Brackett Scheffy “Retires” Judgeship

The Bradford Bridge asked Brackett Scheffy to comment on his career as a lawyer and a judge and received this reply.

My official date of retirement was Saturday, March 31, 2012, so after midnight of that day, my judicial career was over. I was appointed by Governor Sununu and was sworn in by him in December of 1986—26 years ago! Back in those days, the greatest influence on who was appointed was from the Executive Council (Governor’s Council) member from the district in which the court was located. That person, happily, was another Bradford person, Peter Spaulding. I have been grateful to him ever since for having the confidence that I would not embarrass him if he supported my appointment.

In a sense, I was following in the footsteps of my grandfather, John G. Brackett, a summer resident of Bradford but otherwise a lifelong resident of Arlington, Massachusetts. He was a special judge in the Boston Municipal Court for decades up until his death in 1954. My uncle, Jim Eisenman, husband of my aunt, Janice Brackett Eisenman, was also a special judge in New York for many years.

It was a great privilege to serve as a judge. I always said that judges are treated the way everyone should be. I was conscious of the fact that my office required deference from those who came into the court and in return I did my best to treat everyone with respect and courtesy.

Another benefit to the job was being able to be involved in some high profile criminal cases but not take the same risks to life and limb that the police had. One example was the double murder in Warner, after which I camped out in my office next door to the Warner town hall and just waited for the Assistant Attorney Generals to come over with search warrant and arrest warrant requests. Over the years, there have been a number of high profile cases that at least started in my court; it always quickens the pulse to see the WMUR remote broadcasting vehicle outside the courthouse.

My primary obligation has been to provide a balance between the power of the state and the rights of its individual citizens and between the sometimes more subtle power of one litigant over the other. The concept of that role was my guidance every day for the twenty-six years I was a judge. I will leave it to others to say how well I have succeeded. The district courts in this state—now part of the Circuit Court system—are the face of justice and the judicial branch in New Hampshire. Well over 90% of

This month we observe Memorial Day. We wondered how to do this as a small town that will be celebrating its 225th birthday. After some thought, we decided to interview war veterans in honor of our soldiers who have joined the military to protect our country’s security. We are pleased to present an interview with Jane and Don Johnsen, who were in the Army and Navy during the Korean conflict. After 56 years of marriage they are not only together, but have never regretted their decision to say “I do.”

Jane and Don met in Memphis, Tennessee. Don was teaching in Naval Electronic school and Jane had served in the Women’s Army Corps” (WACS) for three years. She was no longer in the service but was secretary to the Commander of the “Fire Control School.” The year was 1954. Jane had married for the first time and in those years the idea of marriage for people who were both in the service was frowned upon. It just wasn’t done. The first marriage didn’t last but then Don and Jane met and are still together after 56 years.

Q. Jane, you mentioned that you joined the Women’s Army Corp (WACS.). Describe your life as a woman in the service.

When I joined I was in Fort Lee, Virginia. I worked at the Pentagon as a secretary for a Colonel who was in charge of classified and unclassified messages. Women didn’t go into combat at that time. It was a restrictive life. In spite of that, I enjoyed it and it shaped me into a better person. I really wanted to go to college but at that time my dad thought that only men should go to college. I walked into the Army recruiting office. They

From the Editor



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

all cases which come into the courts of this state come into the district courts. Most people who ever see a judge see no one other than a district court judge. For that reason, it is imperative that district court judges be respectful of all who come into the court and give the public good reason to respect the judge and the court system in return.

As to my own plans, I can assure you that I use the word retirement only because I have to. I can't leave the judicial branch without saying it. In every other respect, I am not retiring. I am simply moving on to my third career. I spent over thirty-five years primarily as a practicing lawyer, about four primarily as a judge and now I plan to spend another decade or two as a practicing lawyer, a writer of fiction and non-fiction, and, happily, a member of the Sugar River Bank Board of Directors. As to my private practice, it is concentrated on estate planning—wills, trusts, powers of attorney, etc.—and estate administration (the probate court process.) For the moment, I do not plan to have an office outside my home in which to meet clients and will instead continue to make “house calls” or meet in other locations. Private practice was perhaps what I missed most when my judging became nearly full time. I am looking forward to spending more time with clients and trying to help them solve their problems. It was difficult in court many times when it was clear that a litigant (often without an attorney) really needed some good advice on how to handle his or her situation. As a judge, I could not get involved on that basis. Well, now I can.

The best thing about launching my third career is that I am blessed to be married to a woman who could not be more supportive of every goal I have and to be continuously—relentlessly—affirming in that support. I'm not sure how I got to be so lucky but it gives me confidence that my third career will be the best.

