardson as Chair and Kim Firth as Vice Chair.

Department Assignments Consensus of the committee is that members meeting with departments helped in understanding the workings and budgetary process in each department. Members volunteered as follows: Jen Richardson - Library, Town Clerk/Tax Collector/Elections; Kim Firth - Building Code, Executive; Justin Dohrn -Transfer Station; Laurie Colburn - Fire Department, Cemetery; Dawn Gezelman - Highway, Planning/Zoning Boards; Tim McKenna - Police Department, Parks and Recreation, Patriotic Purposes.

1st Quarter Expense Review Consensus is that expenses are in line with the budget.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Wellness Camp Application for special exception presented by Beata Bzura for a seasonal wellness camp for 20 adults in two phases. Phase one will span three



years with phase two starting in year four. The Board accepted the application as complete. Site walk scheduled for April 30, 2024, at 3:00 pm. Public Hearing is scheduled for Tuesday, May 1, 2024.

Front Porch A public hearing was held April 3, 2024 for Jeff and Tracey Quigley's application for a special exception at 20 High Street. Jeff explained that the application is to remove a cement slab on the front of the house and replace it with a porch that is in keeping with the porch originally on the house. Jeff presented photos of porches on neighboring houses with similar or smaller setbacks. The Board unanimously approved the application.

PLANNING BOARD

Officers The Board elected Katie Olohan as Chair and Carol Troy as Vice Chair.

Subdivision The Board approved a motion to accept the subdivision application by Kathie and Roy Joseph Messer for Map 5 lots 12 and 114 as complete. Public hearing and site walk were scheduled for April 23, 2024.

Conceptual Consult Jacques E. Belanger; J.E. Belanger Land Surveying PLLC, Dunbarton NH appeared for discussion

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for a Condo conversion project at the Fisherfield Apartments.

Conceptual Consult Cheryl Croto of 26 Fortune Road appeared to discuss subdividing a part of her 43 acres on Fortune Road.

Driveway Regulations Katie Olohan met with Highway, Fire Officials and Matt Monahan from Central NH Regional Planning. Driveway regulations are in the planning process and will guide Fire, Highway and property owners.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

West Road The driveway in violation of wetlands ordinance has been relocated on the property.

Aiken Town Forest The Bradford Conservation Commission has authority over this easement, but any changes in restrictions need to be cleared with Ausbon Sargent. Members were in favor of allowing this 136 acre property to remain unlogged ad infinitum.

Turtle Crossing The Board approved a motion to spend up to \$100 on temporary signage to be placed in known turtle crossing areas during nesting season.

Bradford Bog Boards George Beaton has secured the quantity of hemlock boards needed for repairs from Rick Wright.

CEMETERY COMMISSION

Cemetery Maintenance There is currently one person interested in the



landscaping contract. In anticipation of a new landscaping contract the Trustees will conduct a physical assessment of all work required in the 17 town cemeteries. Thereafter, the work will be prioritized.

Repair Work Vendor quotes will be requested regarding the removal of plumbing and electrical work required in the Sunny Plain Cemetery.

ENERGY COMMITTEE

Bradford Community Power has been approved for operation by the NH Public Utilities Commission. On Friday, May 10 at 6 pm there will be an information session to explain and answer questions about Bradford Community Power.

Weatherization of Town Buildings is complete and the necessary forms are being filed for the NHSaves rebate for the Fire Department weatherization. See "Bradford Voters Embrace Energy Conservation and Efficiency for Municipal Buildings" in this edition of the Bradford Bridge.

Legislative Update The committee has been answering calls for opinions on several energy-related bills in the NH Legislature.

Energy Savings with the Inflation Reduction Act The committee discussed at length the possibilities for IRS tax credits available for energy saving measures. The committee sees these tax credits as a way to help residents save money while improving energy conservation. A CPA will be available at the next meeting to answer questions about how homeowners can receive tax credits.

FACILITIES USE COMMITTEE

Scope of Work The Committee discussed common procedures for managing venues; Karen Hambleton noted that their charge is to come up with a process. The Committee will focus on Town Hall second floor and BACC. The committee discussed the current tenants of the BACC, current uses, and the possible uses after the town offices move, perhaps for the police.



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The pinnacle of the elementary school experience is fifth grade. Much as adults wish to slow down aging, kids are eager to grow up. Little kids admire big kids and so it goes.

Fifth grade at KRES-Bradford provides a fascinating concoction of anticipation and nostalgia. It is a major transition to leave the local elementary school and head to the regional middle school. Some are eager to meet new friends while striding the halls of KRMS. There, they will explore fresh areas of study with multiple mentors. Others are reluctant to leave behind the early childhood joys of the elementary experience. Either way, the teachers at KRES-B will get them ready. As Kris Lee says, "It's always a BIG step from fifth to sixth grade! We spend a lot of time helping students become independent and responsible, so that they can meet the challenges of middle school."

Kris Lee is a veteran teacher here, now in her 27th year at KRES-B. She started off in first grade but quickly found her niche with 5th graders and never looked back. Often, she has been the only 5th grade teacher but this year she is joined by Jessica Poland, who moved up from 4th grade with the student population bubble. Jessi's flexibility with this transition provided continuity for the students as they rose from 4th to 5th and has given her insights into the 5th grade experience that will serve well next year.

What the teachers like best about teaching 5th grade is "that these kids can be

independent on some long term, fun projects. They also have a fun sense of humor and are still playful, even though they are older. They are really developing into independent thinkers too, which makes for interesting conversations," says Kris. She especially loves teaching reading and writing. And social studies assimilations are also a favorite curriculum topic. Each student takes on the identity of an emigrant on the Oregon Trail while studying pioneers so they can absorb the content material through experience. Student Anna Ahearn says the simulation "makes it seem so real. It makes me happy to know the truth." Kris adds, "The biggest challenge in teaching is that there is NEVER enough time to cover everything that I need to cover. Also, kids have many different needs, and sometimes it's hard to really get to everyone who needs my help."

In her spare time, Kris cooks and bikes with her husband Kevin, who teaches English at KRHS. Her daughter is an educator at a nature center in Wisconsin and her son Patrick is studying physical education at Plymouth State University. It is evident that teaching runs in the family. KRES-B is lucky to have this kind of staff commitment and know-how to prepare our students for furthering their education with curiosity and confidence. To sum it all up, Kris says "The biggest reward is that I get to form a relationship with some pretty cool young people! It's fun, interesting and meaningful work."

What could be more rewarding than preparing our children for the future? The entire staff at KRES-B is dedicated to doing just that. By the end of the school year, the 5th graders will be proudly exhibiting the gratifying gains of their years in elementary school and will be prepped for the next adventure. As student Anna Ahearn says, "At first, it's scary to think about going to middle school but then you think – Wait! – We are ready. We can do this!" Their accomplishments will be applauded at a 5th Grade Celebration to be held in June.






