## SPECIAL TOWN MEETING POSTPONED

On May 20, by a vote of 3 – 0, the Board of Selectmen approved a motion to pull the existing petition to hold a special town meeting on June 3 and to begin the process anew.

Merrimack County Superior Court had scheduled a hearing for May 27 on the original petition. The revised petition will ask for a later date for the meeting, the end of July or early August. This will allow time to finalize the proposal, re-word the warrant articles to provide greater flexibility, and provide the time needed to hold a bond hearing if the decision is made to use that approach for financing.

Selectmen approved a contract bid of \$2,850 from Lake Sunapee Survey to complete a survey of the highway garage property that will include siting the proposed building.

The selectmen's meeting on June 3 will be held at the town hall.

*This is a continuation in a series of Bradford Bridge interviews with people in Bradford.*

### MARLENE FREYLER

*Marlene Freyler was born in Franklin, New Hampshire where she attended local schools. She studied hairdressing at Houle's Hair Academy in Manchester. After working for a time for other beauty shops, she opened her own place in Manchester and divided her time between Manchester and rented space in Bradford. Marlene rented space above the Stewart Agency on Main Street where she combined hair dressing and a gift and craft shop. Her next move was to a trailer on Route 114 and then she and her husband built their home. Over the years they added two greenhouses and to this day she combines hairdressing and her florist business on the Rte. 114 premises.*

**Q. You have combined two businesses, hair dresser and florist, and have apparently created a successful enterprise. Can you explain how you did this? What is there in your background that formed these somewhat disparate choices?**

When I was growing up most girls didn't go to college. I think that I fell into the career at the age of 18 when I heard about a beauty salon for rent in Manchester. The florist business seemed attractive and over the years I've taken courses at the University of New Hampshire in forestry and

Proposed Museum

In 2005, the town voted to “dedicate a 3.6 acre portion of town property with frontage on East Main Street for the purpose of developing a cultural center for the town”.

A building 34 x 20 feet to be a Blacksmith and Woodworking Museum on the front Marshall lot is proposed. It will house a collection of local artifacts, fulfilling a need for display of old tools which were essential for building early homes in

Bradford. This will be a positive project for and by Bradford people, with donations staying in our town.

The building will be seasonal with no electrical connection. It will be funded by private sales and donations. Constructed of clapboard, the south facing window is planned with small panes resembling the late Arthur Gardner Tin Shop, now retained by the Stewart Agency. There will be two

double doors at ground level, a demonstration area and demonstrations, including a working smithy. Donations including granite, gravel, old bricks and rough pine boards will be appreciated.

On Wednesday, June 25th, there will be a meeting to see Steve Hansen’s Bradford collections. Call for directions, 938-5386, or 938-2634.

The 1793 Bradford Center Schoolhouse roof is being replaced. There have been very generous donations to accomplish this. When finished, there are plans to open it more often. Anyone interested in being a docent, please contact anyone on the Historical Society Board. Call 938-5386.

Much more information will follow on this subject about what needs to be done.

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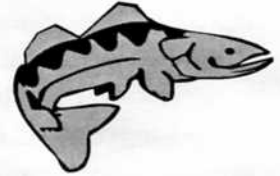
### Bradford Fish and Game News

horticulture and New Hampshire Technical Institute in landscaping color.

**Q. In addition to your busy professional life you serve on many town committees. How do you manage to find the time?**

I don't go out to gatherings and I'm not a shopper. Instead I go to meetings. It gets me out of the house. Working at home is solitary and I need to move outside. Also, I just feel that if I don't like something that is going on I shouldn't complain about it. The first committee I served on was the Planning Board and then I went on to additional committees.

**Q. One of your town interests is the annual July 4<sup>th</sup> celebration. Obviously you are devoted to this enterprise since you rescued it when the Bradford Fire Department gave it up. Why is it so important to you? Do you plan to do this forever?**

Many people do not realize that only three people run this event. Jane Lucas, Beth von Behren and I run the July 4<sup>th</sup> festivities. I was approached by the Henniker town administrator about our fireworks and parade. They wanted to take it over and have it in Henniker. At that point I decided to do something about it and keep it in Bradford where it's been celebrated for 80 years. We used to raise money for the event and two years ago we asked the town for money. We now have \$15,000 for it. It's not a good fund raiser since the profits are shared with the Bradford Church, the

Masons and Bradford/Newbury/Sutton Youth Sports. Our small committee plans to continue for a while and this year we are planning to have a carnival and maybe we'll make money with that.

**Q. Which of your business ventures do you enjoy more, hair or flowers?**

They're pretty equal. I can't really say. I've had many of the same customers for years and that's wonderful since I know them so well and they feel comfortable with me. I also go to the Pleasant View Nursing Home to do the patients hair and that's every Monday and Tuesday.



