John D. Pfeifle 1949-2020



John died on January 16, 2020, in the peaceful setting of the Jack Byrne Center in Lebanon, NH surrounded by family: his wife, Mel, of 50 years, and his three sons; Trask, Bret and Jeb.

John was a dynamic and kind person, passionate about all that life had to offer. In addition to his sons, John had three wonderful daughters-in-law and eight grandchildren that were never far from his thoughts. He adored each of them and took great pride in their successes.

John spent most of his childhood in the outdoors of Maine at Sugarloaf Mountain and later went on to boarding school at Holderness where he was the school president and captained two sports, lacrosse and skiing. From Holderness, he went on to join the class of 1971 at Dartmouth College where he lettered in skiing and was a member of Theta Delta Chi and The Senior Society, Sphinx. While at Dartmouth, he married Mel Hinman and developed lasting friendships. After graduating from Dartmouth, John moved to Bradford, NH and went to work for Universal Packaging, now known as Graphic Packaging. He was promoted to plant manager of their Bow, NH facility at the young age of 26 and went on to become Vice President of Manufacturing when his longtime boss, Glen Dillon, retired. Upon the later retirement of Jack Hutton, he was named President of what is now Graphic Packaging's folding carton division. John was a mentor to many of the company's current executives. He continued to pursue innovation technology in the folding carton industry.

John was a current selectmen in Bradford, where he resided for the last 50 years, and an active selectmen for the past 17 years where his town meeting attendance was nearly perfect for his entire tenure. As a town leader, he used his business talents and experience to support the town and most importantly to him, all of the town employees.

John was an avid sportsmen, as well as a private pilot with a seaplane rating. He loved fly fishing, hunting and skiing almost as much as the people that he shared each of these hobbies alongside. This has become part of his legacy that lives on through his family as they continue to embrace his passions. A memorial reception in honor of John and his legacy was held January 24 at Mount Sunapee.

"But pleasures are like poppies spread, You seize the flow'r, its bloom is shed; Or like the snow falls in the river, A moment white—then melts forever; Or like the borealis race, That flit ere you can point their place; Or like the rainbow's lovely form Evanishing amid the storm. Nae man can tether time or tide..."

Recycling Paper Safely

Some residents of Bradford have metioned that they burn mixed paper in their woodstoves or fireplaces to start their fires or to enhance the BTU's of the flame. Knowing that some mixed paper products are made with chemicals and dyes that become dangerous to our health when they are insufficiently burned, I did some research to obtain more definitive answers.

First, all modern wood stoves and furnaces are independently safety-tested and certified based on burning only clean, dry, uncoated wood and just enough plain newspaper to get fires started. Further, none of the safety features, instructions, or clearances provided by manufacturers are valid if the stove or furnace, including those having a catalytic combustor, is used as an incinerator. And, further, the chemical cocktail of vapors resulting from burning non-wood fuel can corrode stove parts, clog up the firebox, and prevent catalytic combustors from functioning properly.

Second, woodstoves and furnaces do not destroy the harmful inks, plastics, dyes, and fluorine that are used for manufacturing, coloring and printing of paper products. In fact, the relatively low heat of woodstoves and fireplaces creates caustic emissions such as:

- Dioxins, highly toxic stable chemicals, and
- PFAS, synthetic chemicals found in many products such as food packaging, household items and stain resistant items.

These airborne chemicals settle in soils, water, and humans creating a host of serious health problems.

The Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center ships its mixed paper and cardboard to a paper mill that makes new paper products without creating the dangerous dioxins and PFAS that woodstoves and furnaces emit into the atmosphere. Just a reminder: beer boxes must be put into the compactor. Ken and I welcome your mixed paper for proper and safe recycling.

What will the housing market do in 2020?

The NH Realtor Association (www.nhar. org) tracks state-wide and individual county sales year to year. In 2018, the

state saw 17,555 housing units sold. The median price was \$283,000 with an average of 61 days on the market. Comparably, the 2019 statistics show sales of 17,615 units, a median price of \$300,000 and an average of 56 days on the market. Merrimack County was up 16% in the number of sales to 2,000, up 3.8% in median price to \$270,000 and down 14% to 50 days on the market.

