



Preserving Bradford's Past, Building Bradford's Future



Preliminary estimates for restoration of Bradford's Town Hall are being reviewed by the Town Hall Restoration Committee. The plan under consideration includes many items not fully covered in the proposal approved by a majority of Bradford voters last March: new roof, complete re-paint of building, Limited Use/Limited Access Elevator (LuLa to its friends), fully accessible bathroom on second floor, sprinkler system, granite veneer, generator, first floor air conditioning, robust envelope (additional energy efficiency), Heat Recovery Ventilation (HRV) air exchange.

Grants have been applied for and fund-raising is well underway to offset as much of the financial cost as possible. Details will be forthcoming from now until Town Meeting next March.

Michael Bruss, Construction Manager for the project, outlined work to be done on the site – new well and septic system and provisions for handicapped parking with access to the front of the building.

The Building Committee, responding to questions about providing a full or partial basement under the building, recommends the placement of a full foundation under *only the rear portion* of the Town Hall. This decision, based on considerable research and consultation with industry professionals, was made for the following reasons:

- The design team undertook a full evaluation of the existing foundation, its support, timbers, and sills; and found that the foundation for approximately two-thirds of the front of the building is sound, dry, and stable. Therefore, because there has been very little, if any, movement of the building in that area for 150 years, foundation work there is not necessary.
- Disrupting the original granite foundation could jeopardize the receipt of certain historical grants for which we have already applied.
- The resulting basement space could be used only for storage, due to

Selectmen's Highlights

Town Hall Selectmen approved use of the Town Hall to sell holiday decorations on Sunday December 8 and Saturday December 14. Heat will be on and toilets available. Contract was signed with Bruss Construction as the Construction Manager for the restoration project.

Treasurer Marilyn Gordon reviewed the procedures required to deposit funds in the Town Hall Restoration Trust Account, which is handled by the Trustees of the Trust Funds. She stressed that careful record keeping is of great importance. A two-part form will be prepared to track donations.

Police Department On recommendation Chief Jim Valiquet, Selectmen approved hiring Neil Flanagan from Contoocook as a

full-time officer in Bradford. He was sworn in on November 22 and will attend the police academy for certification, which will be paid for by the COPS grant. Justin Crotty, a certified police officer from Manchester, was sworn in November 25 to serve as a part-time Bradford police officer.

Selectmen supported Chief Valiquet's request to continue the fire arms instruction class at the Valley property. Two firearms instructors will be on site for a maximum of twelve in a class.

Planning Board Selectmen were given the CIP (Capital Improvements Program) for 2014 with a request for professional assistance to help prepare this document next year. Central New Hampshire Regional Planning Commission (CNHRPC) offers

this service at a cost between \$3,000 - \$4,500. A warrant article will be considered.

A Planning Board brochure has been completed outlining the responsibilities of the board and will be available at the Town Office.

Shared Services Chair Harry Wright reported that the towns of Warner, Webster, Andover and Salisbury have discussed sharing some town services and formed a committee to look into group insurance and major purchases. John Pfeifle offered to attend the next meeting of the group.

Planning and Zoning Board Notes

Site Plan Approvals

Based on variances and Special Exceptions granted by the Zoning Board of Adjustment, the Planning Board approved two major site plan revisions for area businesses:

Bradford Depot Plaza At the site of the former Merrimack Farm Store, the plan submitted by owner John Gioldassis was approved. Portions of the old building, including the green house, will be removed and the train shed will be converted for four business units plus a two bed room apartment on the second floor. A 24-Hour ATM will be placed on the site of the sugar shack.

New signage was approved for the free standing towers and on the buildings with limitations

set for the hours and type of illumination on the Sugar River ATM.

Lumber Barn The next phase in up-grading the signs at the Lumber Barn were granted variances by the ZBA - a triangular sign for the Power Barn, three product signs on the north end of the building, and the addition of a California Paint sign to the existing tower. The tower lights will be on a timer.

The Planning Board approved the revision to the site plan allowing the sign permit to be granted.

Brochure A tri-fold brochure outlining the role of the Planning Board and its responsibility for subdivisions, site plans, and gravel pit permits has been

completed and is available at the Town Office. Many thanks go to all who worked on this project - originating with Sue McKevitt, editing by Board members, and computer generation by Erich Caron.