Bradford Police Department News

Members of the Bradford Police Department held an open house with approximately 100 residents stopping in to visit. During the open house we gave out gun locks and presented parents with Child Safe ID Kits. The kits, courtesy of the Friends of the Bradford Area Community Center and the Bradford Police Association, allow parents to keep, in a safe place, information about their children. These kits include DNA sample preservation. The Officers will be available during this year's bicycle rodeo and during other events so parents can secure their own kits if they would like. The bicycle rodeo will be at the end of May or beginning of June and will coincide with the Town's *Safe Routes to School Project*.

There are a number of scams circulating - two of which have been outlined on Facebook at Town of Bradford Police Department or at bradfordnh.org. Both of these involve the victim's bank accounts. One advises that the victim has won a large amount of money. In the letter is a check. The victim is asked to deposit the check and use part of the check for processing fee

and the rest is theirs to keep. The grand prize will then be sent to them after processing. There is no grand prize and there is no money in the account that the check is drawn against. The suspects will take the check you sent and run. Your bank will then be looking for you to make the money good. The other involves Walmart and a \$1,000.00 gift certificate. When the victim responds, they are told that they have run out of gift cards and if the victim wants their award right away they can give the caller the account number and the company will deposit it right away. Anthony Shepherd has been a part time officer with the Town of Bradford since February of 2005. tested me and a month later phoned to say that I was accepted. My parents were both very strict and were not thrilled with the idea. I found my direction in life. The Korean War had just begun and two of my friends who were in the service made the conflict come alive for me. One of them was killed and the other seriously wounded.



Q. What were the highlights of your life before the military? Were you an outgoing person? Did you find make friends easily? Can you tell us about your girlhood in the South and how it differed from your service life?

I was born and raised in Memphis, Tennessee. I was a friendly and outgoing person. Memphis, back then, was a big town with a small town atmosphere. My life was pretty typical and fairly consistent with life in a place where people knew each other. The Army was just like my upbringing, very strict and disciplined. Both the Army and Navy took care of their own. You were in a group that cared about you and your wellbeing.

Q. If you had your life to live over again and the option was available to change it, would you consider another path?

I wanted to be an opera singer. I had a nice voice and loved to sing. My parents didn't think that was an

appropriate life for a young girl. I imagine they thought that there were too many temptations out there. I look back now and feel that my course was correct.

Q. Don, you mentioned that you were in some youthful escapades with things like throwing mud balls at trolley cars. When you think back was joining the Navy a way for you to find your path in life?

I have to say that I was always getting into trouble, nothing too serious, but youthful mistakes. Somehow, I managed to set a fire in my backyard. My dad trained horses, ponies and hunting dogs for Augustus Busch who was the chairman of Anheuser Busch back then. The Korean War had started and a friend and I were going to join the Navy. My friend backed out. I decided to join without him. Everyone was patriotic in those days.

Q. Did you experience any military action during the war? Any memorable events that were life-changing?

I was in Naval Air. We flew in multi-engine planes. There was no slogging in mud and tents like the Army. We tracked Soviet submarines out of Newfoundland and Iceland. We had the distinction of being shot at by a "fisherman" with a machine gun on a Russian trawler (happened to be loaded with every type of antennae you could imagine). It was never noted in the news because the government didn't want an "incident" but the bullet holes in our tail made it very real to our crew. Then, I met the most fascinating and gorgeous woman in the world. In 1956 Jane and I were married.

Q. This nation appears to seek peace but peace seems to evade us with one conflict after the other. Why, in your opinion, and as a former serviceman do you think we can never achieve a lasting peace?

I think we have to stay out of other people's business. It's not a black and white answer and can never be that. People come after us. We live in a world where terrorists exist; the choices are narrow. I don't think that anything will change and that may

sound pessimistic but it's reality. There are high and low points but we don't seem to learn. Jane and Don agree that peace will not be achieved, "not in our time."

Q. Don, you owned a business and are still working at Home Depot as a Design Consultant. You left the Navy in 1969. Do you see retirement in your future?

I concluded while I was still in the Navy that I was never going to retire. You can only play so much golf. Work helps to keep you occupied. I design kitchens and bathrooms for Home Depot. I enjoy working with people. It is amazing the different people that you meet on the job. I enjoy problem solving. I designed things when I was in the Navy. It's a challenge to make something out of nothing.

Q. You both came from the south but decided to settle in New England and wound up in Bradford. What attracted you to this part of the country?

We didn't know much about the New England area but when we found our home on Rowe Mountain that was it. The house was owned by the bank and was really a relic. The realtor took us to our present home and although it was a wreck the sun

came out when we saw it and we were both hooked. That was in 1993. We're still working on the house. It will never be done. We found good neighbors and everyone was happy to see the house fixed and people living in it. We both liked Bradford, warts and all. We never want to move back down south.

Q. I know that both of you have worked hard and volunteered on committees in town. Where do you see Bradford in the future?