**Q. It must be difficult to match hair styles and clients. Do you intuitively know how to style and cut each person's hair. Most hair dressers have the gift of gab. I wonder is that part of training?**

I think it's part of the profession. We're like waitresses and bartenders. I think people expect you to talk and to listen. You can suggest a hairstyle but most people have a clear idea of what they want. Some people are open to suggestion. I tell people "I'm a beautician not a magician". You learn about people's lives and they

learn about yours.

**Q. I understand that you are involved in "Worry Free Weddings." Can you tell me about this?**

I've done weddings where I wind up cutting the cake. In a sense I guess that I'm a wedding planner.

**Q. You've lived in Bradford for a long time. What attracted you to the town? Do you ever think about life in a less rural environment?**

I've lived here for 35 years. I was dating someone from Bradford and had never heard of the place prior to meeting him. I found that my business in Manchester slowed down during the summer months but in Bradford the summer populations increased and provided good business for me. I'd never move. My family is here now and it's home.

**Q. What kinds of changes have you observed in Bradford? What kind of town will it be in 10 years? What would you like to see happen here?**

There are a lot of new people now. When I came here the population was 400. It was a lot easier living because there weren't so many rules and regulations. The town hasn't changed much but it's not thriving because we need more business. I fought for the July 4<sup>th</sup> event because it is part of Bradford's spirit. We need to be more business friendly. In order to help people with taxes we need a tax base. Route 114 should be a business district. We have no parking on Main Street so it's unsuitable. Water and sewer are not the answer. We need to tear down

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houses on Main Street to make it a viable business environment. Bradford will be the same in ten years. It's hard times for people now. People should vote their feelings and attend town meetings. I would like to see Main Street cleaned up but you have to let business in to make the town more affluent.

**Q. If you could alter one thing in your life what would that be?**

Nothing. I have my kids and grandchildren here. I enjoy my two businesses. It's left me free to enjoy my children. I wouldn't do it differently.

**Q. Do you have any free time to enjoy hobbies? Are you a physical fitness advocate? Do you like theater, music or sports?**

I like to read. We have a motor boat and we canoe. My music preference is country and rock and roll. My outside activities are with my church in Henniker where I head up the social committee. I'm not into physical fitness but I should be. I suppose my physical fitness is lifting my grandchildren.

*This reporter would like to report that after many, many of these interviews, the ending was quite unusual. I needed my hair trimmed and asked Marlene if she would do it? She graciously acquiesced and I exited with less hair. I did say to her that I never like my haircuts which is a "woman thing" but I agreed not to comment either way on the haircut so "no comment."*

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## Selectmen's Highlights

**Tax Bills:** Bill 1 of 2 for the 2008 taxes were printed and mailed out in May. It was noted that these are calculated at one-half of the total for 2007. Appropriations made at the 2008 Town and School District Meetings will be reflected on bill 2 to be sent out in the fall.

**Historical Society:** The selectmen voted in favor of a proposal by the Bradford Historical Society to erect a Blacksmith Shop on the front portion of the Marshall lot on East Main Street.

**Police Department:** By a vote of 2-1, selectmen approved a request from the Police Chief to purchase tasers for the Department.

**Gravel:** A supply of gravel has been located on the lower portion of the transfer station property. Henniker Crushed Stone will bring in an excavator and crush the material at a cost of \$5.00 per yard.

**Town Hall:** Estimates have been received to paint the town hall. Further checking will be done before any contract is signed.

Audrey Sylvester presented a proposal for a public viewing of the recently installed Henry Backdrop on the second floor of the town hall. A one-time event would be scheduled in the summer allowing business and

individual donors to see the final results of the backdrop restoration. No more than 49 people at any one time would be allowed in the second floor auditorium. Fire Chief Mark Goldberg offered to provide a "fire watch" since this will be a one time event. Selectmen voted to allow the open house once the organization of it is set with the Fire Chief.

**Fire Department/Rescue Squad:** A Request for Proposal has been prepared to solicit bids for re-roofing the fire station. Complete specifications are available at the town hall or online at [www.bradfordnh.org](http://www.bradfordnh.org) and are due at town hall by 12 noon June 13, 2008.

Selectmen solicited information regarding the number of rescue squad members currently on call and the rates of pay each will be given. This varies depending on the level of training. All billing for services will be handled through the Selectmen's Office.

Selectmen agreed to repair or replace fencing around a fire pond on the property of Chris Way as requested. The existing fence is in poor condition and once a fire pond is fenced, the town has an obligation to keep it up. Further information will be provided on cost and location of an entrance.

**Nepotism:** Several anonymous letters have been received by the selectmen concerning perceived nepotism in the police and other town departments. It was suggested that a letter should be placed in the Bridge advising that such letters will not be addressed without signatures.

