MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Street Signs Road Agent Steve Hall presented the Select Board with various options for new street signs. The current signs are only held with two bolts and get blown by the wind. The Board approved a motion to allow Steve to make changes to the road signs. Broken signs will be replaced as needed.

Goals The Board discussed their goals for the year. Selectmen Andrew Pinard suggested updating the Bradford Website and adding a google calendar. Selectwomen Marlene Freyler would like to hold a potluck to give the community an opportunity to come together. Selectwomen Mel Pfeifle would like to revisit fees for building permits, learn more about what Bradford is doing with gravel, and create Vision Bradford, a ten-year plan for the town with input from Town Boards and Committees.

Town Clerk Erika Gross was sworn in as Town Clerk/Tax Collector by Andrew Pinard.

Meeting Schedule The Board of Selectmen will meet the second and fourth Monday of the month. The Board will meet at 5pm during the summer and at 6pm the rest of the year.

Building Permits The Board approved a motion for the Select Board Chair to sign all future building permits until a building inspector is hired.

Taxes The Board signed the Tax Recommittal. There is currently \$168,173.50 in tax liens from 2012-2019. There is \$202,948.24 in unpaid property taxes for

The Bement Bridge move has been rescheduled and will now be slid back onto its abutments on Tuesday, April 27th at 8:00 am. Once set back into place, the remainder of the deck planks will be laid, fire retardant coating will be applied and the siding and portals will be completed. The last step will be to install the guardrail and roadway approaches. The bridge is expected to be open to traffic in early June.

During the week of May 10th there will be treework happening on Water Street. Please be aware of any potential delays due to rerouting.


Street sweeping will be in progress beginning in the end of April and extending into the first week of May, until it is complete.

A Teacher **Gets Vaccinated**

Hundreds of teachers and staff members were vaccinated against COVID-19 last month at the Steeplegate Mall in Concord. We were getting the Johnson and Johnson vaccine as part of the phase of New Hampshire's inoculation plan which prioritized school staff. As a newly retired teacher, back teaching part time two days a week, I was elated to get the vaccine.

I arrived 15 minutes before my scheduled time (the parking lot was packed) and got on line outside the old Sears store at the Steeplegate Mall. There were about 100 teachers and staff in line outside, donned in masks, on a chilly spring morning. There was a buzz, a crackle of excitement in the air as we waited for our turn to enter the vaccination site. I was sandwiched between two Concord teachers and we easily struck up a conversation about our day ahead. A physical education teacher was behind me and a school counselor in front.

The line moved with ease and within 30 minutes I was entering what I would call a vaccination zone: A small city of

hundreds of people in neatly formed lines snaking their way toward the shot. Volunteers manned tables and checkpoints to confirm appointments, look at paperwork and answer questions. Over 50 volunteers

were inside and as I snaked toward the nursing stations for the vaccine, the buzz seemed to quiet down. Each shot was administered in a private pod with a nurse, and a volunteer on a laptop. I was excited to get the one-shot Johnson and Johnson vaccine.

After the shot, I headed to another waiting area for 15 minutes to be observed for any side effects. I found some friends in that area and we talked while we waited. By the time I left and got to my car, I had only been gone an hour and drove home. No real side effects, just a bit tired the next day.

It was a very well organized event in a large space which could accommodate all that social distancing. I am sure there were in excess of 500 people in that Sears when I was there. Everyone seemed to be following protocol and as teachers and school staff, we like that. I am now back teaching, still in a mask, still behind a plexiglass divider with in-person students, and with new-found confidence each day.

Is This A Housing Bubble?

You might be wondering if the housing market will crash given the high demand, record prices, and bidding wars. The short answer is "there is no bubble." 
Recommendations:

Ice Out 2021

A different year, a different winter and very definitely, a different ice out from the previous forty years that I have watched from the shore of Lake Massasecum. Using Lake Winnipesuakee's method as a guide, judging although never actually doing, when a canoe could be paddled from the north end of the Lake and beached at the Casino.

Even with a mild winter and little snow, the ice fishermen were out for many weekend days, using colorful pop-up bob houses for shelter. Sunday, March 14 was very cold with gusty winds, alternating between blue sky and snow squalls so dense the other side of the Lake disappeared. The fishermen persisted and the green and blue bob houses did not blow over. As the daylight ended, the houses were dismantled and removed. The resident eagle stopped by to clean up whatever the fishermen had left – always a welcome sight.

Ten days later was very foggy and beginning to warm up a bit. The ice turned dark and looked very thin with water channels creating a maze if you tried to find your way through to open water. For a week the thin skim of dark ice drifted back and forth as the wind direction changed. On a windy day when most of the Lake was open and the wind was coming from the south, pieces of the white ice that had built up at the south end would break off and drift north until they melted.

Ice out was unofficially declared on April 1 – no fooling – within the usual time period.

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From the Bradford Fire Chief

When the warmer weather arrives, there is nothing better than the smell of food on the grill.

