MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Scholarship Fund The Board accepted \$100 in donations for the Scholarship Fund.

Board Members Andrew Pinard was appointed as the third Selectmen and will serve as Chair of the Board.

Committee Representatives The Select Board assigned committee representatives and department liaisons. Selectwoman Mel Pfeifle will serve as ex-officio to the Planning Board and the Economic Development Committee, and as liaison for the Police Department. Selectwoman Marlene Freyler will serve as ex-officio to the Budget Committee and as liaison for the Highway Department and Transfer Station. Andrew Pinard will serve as liaison to the Fire Department.

Meeting Schedule The Board plans to meet every 2nd and 4th Monday of the month at 6:00pm.

Rail Trail Harry Wright updated the Board on the Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) grant application and said things are in good shape. Mel Pfeifle asked for confirmation that the Rail Trail will have snowmobile access and Tim Blagden, Friends of the Lake Sunapee Rail Trail, confirmed that it will absolutely be used for snowmobiles.

Water Level The Board approved a motion to provide permission for the State to put in a water level monitor on Lake Massasecum.

Event Request The Board approved a request to hold a wedding on the front

Work Resumes on Bement Covered Bridge



After an 8 week cold weather hiatus, work on the Bement bridge is back in full swing. The work is now focused on preparing granite foundation blocks and stacking them into position to build the new north abutment. Other phases to be completed are finishing the timber framing of the lower cord, adding new timber decking and finishing the exterior siding.

The Selectmen extend their deepest appreciation to Melissa Cunningham for her many years serving the Town in the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's Office. We wish her and her family well as they embark on new adventures!

The Board of Selectmen also thanks Harry Wright for his hard work in completing the 2021 Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) grant on behalf of the Town. The grant request is for \$1.25 million to rebuild sidewalks on part of West Main Street and complete the section of the Rail Trail between West Main Street and Center Road

Following the failure of the Zoning Amendment at last month's election, the Board is re-examining the needs of the Town with regard to building inspections and code enforcement. A new position is being developed and will be posted soon.

Lastly, you are invited to Meet the Selectmen via Zoom on April 14th. This is a great opportunity to get to know the Board members and share with them your ideas, concerns etc. Watch the Town's website for the time and Zoom information of the meeting.



Disposal of Town Owned Lots

On the Town Warrant this year Article 27 requests disposal of six of Bradford's town-owned lots. These lots were created before there were subdivision regulations and could not have been created for building lots today due to either their wetland, landlocked, or steep slope conditions. We feel that the best use of these lots would be to offer them for sale to abutters on the condition that they not be used for building lots. To offer them on the market would create the same issues that caused them to be abandoned to the town and possibly open the town to legal problems.

One lot, Map 9/Lot23, of five acres is land-locked, partially wet, and abuts other properties that the town holds for conservation, education, and recreation purposes. The town should retain this unbuildable lot behind the Pearl Town Forest under the umbrella of the Conservation Commission to develop these potentials for public use.



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Gardening Tips

The snow is melting, the days are getting warmer and the sun is setting later... only one thing comes to my mind! GARDENING!!! April is when we all get the "itch"... But what can we do? We all know that winter isn't through with us quite yet! Here are some great ideas:

April is a great month to get your garden beds prepared! Build a raised bed! Or Two!!! Start by purchasing rough cut 2x10 inch spruce or hemlock lumber at your local lumber yard. I would recommend lining the inside boards with plastic to help protect the integrity of the wood and to slow down any future rotting. Fill the beds with a mixture of screened loam and compost (both of which you can purchase either bagged or in bulk at 5 Acres) And boom...
You'll be ready to plant!

You can sow any early spring crop seeds this month (once the ground is workable). Spinach, Swiss Chard, Lettuce, Peas, Beets, Radish, Kale, Onions, Kohlrabi and Turnips are all great choices. Not interested in planting by seed? No problem! We will have a great selection of locally grown Cole crops in the greenhouse!

Don't have space for a garden? No problem! You can easily plant cold-hardy crops in a container! I would recommend using one of our bagged mixes like Happy Frog or Fafard Complete and add some compost or composted cow manure.

April is also the time to uncover your strawberries! Remove your winter mulch (but keep it handy in case of a late frost). Strawberry buds and flowers will be killed by a hard frost if left exposed, however research has shown that it is best to remove your mulch on the early end of the season to promote more flowers. Once mulch is removed, fertilize plants sparingly, applying 6 oz of organic nitrogen per 1,000 sq ft bed.