CIP The Capital Improvements Program for 2014 was completed and sent along to the Selectmen and the Budget Committee. It was recommended that professional assistance from CNHRPC be considered for the coming year.

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Hiking in Our Hometown

Bradford is favored with a distinct terrain of familiar vistas. We recognize these views and cherish the contours. Better yet, the sight of our horizon hills signals a comforting sense of going home.



Why not explore our rugged landscape on foot? There are several established trails and Class 6 roads that are open to the public, ready to explore year-round. Before the advent of the railroad, many of these roads provided the main access in and out of Bradford. They fell into disrepair when routes changed, providing us with a unique glimpse of the past. Passing stoic stone walls, you can imagine our forests as the farmland and pastures of yesteryear. Maps created and provided by the Conservation Commission are available at Brown Memorial Library. So grab your compass, don your pack, and hit the trail.

This article features Knight's Hill Trail in the southeast corner of town. There is access to the trail from the ends of both Rowe Mountain Road and County Road. This is basically a ridge walk with some fairly steep sections and a few damp spots.

There are views at either end as well as at the summit of Knight's Hill. Allow 2-3 hours to do the 2-mile traverse, which can be done from either end.

If you choose to start at the higher elevation of Rowe Mountain (also known as Rowe's Ridge), park at the height of land on Rowe Mountain Road and enter a grassy uphill path next to Lettvin's house. Be sure to look back over your shoulder at the stunning view of Lake Massasecum and Mount Kearsarge. Then look for new signage that directs you to turn right (west) and begin the Knight's Hill Trail. Keep an eye out for an impressive rock formation that may have been a livestock ramp. Twice, you will have the option to take another right (north) to descend into the Blitzer easement, which features a loop trail and ends where Rowe Mountain Road turns to dirt.

If you want to continue the traverse, follow the signs for Knight's Hill - Dunfield Road. Soon you will see a sign to head left (south) for an optional



½-mile spur trail to the summit of Knight's Hill. This is a mossy

new trail with flags, but no blazes, so pay attention. Enjoy the summit cairn and view of Pat's Peak, before retracing your steps to the main trail.

Eventually, you will cross the boundary into Low State Forest, which features informative signs about the natural history of the region. Then you will come to the intersection with Dunfield Road, which was a main thoroughfare a century ago. Look for remnants of at least three different homesteads in this area. The Knight family farm, which was still in use 60 years ago and for whom the hill was named, can be found ¼ mile south. This is a Class 6 road and can be traveled either way at this point. Right (north) takes you 1 ½ miles down a rocky washed-out route to Rowe Mountain Road. And left (south) takes you to County Road in about ½ mile, past a vista to the east of mighty Mount Monadnock.

TIPS:

Always be respectful of the property owners who have granted access to these landmarks.

Wear appropriate clothing, bring provisions, and hike safely. And have fun!

Town Clerk Update



Rahn and Anu and find out how they celebrated the winter holiday in Punjabi, India where they come from.

Q. Anu, I understand that your Christmas is named “The Festival of Lights” in India. Would you like to tell us about it?

We celebrated our holiday for a week in early November and in many ways it is similar to your Christmas. We exchange gifts and it is named “The Festival of Lights.” The gifts are toys and clothes but also sweets as part of the giving. We worship morning and evening for one week. We have Christmas lights and fireworks as well. The day of celebration is called “Diwali.” We are Hindu and Ashna, when she marries, will have an arranged marriage but if she meets someone she loves we will consider her wishes.

Q. Anu. Tell me about your early years in Punjabi?

I was raised as the youngest of six children. There are two sisters and three brothers. Since the family was so large my seventeen year old sister helped to raise me and my older brother would walk me to school. Vasu Dev Seisi, my older brother works at the Newbury store and people there call him Mike. I attended school and college in India. The college was Kamla Nehru College and I finished with a BA in Art. General courses were also part of my education and the curriculum included embroidery, cooking, painting and drawing.

Q. Anu. Why did you come to the United States?

My friends were marrying and going to London and Toronto, Canada. I came to the United States because my oldest brother Vasu was living in Queens, New York. He drove a cab. I stayed with him and cooked and

kept house for him. I found a job at a stationary store. I was in my early twenties.