Seven out of every ten households in the U.S. have a grill or smoker, which translates to a lot of tasty meals. But it also means there's an increased risk of home fires. According to the NFPA, fire departments responded to 8,900 home fires involving grills, hibachis or barbecues, including 3,900 structure fires and 4,900 outside or unclassified fires last year. Bradford Fire Rescue would like to pass along a few tips to assist you in safely enjoying outdoor activities.

Can I use my grill inside my home, garage or under my porch?

No, propane and charcoal BBQ grills and smokers should only be used outdoors in well ventilated locations.

How close to my house can I have my grill?

When in use the grill should be placed at least 3-6 feet from combustible materials and well away from the home, deck railings and out from under eaves and overhanging branches. Keep young children and pets at least three feet away from the grill area, and never leave your grill unattended.

Do I need to clean my grill before I use it?

Yes, keep your grill clean by removing grease or buildup from the grill. Always make sure your gas grill lid is open before lighting it.

How do I check my gas grill myself?

Make sure the connections are made according to the manufacturer's recommendations. Turn on the tank. If you smell propane (distinct odor that smells like rotten eggs or cabbage) or hear any leaks shut the tank off. If gas is not smelled or heard apply a light soap and water solution to the hose and connections. If your grill has a gas leak, by smell or the soapy bubble test, and there is no flame, turn off the gas tank and have the grill serviced by a qualified person before using it again. If the leak does not stop, move away from the grill and call the fire department. Do not attempt to move the grill.

I have a charcoal grill. How should I prepare the briquettes?

Charcoal chimney starters allow you to start the charcoal using newspaper. If you use a starter fluid, only use charcoal starter fluid. Never use any other flammable liquids to start your grill. When you are finished grilling, let the coals completely cool before disposing in a metal container.

I have a small fire pit. Do I need a permit?

Yes, the State of New Hampshire requires that every person who kindles or causes to be kindled any fire, except when the ground is covered with snow, shall obtain a written fire permit from the fire department. This includes steel and iron fire pits because they are used to kindle Class A wood products. Contact the local fire warden or you can email us at *firechief@bradfordnh.org*





white - FOOTED MOUSE

In April, the jumping mice that spent the winter as folded furballs are starting to stir. All winter they were silenced by their personal anesthesia and stuffed into underground crevices, tunnels, and root margins. Life is hard though and a third of them may sleep on eternally.

Not as common as 'regular' mice, there are two species of jumping mice here, forest and meadow. I have tried to fit the word 'saltatorial' in here somehow but failed. It means 'adapted for leaping'. The forest jumping mouse can achieve an astonishing six-foot leap, the wet-meadow jumping mouse, a mere three. With overlapping habitats, both are primarily nocturnal and both resemble miniature kangaroos when headlighted bouncing across the road on their huge hind feet. Proceeded by their undershot profiles and followed by their long, long tails, the two species are virtually indistinguishable to us, but not to them, and probably not to the foxes, owls, and others that rely on them as comestibles.

The family Rodentia comprises a quarter of the species of animals on the planet. The bat family, Chiroptera, takes up another one fifth. For this reason alone, we can see how statistically they might be likely to be implicated as vectors in most of the world's pandemics.

Rodents are defined by their two-toned chisel-sharp teeth. (Rabbits and hares have different teeth and habits and are not rodents.) Two above and two below, these rodent-teeth are constantly elongating and are self-sharpening as they chew. Their long co-evolution with the nuts and seeds they eat has them engaged in an arms race millions of years old. Plants like oak trees attempt to

clearly seen on chipmunks in the fall, these same furry expandable pouches block splintered debris from choking the consumer. Inedibles are shunted out to the side.

Cohabitating with the local jumping mice, are two very common, traditional-looking mice – three if you manage to live with the more suburban house mouse. These last are entirely reliant on humans and are paralyzed with fear at the thought of experiencing the outdoors. Possibly they originated in India or thereabouts. It's been so long no one knows for sure.

Deer mice and white-footed mice are difficult for even biologists to tell apart. White-footed mice are more adept at swimming and deer mice are better at climbing trees. These are not practical tools for identification. Both species are nocturnal but they generally take different shifts with white-footed working the 7pm till 1am shift and deer mice from 1am till 7am.

The reproductive possibilities of the rodentia I have described here are nightmarish. They start young, birth many, and repeat virtually year-round. Someone who claims a head for math calculates a sum of 2,688 house mice resulting from a compatible pair in just six theoretical months. Obviously, they must live lives of chronic instability or we would be over our heads in small, furred bodies. Their lives are making the lives of so many others possible though – hawks, fox, owls, coyote, snakes and so on.

The two species of jumping mice and the two species of deer/white-footed mice have been around many millions of years longer than us and have made peace with their differences. Differences that we spend a lot of energy trying to understand and label because that's what we do. Meanwhile, we imagine great differences amongst our own single species of Homo sapiens when in fact, we are all one.