Start weeding! Chickweed and Quackgrass are two garden weeds that start growing early in the season and start producing seeds if left unchecked.

Need a pop of color? April is great time to plant pansies and violas! Stop in for a great selection of vibrant colors to spice up your outdoor space.

Not happy with how your lawn looks now that the snow has melted? We can help!

The first step? You have to decide whether you want to over seed or apply a pre emergent weed control... This is a big one! You cannot do both because the pre emergent weed control PREVENTS seeds from germinating. It can not distinguish the difference between a weed seed and a grass seed.

If you chose seeding, make sure you choose the correct seed type for your yard conditions (Is it sunny? Is it shady? Is your soil sandy?) Important note-NEVER buy cheap grass seed! It may save you a penny at first, but it is always filled with weed seeds and fillers! If you choose to eradicate the weeds you will be able to reseed in the summer.

I would also recommend sharpening your mower blades in April and getting a soil test done. Stop down with a sample and we would be happy to test your PH for free!!

In the end, remember that Rome was not built in a day! Be proud of all of the progress that you are making and enjoy the time you spend outdoors, working on your lawn and gardens. Soon your neighbors will be stopping in and asking what your "secret" is! (Which, of course, is all of the help you get when you visit 5 Acres!)

More Zero Waste Tips

Americans waste forty percent (40%) of the foods produced for consumption, according to a Northeast Resource Recovery Association (NRRA) bulletin sent to the Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center. Where does all this food waste go when it gets discarded?

- Food can be grown from food preparation scraps. One example is greens grown from lettuce or Asian greens. Romaine lettuce is the easiest to regrow among the many varieties of lettuce. Just pop the end in water and watch it form new leaves. Another example is potato plants grown from the eyes of potatoes carved out (with a chunk of the potato "meat" attached to the eye) and placed in soil.
- Plant fertilizer can be made and used at home. Eggshells contain calcium carbonate, iron, zinc, magnesium, sulfur, phosphorus, and manganese. Let the eggshells steep in water for 24 hours, then use the water to fertilize houseplants and garden plants. Any remaining water can be tossed onto the compost pile. (Hint: Eggshells steeped longer than one day will cause a foul odor!)
- Coffee grounds are rich in nitrogen

and are especially beneficial to hydrangeas, azaleas, roses, blueberries, carrots, and radishes. Worms love coffee grounds and will rototill the soil in search of it. Coffee grounds should be put to good use and not wasted.

- Cardboard placed under some mulch is a great weed blocker. In addition, the moisture that it collects in the soil underneath attracts worms that the soil needs for aeration and fertilization. As the cardboard breaks down, it is composted into the soil.
- Water for plant use can be harvested using water barrels placed where water runs off the house or outbuildings. Place a screen on top of the barrel, so that mosquitos will not lay their eggs in the collected water.

The process of zero-waste is not just about saving the planet or money. It is about creating our own products from things that all too frequently get discarded as worthless. It is about being productive and, therefore, experiencing the reward of a job well done. It is about satisfying children's enthusiasm and interest in participating in zero-waste projects. It is about reclaiming the knowledge and expertise that served our ancestors so well, freeing their resources to advance our nation. And today we have the renewed opportunity to participate in this revived zero-waste process.

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Bradford Energy Committee suggestions for Spring Energy Saving Tips

April has arrived reminding us of the renewal spring brings to Bradford and all over the Northeast. The migrating birds return, the air warms and more daylight encourages the trees to sprout new leaves. Step outside, pause and just take it all in.

April is also the month we celebrate Earth Day. The first Earth Day, April 22,1970, marked the beginning of when we, as a society, celebrated our role in a healthy environment and how that also connects us to a healthy planet.

To celebrate Earth Day 2021 there are small things we can to do that will help conserve energy and contribute to a healthy environment. These little steps can help reduce our carbon footprint and lower our energy budget.

These spring energy saving tips come from the US Department of Energy. Happy Spring!!

Open windows. Opening windows creates a cross-wise breeze, allowing you to naturally cool your home without switching on air conditioners. This is an ideal tactic in spring when temperatures are mild.

Use ceiling fans. Cooling your home with ceiling fans will allow you to raise your thermostat four degrees. This can help lower your electricity bills without sacrificing overall comfort.

Cook outside. On warmer spring days, keep the heat out of your home by using an outdoor grill instead of indoor ovens.