Q. Anu. How did you meet your husband Rashon?

I met Rashon in 1990. A friend introduced us, but it was a traditional arranged marriage in Forest Hills, Queens. We moved to Fowler, California, a small town near Los Angeles. We owned and worked in a food market until 1996. Ashna was born in Los Angeles and went to kindergarten there for one year. We didn't enjoy living in California although we owned a motel there; it wasn't where we wanted to live. In 2002 the family moved to Bradford and bought Cobble Pond Farm, which is now Bradford Market. Roshan came first and commuted between Los Angeles and Bradford. Then Jesse came over and joined Roshan at the market. The commuting was too hard for him so we decided to move to Bradford. We had a difficult time finding a place to live but eventually we found an apartment and Ashna attended first grade at the Bradford school. But, she didn't stay too long in the Bradford School. We decided to send her to Mt. Royal Academy in Sunapee. She wants to study medicine and become a doctor. She is very active in Student Government and plays basketball. She is currently looking at colleges and also inquiring for a scholarship. Emmanual College in Boston is her first choice but she is applying at several other schools including St. John's in Queens, New York, Boston College, and Albany College in New York

Q. Ashna. Are you ready for college? Tell me about your activities at Mt. Royal Academy?

I have many friends at Mt. Royal. It is like a little family. I am ready for college next year and I hope to get a scholarship and study medicine. I am currently on the basketball team

at school and I love it. We have practice all week. I also love to ski and play soccer. I don't really enjoy cross country skiing.



Q. Ashna, how do you feel about the arranged marriage which is the custom in your family?

I feel fine with the idea. I know that my parents will consider my wishes and feelings.

Q. Anu: Your life seems so busy. I know that you work at both Bradford and Newbury stores. What are your duties at the stores?

I train new help, order food, manage bills and cleaning as necessary.

Q. Anu. Your Indian food is so good. Would you like to talk about some of the things that you prepare at home and for the store?

I make bread every day at home. We eat bread at every meal. We also eat many of our vegetables. When I don't have time for cooking I buy frozen food at an Indian supermarket in Waltham, Massachusetts. It is sometimes difficult to work every day and prepare meals. I make Naan bread and other Indian breads which are all very good. Our meals are served twice a week on Wednesdays and Fridays and usually we have a very good business on those days. People seem to like our Indian food.

Q. Anu, tell me about your relationships in India.

In India cousins are like sisters. Rashon is Jesse's uncle and Ashna is his cousin.

Q. Anu. Ashna is Hindu and she attends Mt. Royal Academy which is a Catholic school. Is that confusing for her?

I don't believe that it is confusing. There are no Hindu temples nearby. She attends Catholic School but she knows and celebrates her Hindu religion at home. We celebrate our religion at home but she also understands the Catholic religion. It is not a problem for her. The nearest Hindu Temple is in Boston. Our "Puja" which is the place of worship, is celebrated every morning and every evening at home.

Q. When the interview was completed I discovered that we only had nine questions. It was an interesting meeting with our friends and neighbors and since there is no tenth question. I just wanted to say that it was a joy to meet and speak with Anu and Ashna. Rashon preferred to leave the interview to his wife and daughter, but he was pleased that we asked him to participate in the article for the Bridge.




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Surface Water
Chapter Seven of the Natural Resources Inventory
Bradford Conservation Commission

'Surface water' refers to our lakes, ponds, streams, and rivers. (These are related to, but different than, wetlands such as swamps and marshes.) Town planning and landowner actions at the shores of surface water have long term effects on flood control, erosion, nutrient runoff, and drinking water quality. The full version of the Natural Resources Inventory describes all this in more detail; see [<> www.bradfordnh.org >>](http://www.bradfordnh.org) Town Boards >> Conservation Commission.

Bradford lies entirely within the greater watershed of the Contoocook/Merrimack River. The town has one large lake (Lake Massasecum – 401.7 acres) and part of a second large lake (Lake Todd) within its borders. The views and recreational opportunities provided by these two lakes are important to the identity of the town. In addition, there is Ayers Pond, Mud Pond, Brown's Marsh, Lovewell Lake, and a ten acre pond on the Kisakanari Easement. Numerous smaller 'wild' ponds and dozens of man-made ponds exist in town.