Both agreed that they do not know the answer to that question but that we need new business in town. There was agreement that they would stay here because the climate was changing with global warming and there were too many catastrophic events everywhere. Nature was sending tornadoes, hurricanes, floods, etc. Jane and Don agreed that Bradford was a good place climate-wise to stay. Add to that, the turndown in the economy and the real estate market in the condition it is now. It's not a good time to try to sell and move.

Q. It was really good to talk to both of you and learn your history and thoughts. Do you want to add anything to what we have discussed?

Bradford is a good place. We have lived in a lot of places and traveled extensively. The local people are nice. Life isn't perfect but we are still married and Jane is the best thing that ever happened to me. Jane agreed and said, "We've been married 56 years. The reason must be that we don't always see eye to eye on everything thing but we love each other."

Town Hall Restoration Committee (THRC)

The THRC reviewed four "requests for proposals" from firms interested in providing "the architectural services to evaluate the Bradford Town Hall and complete design recommendations to restore the building to code compliance" as voted at Town Meeting.

The Committee presented its unanimous recommendation to the Board of Selectmen who voted to award the contract, within the amount appropriated, to Richard M. Monahan, Jr., AIA, Architects.



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Selectmen's Highlights

Personnel Manual: Selectmen reviewed and signed a comprehensive revision to the manual.

Highway Department: Two members of the road crew – Phil Redman and Foreman Houghton – resigned from the department in recent weeks. Road Agent Jeff Remillard suggested that a part-time person be hired on a call basis, with a full time hired by September. The part-time position will be posted in house as outlined in the Personnel Manual.

Work continues on Pleasant Valley Road ditches. Robert Manchester asked if there is any way to limit or ban heavy truck traffic on that road. The Road Agent received estimate for shimming of that road - \$50,100, which would use the balance in that fund. Selectmen unanimously agreed that the money should not be used for one project at this time. The Road Agent was given direction to use the funds for small projects as needed.

He will see about repairing the sides of the walkway to the Community Center that were torn up last winter and is working on an agreement with Warner to trade off use of Bradford's long arm mower for the use of their street sweeper.

Andrew Pinard requested that the

sand on the sidewalks be removed as it is a hazard. Pinard requested police monitor people parking on the sidewalks, specifically in front of the Masonic Hall, the Bank and the Community Center around 5 pm.

Transfer Station: At a non-public session the Selectmen, by a two to one vote, promoted Lois Kilnap to the position of Transfer Station Manager with all benefits associated with full time employment.

Brown Memorial Library: Selectmen approved Garry Kalajian as an alternate member of the Trustees for a one year term.

Tax Map Errors: Selectmen accepted an offer from Perry Teele to work out a system to correct errors on the tax map. He presented three initial corrects and asked for comments on the form.

Budget Committee: Chair Dick Keller commented on concerns from the Committee following a review of the first quarter expense report. Several lines are over budget at this point in time. He suggested the Selectmen might follow this a little more closely. Selectmen agreed to review the issues presented and respond to the Budget Committee's concerns.

Warrant Article Thirty Two:

Bindy Glennie presented letters for the Selectmen's signatures to carry out the resolution approved at town meeting to inform Bradford's Congressional Delegation that Bradford does not recognize corporations as being entitled to the protections or "rights" of human beings.



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A Culinarian's Column *by Caryl Walker*

This was always a popular dish for large brunch caterings at school. You put it together, refrigerate it overnight, and bake it the next morning. I made it Sunday for coffee hour at church and it was a hit! People asked for the recipe and my reply was, "I'll put it in the Bridge." So here it is, kind of bread pudding, kind of French toast!

Blueberry Brunch Bake 10 to 12 Servings

1 pound day-old French bread, cut in ½ inch cubes
 12 oz. (1 ½ cup) fresh or frozen blueberries
 12 ounces cream cheese, softened
 ½ cup plain, vanilla, OR blueberry yogurt
 8 eggs, slightly beaten
 ½ cup sour cream
 1 teaspoon vanilla extract
 ½ teaspoon cinnamon
 ½ cup milk
 1/3 cup maple syrup



1. In a greased, shallow 3-quart baking dish, place half of the bread cubes. Sprinkle with the blueberries.
 2. In a large mixing bowl, beat cream cheese until smooth. Beat in the eggs, yogurt, sour cream, vanilla, and cinnamon. Gradually add milk and maple syrup.
 3. Pour half of the egg mixture over the bread. Top with the remaining bread and egg mixture. Cover and refrigerate overnight.
 4. Remove from the refrigerator at least 30 minutes before baking. Preheat oven to 350oF.
 5. Cover and bake 30 minutes. Uncover and bake 30- 40 minutes longer, until knife inserted in center comes out clean and top is slightly crusty. Let stand 5 minutes.
 6. Serve with additional maple syrup, blueberries and a dollop of whipped cream. Yummy!