Install window treatments. Window treatments such as blinds, shades and films can slash heat gain when temperatures rise.

Set the thermostat. On warm days, setting a programmable thermostat to a higher setting when you are not at home can help reduce your energy costs by approximately 10 percent.

The Bradford Energy Committee Supports Article 29 on the Town Warrant



We can keep our library cozy and warm, and save on energy too!

What is Article 29 on the 2021 Town Warrant all about?

The Bradford Energy Committee asked the town to commit to spending \$8,000 on Energy Savings Measures for the Brown Memorial Library, based on recommendations from an energy audit conducted under the NHSaves program in December 2020.

What will be the benefit?

- —The library will *cost less* to heat and cool.
- —Estimated *savings* to the town at todays' prices are \$744 every year.
- —Everyone in the library will be *warmer in the winter* and cooler in the summer.
- —The town will use *less fossil fuels*, and that's *good for the budget and for the planet!*

What did NHSaves recommend as Energy Savings Measures?

- —Interior storms and drapery in the office to eliminate the need for space heaters.
- —Reduce heat loss through ceiling insulation.
- —Reduce heat loss through foundation insulation.

What will it cost the town?

—The estimated cost is \$7,500-\$8,000.

But here is the cool thing...

After the work is done and paid for by the town, NHSaves will rebate 35% of that cost back to the town. That's a windfall of \$2,600-2,800 for the town! PLUS: Estimated savings over \$700 per year on heating costs for the library! (based on today's prices)

Who is the Bradford Energy Committee?

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


Friends of Brown Memorial Library



To the inhabitants of the Town of Bradford in the County of Merrimack in the said State qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Bradford Area Community Center on East Main Street in said Bradford, N.H. on Tuesday the ninth day of March next, at eight o'clock in the morning to act on the following articles:

Article One: To choose all necessary town officials for the ensuing year.

Article Two: Zoning Amendment - To see if the Town will vote to adopt provisions which seek to repeal the existing Bradford building code as proposed by the Select Board. The following question will appear on the Official Ballot:

"Are you in favor of the repeal of the existing Bradford building code as proposed by the Selectmen and supported by the Planning Board?

If this article is adopted, references to the Bradford building code, BOCA code, or local building code in other Town ordinances or documents will default to the State of New Hampshire building code (RSA 155-A).

The Select Board voted 2-1 to propose this repeal at its meeting on January 4, 2021.

The Planning Board voted 3 in favor, 1 abstention, to support this repeal.





Article Twenty-Eight: "New Hampshire Resolution to Take Action on Climate Pollution"

"We the town of Bradford hereby call upon our State and Federal elected representatives to enact carbon-pricing legislation to protect New Hampshire from the costs and environmental risks of continued climate inaction. To protect households, we support a Carbon Fee and Dividend approach that charges fossil fuel producers for their carbon pollution and rebates the money collected to all residents on an equal basis.

Enacting a Carbon Cash-Back program decreases long-term fossil-fuel dependence, aids in the economic transition for energy consumers, and keeps local energy dollars in New Hampshire's economy. Carbon Cash-Back has been championed by U.S. economists (January 17, 2019 WSJ) as the most effective and fair way to deliver rapid reductions in harmful carbon emissions at the scale required for our safety.

We expect our representatives to lead in this critical moment for the health and well-being of our citizens and for the protection of New Hampshire's natural resources upon which we all rely.

The record of the vote approving this article shall be transmitted by written notice to Bradford's State Legislators, to the Governor of New Hampshire, to Bradford's Congressional Delegation, and to the President of the United States, informing them of the instructions from their constituents, by Bradford's Select Board, within 30 days of this vote."

Article Twenty-Nine: To see if the Town of Bradford will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,000 for the purpose of implementing energy saving measures to reduce the annual energy consumption of the Brown Memorial Library as outlined in the Energy Audit of the Brown Memorial Library prepared in December 2020. This will be a non-lapsing appropriation per RSA 32:7, VI and will continue until the money is spent or December 31, 2026. By Petition. (Majority vote required.) Selectmen recommend. Budget Committee does not recommend.

Article Thirty: To see if the Town will vote to completely discontinue, under the provisions of RSA 231:43, any interest the Town may have had in that portion of Pierce Road between the east boundary of Map 18, Lot 33 and the intersection of Bible Hill Road. (Majority vote required.) Selectmen recommend.