Land sales were fairly steady with 8 in 2018 and 7 in 2019. The range was a low of \$10,000 for .61A to a high of 75A for \$110,000.



The total number of residential sales for 2019 were 32 (37 in 2018). At the present time, there are 5 properties on the market with 3 Under Contract. Because the inventory was low, some communities experienced fewer sales, but in many there were a rise in the median price. Supply and demand at its best.



Michael and his three siblings integrated the Oyster River School District on the same day as Little Rock, Arkansas. Their family faced a myriad of challenges, some expected, some not. But in doing so, they were able to demonstrate that they were "regular people," and could be relied on as part of the community. At the request of his father before his passing, Michael has written and published their family history in "Sketches of Lee." His book will be available at the library prior to the program.

Saturday, February 15th, 11am, Understanding Bobcats in NH with Dick Wright. This presentation covers a brief history of wildlife in NH, the Sport Fish Restoration Program, bobcat natural history, research, and management in NH.

Wednesday, February 19th, 7pm, Book Group. For Black History Month we are reading two books this month: *Between the World and Me* by Ta-Nehisi Coates and *Born a Crime* by Trevor Noah. I'm looking forward to both reads and the discussion to follow.

If you're looking for something to do during February break, we'll have a movie, craft, and a snack available from 3-5pm. Come down, see a few friends, and hang out at the library.





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Obituaries



Daniel William O'Leary

Daniel William O'Leary, 72, unexpectedly died at home with his wife, Nancy Kathryn (Lewis) O'Leary present, on December 14, 2019, the day of their 50th wedding anniversary. Known as Dan, he was Danny to childhood friends and family, Mr. O'Leary or Mr. O to students, Coach to the KRHS softball team, and Poppy to cherished granddaughters.

Dan and brothers, Paul, Gerald and John were raised in Somerville, MA, the children of John and Katherine Agnes (Otto) O'Leary, Sr. Dan's education and career were rooted in his Classics education at Boston College High School where he studied Latin, Greek and German. Dan received a BA in German Language and Literature from Boston College in 1968 and a Masters in English Education from Boston State College in 1975.

Dan married Nancy, had two children, was drafted, served in Vietnam and was a salesman for Beatrice Foods. Dan had many objections to the war in Vietnam, not the least of which was that his daughter was five months old when he saw her for the first time.

Having grown up in the city, Dan said he couldn't sleep for a week after moving to rural New Hampshire because it was so quiet and dark. He moved here in 1975 for his first teaching job at an

open concept high school with no walls, Kearsarge Regional High School (KRHS). He taught English and Latin for 30 years and critical concepts such as "semper ubi sub ubi" He introduced students to John Irving, Ernest Hemingway, John Steinbeck and Kurt Vonnegut. His caring, empathetic, supportive and involved approach to education is displayed in the hundreds of tributes from former students and colleagues posted since his death. Although humble and unassuming, Dan would have been touched to see how many lives he impacted. His kind and giving nature served as a role model for his students who became teachers, exponentially growing a vast legacy.

During the KRHS years, Dan spent his summers on ladders and scaffolding as part of the unofficially named Flying Zucchini Brothers Painting Company (named for the fact that they had each fallen from the ladder while working) with his friends and colleagues, Albert and Dan, along with many teachers needing to earn extra income painting houses. Dan taught at New Hampshire College (now Southern New Hampshire University in Manchester) during 20+ years as an adjunct professor of English and Education. Dan was currently teaching Latin at Trinity High School in Manchester. He started there in 2008 after realizing that he could not turn off the desire to teach after leaving KRHS. This was to be his final year at Trinity as he was going to make another attempt to retire.


Excerpts from "In Memoriam Dan O'Leary"

MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Cemetery Maintenance Funds The Board approved a motion that Bradford will no longer collect money for perpetual care but rather collects funds to be deposited in the Cemetery Maintenance Care Expendable Trust Fund.

Town Meeting Will be held on Saturday, March 14, 2020 at 9am.

Signs The Board approved a motion to move forward with getting estimates for three new "Welcome to Bradford" signs.

Building Permit Fees The board approved 2-0 to increase the building permit project cost fee to \$7 per \$1000, as of January 1, 2020. John Pfeifle abstained from the vote stating that he would like to see comparison rates for other towns and ensure that the \$7 amount will cover the Building Inspectors costs.