**Community Day Care Center:** Representatives from the Kearsarge Area Preschool and the Governance Board of the Community Center will be asked to attend the next Selectmen's meeting to discuss a proposal to expand the services offered.

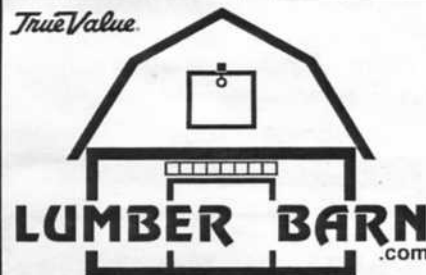

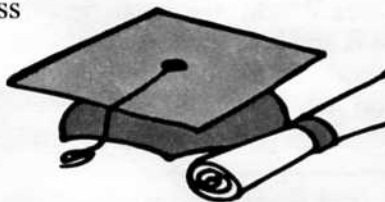

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## Obituaries

### Fred E. Winch

Fred E. Winch, 93, died May 17, 2008 in Concord, NH.

Born in Framingham, MA on June 16, 1914, he was the son of Fred and Emma (Borgesson) Winch. He graduated from the University of Maine at Orono and received his master's degree in forestry in 1937 from Cornell University. An assistant and associate professor at Cornell University from 1943 to 1975, Fred Winch was the first inductee into the National Maple Museum Hall of



Fame and professor emeritus at Cornell University since 1975. He served as a Bradford Selectman from 1977 to 1983 and chairman from 1979 to 1983.

Fred was a member of the First Baptist Church of Bradford and had been chairman of the board of trustees. He was a member and former treasurer of the Bradford Historical Society and the Bradford Conservation Commission. He was a founding member of the Bradford Voters Coalition, an organization that initiated the publication of the town's monthly newspaper, *The Bradford Bridge*, in July 1991. "Gardening by Fred Winch" was a regular column in *The Bridge* for many years. Fred served on the Bradford Town Facilities Committee of the Board of Selectmen. He was a director of the NH Timberland Owners Association from 1977 to 1985 and member of the NH State Tree Farm Committee, NH Forestry Communications

Council and University of New Hampshire's Cooperative Extension Advisory Committee for Merrimack County.

While at Cornell, Fred developed two research extension facilities in New York State, including the Henry Uihlein Sugar Maple Research and Extension Field Station in Lake Placid. In 1995, he received the Outstanding Alumni Award from the Alumni Association of the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences at Cornell University. In 2004, the College of Agriculture and Life Sciences named him a charter member of the Liberty Hyde Bailey Leadership Society. He was New York's state extension forester for more than 30 years. He helped establish the Cornell Club of New Hampshire.

The Winch family moved to Bradford in 1976. Fred Winch moved to Concord in 2003. He enjoyed stamp and coin collections, growing unusual plants, and grafting trees. His wife of 65 years, Frances (Morgan) Winch, died in 2005. He is survived by three sons, Daniel Winch of Newfield, NY, Fred E. Winch III of Harare, Zimbabwe, and Seth R. Winch of Saugus, MA; a daughter, Elsa E. Winch of Lock Haven, PA; eight grandchildren, Thomas, Paul, Dinah, Jill, Alexandra, Caraline, Ethan and Leah; three great-grandchildren, Christopher, Abby Lynn and May; a sister, Elsa Weir of South Newbury, NH; and two nephews.

Burial was held at Sunny Plain Cemetery in Bradford.

*The following is an excerpt from Fred Winch's gardening column for the Bradford Bridge in June 1994*

June is the ultimate month for country living, not only in the garden but in fields and groves as well - and it always has been! A short time ago I came across my father's copy of the *The Franklin Fifth Reader*, inscribed by him May 22, 1891. . . it is some 375 pages of excerpts from many authors (certainly worth reading even now). One the most marked and underline pieces is Whittier's *The Barefoot Boy*, which struck his fancy -

"O, for boyhood's time of June,  
Crowding years in one brief moon  
When all things I heard or saw,  
Me, their master, waited for!  
I was rich in flowers and trees,  
Hummingbirds and honeybees:  
For my sport the squirrel played..."  
In Whittier's quieter era, there was time to enjoy the fruits of June, to explore what we now call our environment, as well as to smell the roses!

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## Planning Board Notes

### CNHRPC

The Planning Board nominated Bill Glennie and Jane Johnsen as Bradford's representatives to the Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission. The names were submitted to the Board of Selectmen for their consideration.

### Conceptual Consultation

(non-binding discussions with applicants)

- George Carafa discussed a two-lot subdivision for property on West Road. The Board indicated areas for his consideration that should be addressed in the application.
- Peter Isham advised the Board that he wants to process material, including rock crushing, at his gravel pit on Pleasant Valley Road. The Board determined that an application for a gravel pit permit would be required. A site walk will be scheduled when the application has been prepared so Board members can be familiar with the property.
- Nate Kimball was advised that he needs to file an application for a gravel pit permit in order to continue using the excavation site on Breezy Hill Road.