Article Thirty-One: To see if the Town will vote to allow gates and bars to be placed on the Class VI section of Pierce Road under the provisions of RSA 231:45. This article is null and void with the passage of Article Thirty.

Article Thirty-Two: To see if the Town will vote to accept the reports of the Town Offices. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

lawn of the Bradford Center Meeting House on June 5, 2021. The Board approved this request providing they follow whatever COVID-19 protocols are in place at the time, follow the Town ordinance, and submit a security deposit. The Board would also like to require that they have porta potties.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT **COMMITTEE**

Zones The Committee discussed the proposed Economic Revitalization Zone (ERZ) map for the Town. Tax incentives within the zones would be used to promote a local business district. The two proposed zones cover East Main Street and a large section of property around and adjacent to the Transfer Station. The Committee hopes to submit it to the Select Board for approval in the next month or so and then submit to the state.

PLANNING BOARD

Site Plan The Board accepted the site plan application submitted by Pierre Hahn for property located at 48 West Road, Map 6/Lot 34.

Preliminary Discussion Kyla Hamill and Catherine De Vanes appeared for a preliminary discussion of a site plan review for the Bradford Junction and Café. No site plan for the previous business at that location was found. They plan a dine in and take out restaurant with a coffee bar, pastries and perhaps ice cream this summer. They are planning to complete a site plan application and hope to have it completed in March.

Modified Site Plan 5 Acres plans to add a 1,248 sq ft post and beam three-sided building with clear roof for flowers, and a 650 sq ft cover for hay and shavings. This requires a modified site plan and the Board agreed to expedite a Public Hearing for the first meeting in April.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Special Exception The Board approved a Special Exception to conduct commercial vegetable growing and agricultural education at 48 West Road, Bradford NH, Tax map 6 Lot 34.

Variance Application The Board reviewed a Variance to build a house on the shore of Lake Massasecum submitted by Dan Higginson of Higginson Land Services, for the property owner Richard Deschense. The property located at Map 7/ Lot 76 was previously proposed for this construction, denied by the Board, appealed by Mr Higginson/Mr Deschenes, and denied again. The Board reviewed the new application and unanimously voted to deny the acceptance on the grounds that it was not substantially different than the previous application.

Variance Approval The Board approved a variance from setback requirements for property located at 22 Massasecum Lake Road, Map 23/Lot 20. The approval has the following condition: In addition to the dry well system proposed to mitigate runoff from the new garage, the applicant will install and maintain an additional system to mitigate, through infiltration, runoff from the existing house, deck, and porch.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Boardwalk Thank you to Arthur Heino for the generous donation of boards for the boardwalk at the Bradford Bog and to George Beaton who will install the boards.

Road Salt Commission member Doug Southard has been in communication with Road Agent Steve Hall regarding road salt usage. Two types of salt are applied on Bradford roads: sodium chloride in winter for ice, and calcium chloride in summer to control dust on dirt roads. It appears that the sodium chloride has a detrimental impact on vegetation along roads. Further study is needed before making any suggestions to Steve.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Friends of BML The Board approved the revised Memorandum of Understanding between the Brown Memorial Library and the Friends of BML.

Easter An Easter Scavenger Hunt, in lieu of the traditional Easter Egg Hunt, is scheduled for Saturday, April 3, 2021 9:00am-1:00pm.

ENERGY COMMITTEE

Energy Audits The last three energy audits have been received. Costs for the energy saving measures are as follows: Fire Station \$13,185, Bradford Area



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Community Center \$10,385, and Highway Garage \$10,544. Committee will reach out to contacts at each location to review audit report and get feedback on support and concerns.


Field Trip The Board approved the motion to preliminarily give permission for the KRHS trip to Italy and Greece in 2022.

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From the Bradford Fire Department

In a new feature for the Bradford Bridge, Fire Chief Jeff LeBlanc will write about various safety topics and give training and call statistics for the previous month. This month's topic is chimney fire.

According to the National Fire Protection Agency (NFPA) more than 25,000 chimney fires occur annually causing over \$120 million dollars in damage nationwide. Although your chimney may look the same as others; heating appliance types vary, and include wood burning fireplaces, gas burning fireplaces, pellet and wood burning stoves.

What are the signs of a chimney fire?

A loud, crackling or popping noise from the chimney (imagine the sound of a large bonfire, low roar or an airplane or a distant freight train) A lot of dense, thick smoke coming into the fireplace and possibly into your home or out of the top of the chimney. Flames or things that are on fire (pieces of flaming creosote) coming from the top of the chimney.