Fire Department Funds The Board approved, per RSA 32:7:7, that any unspent appropriation from Bradford's 2019 Warrant Article 23, which covered the hiring of a part-time Fire Chief and compensation for the Fire Department, shall be encumbered for 2020.

Vacation Time The board approved a motion to update the Personnel Policy, beginning January 1, 2020, to allow one week of vacation time to be transferred over to the new year and eliminate vacation payouts. The board did approve a one-week vacation time payout for the Road Agent as he was unable to present to the Selectmen prior to the policy change as he had been plowing during Select Board meetings.

New Committee The Select Board appointed Kathleen Bigford, Sue Reeder Moss, Sue McKevitt, Michael James, Michael Bauer, Marcia Keller, Richard Olohan and Brad Keller to the newly formed Alternative Energy Committee.

Timber Tax Warrants signed for Map 5 Lot 37, Map 11 Lot 27, Map 9 Lot 47-1, Map 6 Lot 116, Map 7 Lot 70, and Map 10 Lot 10.

BUDGET COMMITTEE

Resignation Courtney Schusler resigned from the Budget Committee.

Department Reviews The Committee met with department heads from the Fire Department and the Rescue Squad to review their budgets. Discussion was had around combining the Fire Dept and Rescue Squad budget lines as they operate as one department. Software costs are increasing for the department and there is a need to replace their radios as they are approaching 20 years old and having operational and support issues.

Public Hearing The committee continues to review the budget line items comparing previous years' spending and making recommendations for 2020. A Public Hearing will be held on January 30, 2020 to review the 2020 Budget, with a continuance date of February 6, 2020 if needed.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Project List The committee has prioritized the projects they plan on addressing in the coming months. Three areas of focus are developing a recreational trail map promoting Bradford, expanding on the celebration of the Halloween/ Fall season, and promoting financial incentive tools such as the Community Development Tax Incentive Program and developing an Economic Revitalization Zone.

PLANNING BOARD

Hearing Continued The Planning Board held a public hearing regarding Accessory Dwelling Units on January 14, 2020. No members of the public were present and the ADU document needs to be put into zoning board format so the hearing will be continued at the next Planning Board meeting on January 28, 2020.

Master Plan Update The Board reviewed the History and Culture, and Community Facilities chapters of the master plan.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Variance Accepted The Board accepted an application for a variance to Article III, Section D:3 and D:4, regarding established setback criteria in the Bradford, NH Zoning Ordinance to facilitate construction of a two-bedroom, single family, home, in a Rural Residential District, located at Map 22/ Lot 3A. A public hearing will be held at the next ZBA meeting on February 5, 2020.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Taxes The Commission discussed how to facilitate the collection of the Land Use Change Tax.

Bradford Bog Trail guide has been updated.



Collaboration The Conservation commission is looking into working with other town groups on a coordinated town trail approach.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Building Maintenance The Trustees approved quotes from Kilted Builders for the installation of exterior doors and Sentry Roofing for roof repairs.

PARKS AND RECREATION

Blood Drive Red Cross Blood Drive will be held at the Bradford Area Community Center on February 8, 2020 from 9am-2pm.

Meeting Schedule The committee voted to meet every other month on the second Thursday of the month at 5:30pm. The next meeting will be March 12, 2020.

ALTERNATIVE ENERGY COMMITTEE

Purpose The Committee had their first meeting and agreed that their purpose is to find the best way for The Town of Bradford to save on electricity and thereby reduce the town's carbon footprint.

KEARSARGE REGIONAL SCHOOL DISTRICT

Unanticipated Revenue The School Board held a public hearing regarding unanticipated revenue funds of \$40,193.12 from Title IVA Funds. There was no comment from the public and the funds were approved as presented.

Water Treatment The Board approved the purchase recommendation presented by Second Wind Water to install a mitigation system not to exceed \$30,000, that will bring the KRMS PFOA tests down to, or below, the recommended twelve parts per trillion by NH Department of Environmental Services. Testing determined that the well at the Middle School is the source of PFOA contamination, though the levels are below the national standard for PFOA levels.

Deliberative Session The Annual School District Meeting was held on Saturday, January 4, 2020. Warrant articles for March 10 ballot were reviewed.