Bradford relies on a volunteer Fire and Rescue squad. In addition to the dry hydrants next to the fire station and at the outlet of Lake Massasecum, the safety of our town depends on 26 dry hydrants at small ponds or streams scattered throughout town.

The two large streams in town - Hoyt Brook and West Branch Brook - along with the outlets of Lake Massasecum and Lake Todd, create the Warner River. These brooks come together over Bradford's primary aquifer – a possible future source of public drinking water. This soil type is especially vulnerable to pollution – thoughtful town planning is important in this area.



Bradford at this time does not specifically protect its surface waters except for those public waterways under the jurisdiction of the State. All town residents should be concerned about residential, commercial, and agricultural practices that contribute to surface water pollution and groundwater pollution as well. Meaningful protection to keep our waterways healthy should include the following:

- Naturally vegetated buffers for all waterways; stabilization practices for any unstable steam banks.
- Construction setback requirements for streams and ponds based on current Best Management Practices, adjusted as needed for soil type, slope, and vegetation type;
- Modifying the Zoning Ordinance to limit the maximum amount of impervious surface per lot.
- Developing and adopting an Aquifer Protection Overlay Zoning District, as recommended under Groundwater Chapter 10.

life-safety and building code restrictions; and the full basement would exceed the storage needs for the Town.

- Additional basement space would require more automatic fire sprinklers. More sprinklers mean a larger water cistern and fire pump, which would increase the cost of the project.

While it is true that the cost of added basement space would be less per square foot than building a new space elsewhere, it is still a significant cost, for which there is no pressing need.


One method for predicting the severity of the approaching winter is to consult the Farmer's Almanac. Another is to observe the industriousness of your neighbors. Using the latter method and judging by the volume of Dave's cordwood so far, I would guess that it will not be a hard winter. However, both of these predictors are imperfect.

Persistent folk wisdom insists that a long-range forecast can be made based on the width of the center band on a wooly bear caterpillar. My research into the matter reveals that upon spring hatching this burnt orange band is barely discernible. After molting several times over the summer the band of color widens. Thus, although you cannot guess the snowfall of the approaching winter, careful, summer-long observation of these caterpillars will let you know that winter is in fact nigh – if you hadn't noticed by other, more obvious evidence.

The adult stage of the larval wooly bear caterpillar is the attractive but inconspicuous Isabella tiger moth. The moths mate, lay eggs, and these hatch into adorable tiny wooly bears. They initially dine in a family group on grass and weeds before dispersing. After their final molt they weave a silken cocoon interlaced with all those bristles. Two

weeks later the moth works its way out and up into the sky. Because there are two broods of caterpillars each summer, the sight of that wide reddish band in July does not mean imminent cold weather. It is the second brood in September and October that is suddenly visible everywhere. Moving along at 0.05mph, which is fast for a caterpillar, they curl into a defensive hedgehog position and glide right out of your hand on their spiky pelts. In motion they look like they've misplaced their cell phones and desperately need to call home.

energy stores of glycogen to the forms of antifreeze - glycerol and sorbitol. This protects them to about fifteen degrees below zero. They may also be able to perform a more complicated and unusually rapid 'super-cooling' that involves removing any 'nucleation' sites where killing frost crystals can form. This can see them through degrees of twenty below. Most other moths and butterflies survive the winter as eggs or in cocoons. The cocoon ensconced pupae of the Isabella tiger moth however wouldn't last five minutes in a freezer.



They are not lost. This is the generation responsible for locating suitable bivouacs to survive the winter. Wooly bears are one of those magical animals that can survive repeated freezing. One of their strategies is to convert their

In tiny heads that contain nothing resembling a brain, they have calendars. In the dead of winter a coddled wooly bear warmed up and given enticements of food and drink will refuse to uncurl. Somehow, with no practice beforehand, they know that waking up and spinning that cocoon before March warms the air is a really bad idea.

In theory then, you can predict the arrival of winter by the width of the center band on an autumnal wooly bear – and the arrival of spring by their encasement in silk.



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Bradford Bog Repair Day