How does a fire start in a chimney?

Chimney fires occur when creosote builds up or other debris catches fire inside the chimney. Conditions that encourage creosote buildup include burning unseasoned wood, restricted air supply (such as failing to open the damper), overloading the firebox, and fluctuating outside temperatures.

What do I do if I suspect a chimney fire?

It's always best to call 911 to notify the Fire Department and evacuate occupants of the home and close doors as you step outside. Depending on what type of heating appliance you have, if it is safe to do so, close the vents and air inlets to cut off the fire's oxygen source.

What the Fire Department does when they arrive at the scene of a chimney fire?

- Use ladders when it is required to access the roof.
- Access the top and bottom of the chimney.
- Visually inspect the chimney with a mirror to determine the extent of the fire
- Utilize chimney fire extinguishing methods.
- Check the carbon monoxide readings in the house with a CO detector.
- Ventilate the house to remove the products of combustion (smoke) as needed.

How do I help prevent chimney fires in my home?

- Schedule an annual chimney inspection by a qualified person.
- Clean your chimney if there is more than a 1/8-inch layer of build-up.
- Only burn materials that are designed for your heating appliance.

The Bradford Fire Rescue would like to remind all that having working smoke and carbon monoxide detectors saves lives and early notification to 911 during medical emergencies is paramount to ensure the best possible outcome in the event of sickness or injury. 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

Want Some Cash Back?

Are you shocked by how much we're spending to deal with extreme weather-related events and other problems caused by climate change? Have you ever wondered why we are footing the bill? Why not get those who are getting rich off fossil fuels pay the price? And why aren't we doing something to put an end to the carbon emissions that are causing these climate-related catastrophes to begin with before it's too late?

I believe the quickest, most efficient and effective way we can fight climate change is by enacting Carbon Cash-Back pricing. With Carbon Cash-Back pricing, fossil fuel producers are charged a fee at the source or port (if imported), and then all of the money collected is distributed to residents equally as monthly dividends. The fee starts out small and then gradually goes up a bit each year, so that companies can plan for it.

Of course, prices would rise with this approach, as companies deal with the new fee. But estimates are that most households would get back more in dividends than they would pay out in higher prices.

Most economists support the Carbon Cash-Back solution, including those you might be familiar with, like Janet Yellen and Alan Greenspan. That's because it works. It would get us to where experts say we need to get to by 2030, or what they call 'net zero'. And they know that doing nothing is very, very costly.

Carbon Cash-Back pricing is also a bipartisan solution. Republicans like it because it uses market forces and it isn't considered a tax (since the government doesn't spend it). They also like that there aren't a lot of 'big government' regulations. Democrats like it because it protects the family budget, particularly those of lower income families.

In addition, Carbon Cash-Back pricing allows market forces to solve many of the costly issues that are created when we change to green energy. Companies will not want to pay the carbon fee, so they'll figure out new ways of doing business. They can innovate with carbon-free energy and emissions-free technologies. And this, in turn, will create new, green jobs.

Lastly, another benefit and perhaps the most important, is the reach of Carbon Cash-Back pricing. Since this approach would also include a border adjustment where there would be a fee on imported fossil fuel products for countries that did not have a carbon fee, it would encourage those countries to create their own carbon pricing systems. And this is exactly what we need. We need the whole world to come together to fight this crisis. We are truly 'all in this together'.

Carbon Cash-Back pricing makes most other strategies designed to fight climate change either complementary or redundant. And if established as the base of our climate change pathway, it actually strengthens these other strategies.

We need to let our legislators know that we want the Carbon Cash-Back solution to climate change. But how can we do that? There IS something we can do.

At this year's Town Meeting there will be a warrant article entitled "Resolution to Address Climate Pollution with Carbon Cash-Back Pricing." If we can pass this, the Bradford Select Board will send this Resolution to our State Legislators, our Governor, our Congressional Delegation, and our President asking them to use cash-back carbon pricing to address the costs and risks of climate pollution. The Bradford Conservation Commission has endorsed it, as have 25 Bradford citizens.

Please vote 'YES' for the Carbon Cash-Back Pricing warrant article.

Congress is watching. Let's make Bradford's residents heard loud and clear. We want Carbon Cash-Back pricing so we can save the planet for our children and grandchildren.