### Continuations

The Public Hearing was continued on the application for a gravel pit permit for Barry Wheeler's gravel pit on Center Road. Comments from the Conservation Commission were read into the record and filed. There was no public comment. The Board voted to grant the permit for a three year period. Mr. Wheeler recused himself from the Board for this vote and was replaced by Alternate Jim Bibbo.

The Site Plan for Robin Sanborn to conduct a transportation business on East Main Street was approved by the Board after reading comments from town departments. The condition attached to the approval requires that all vehicles be parked in the off-street parking lot at all times.

Mark Brunnel provided an update for the Board of his application for a 22-lot "over 55" open space subdivision on Old Warner Road. He submitted a revised plan to meet requirements from DES regarding both septic systems and community wells. The Board provided a list of further steps that need to be taken and a list of required documents that must be submitted to Town Counsel for review.

This will be continued on June 10.

### Public Hearing

George Naughton was represented by Alden Beauchemin of Keyland Enterprises with an application for a Site Plan Modification for property on Jones Road. The proposal is to construct an additional building that will be used to sort and re-load primarily demolition materials that have been collected from surrounding areas. This will enable Mr. Naughton to recycle some materials and consolidate the truckloads that are transported to area disposal sites.

The Board reviewed the application and the comments provided by CNHRPC and voted that the application as submitted is complete. A site walk was scheduled for May 27 with the public hearing continued to June 10.

### O. E. Trucking

The Board reviewed the request from the Department of Safety for Martyn Chivers to operate a motor vehicle inspection station at his property on Breezy Hill Road. The Board determined that the applicant complies with local ordinances and approved the request with the stipulation that it applies only to Map 3, Lot 74A. Board member Sonny Harris recused himself from this vote and was replaced by Alternate Jim Bibbo.

### Dunkin Donuts

The Board voted to require a revised site plan that shows the correct square footage of the building as constructed.

## Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act (CSPA)

Now that summer is approaching, the number of visitors to our wonderful region of the state who want to enjoy all that nature offers and man provides will increase. Some people will decide to purchase waterfront property and those who already own property on or near the water are familiar with the CSPA which was enacted in 1994. Since that time, it has been re-evaluated and in 2007 the New Hampshire Legislature adopted important amendments to the CSPA. It took until March of 2008 to approve the rules that the Department of Environmental Services (DES) will use to administer it and now enforcement that was to begin on April 1<sup>st</sup> has been postponed until July 1<sup>st</sup>. At a recent meeting for REALTORS® to discuss the amendments, one of the handouts was a well-written article by Robert Wood of the Lake Sunapee Protective Association. In it he notes that since all streams and wetland areas are connected to waters downstream and many drinking sources, runoff from land surfaces because of the actions of man impacts us all. Here is a description of the CSPA and the changes that will take effect July 1<sup>st</sup>:

The Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act helps to protect surface water and groundwater quality, aquatic and riparian habitats, and drinking water supplies by limiting development activities in the shoreland zone of lakes and ponds 10 acres or larger and larger streams and rivers. The shoreland zone extends 250 feet back from the normal high water line of the water body, known as the reference line.

All primary structures must be set back at least 50 feet from the reference line and towns may enact their own setback only if it is greater than 50 feet. Within 50 feet, a waterfront buffer must be maintained and tree coverage is managed with a grid and points system. Trees from 1 to 6 inches in diameter are worth one point, 6 to 12 inches equals five points and larger than 12 inches equals ten points. Trees and saplings may only be cut as long as the scores for the remaining trees and saplings is at least 50 points. No natural ground cover shall be removed except for a footpath to the water no wider than six feet. No cutting or removal of vegetation below 3 feet in height is allowed, excluding lawns and the aforementioned footpath. Stumps, roots and rocks must remain intact. Chemical applications are prohibited and no fertilizer except for limestone shall be used between the reference line and 25 feet.

Within the area between 50 feet and 150 feet from the reference line, 50 percent of the area not covered by impervious surfaces shall be maintained in an undisturbed state. Impervious surfaces include roofs, patios, decks, some walkways and driveways.

Within the 250 foot protected shoreland a permit is now required for any construction, excavation or

filling and fees are \$100 plus 10 cents per square foot of impact. Impervious surface area is limited to 20 percent, but this may be increased using the points system depending on how much tree coverage you have as well as a no-cut deed restriction in the waterfront buffer and in some cases, a DES approved stormwater management plan. All new lots are subject to subdivision approval by DES and setback requirements (75, 100 or 125 feet) for all new septic systems are determined by soil characteristics.