(Continued from page 1) 2020; \$2,542.34 in timber taxes for 2020 and \$221.25 in land use taxes. These property owners will be contacted by the tax collector.

Town Hall The Board accepted unanticipated revenue from the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) in the amount of \$200.00 The Board approved a motion to place the LCHIP funds into the Town Hall fund.

BUDGET COMMITTEE

Bement Bridge Chris Frey informed the committee that at Town Meeting he was going to recommend increasing the bridge budget line to \$280,000 since bridge construction costs came in higher than originally thought. This would put us over the 10% rule and Mr. Frey suggested tabling the town fire truck until next year. Committee member Tim McKenna asked why this was not brought to the Budget Committee. Town Administrator Karen Hambleton said it should have been a warrant article, but it was overlooked.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Facebook The Committee is in support of a pair of Facebook pages that were started, one for Bradford Businesses and one for the Bradford Community.

PLANNING BOARD

Members The Board approved a motion to appoint Doug Troy as a member of the Planning Board. Doug will fill the vacancy left by Mel Pfeifle. The Board appointed Katie Olohan as an alternate.

Go Lightly Consignment

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Site Plan The Board approved a motion to conditionally approve the site plan for The Bradford Junction, 2370 Route 114 Bradford, NH Map 06/Lot 108. Conditions are as follows: 1. Add downward facing externally illuminated sign to the site plan pertaining to signage wording.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Election of Officers The Board elected Brooks McCandlish as Chair and Ken Parys as Vice Chair.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Election of Officers The Board reelected current BCC officers to the same positions, Ann Eldridge as Chair, Meg Fearnley as Treasurer, and Patty Furness as Secretary.

Local Birds Michelle and David Halsted from the Rural Heritage Connection are assembling a list of bird species seen in the Bradford Area and are requesting BCC member input. The goal is to share the ongoing compilation with the town and hospitality industries, thereby promoting and encouraging protection and appreciation of local natural resources. **Trails** The Economic Development Committee is interested in creating a map with some of the BCC trails on it. The BCC formed a subcommittee to determine which trials to exclude from the map due to limited parking capacity or a private land site.

CEMETERY TRUSTEES

Rules and Regulations Revisions have been completed for the new rules and regulations. Once approved a public hearing will be scheduled.

ROAD AND BRIDGE COMMITTEE

Gravel With no known locations in town available for gravel, committee member Matt Ordway suggested it would be in Bradford's best interest to buy five acres on East Washington Road for gravel. He said it would be a big amount of money to start with but then it would pay off in a few years. They would need to purchase the property and then prepare it.

Budget Concerns Steve Hall explained that if the Highway Department budget is approved at \$550,000 there will only be \$72,000 to use on projects after paying for



PARKS AND RECREATION

Election of Officers The Board elected Devin Pendleton as Chair and Jonathan Roy as Vice Chair. Secretary remains unfilled.

Repairs The Board approved a repair quote for up to \$300 from the One Stop Shop for repairs to the Snack Shack at Brown Shattuck. Door and frame will be repaired, and a new lock installed to secure the building.

Cleanup French's Park cleanup is scheduled for Sunday, May 16 at 10am. **Independence Day** Registration is open for the 5k Road Race. Race will be on Saturday July 3, 2021 at 9am. Fireworks will be at 9:30pm. The Board approved a motion to schedule the fireworks rain date for September 25, 2021.

KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

Officers and Board Appointments The Board elected Ken Bartholomew as School Board Chair and Alison Mastin as Vice Chair. The Following Board appointments were approved: Joni Boucher as District Clerk, Soule, Leslie, Kidder & Loughman as Legal Counsel, Roberge & Company, PC as Auditor, Nancy Barthol as Treasurer, and Doreen Salera as Deputy Treasurer.

Municipal Budget Committee The Committee elected Richard Anderson as MBC Chair and Brian Dumais as MBC Vice Chair.

Chromebooks The Board approved the purchase of Chromebooks for the 1st graders in the amount of \$51,450 to be awarded to Malor & Co. The Board approved the purchase of Chromebooks for 5th graders in the amount of \$31,492.50 to be awarded to thinkEDU.

April 2021 Town Meeting

Town Meeting was held on Saturday, April 10, 2021 at KRMS in Sutton. Approximately 76 registered voters were in attendance. Bracket Scheffy, Moderator, opened the meeting at 9am with the Pledge of Allegiance led by Distinguished Veteran, Bob Selig. Selectwomen Marlene Freyler presented the Fenton Family with a plaque that read "In appreciation of the Fenton Family/ Team Appleseed for demonstrating neighborly goodwill to the Bradford Area, from the Town of Bradford."

Budget Highlights

Building Code Department was increased from \$1,100 to \$15,000. Chris Frey and Selectmen Andrew Pinard both explained that because the Town did not vote to repeal the Town Building Ordinance that the Building Inspector position needs to be filled and funded.

Bridges was increased from \$1 to \$280,000. Chris Frey explained that the project was estimated to cost \$1,300,000.00 but when COVID hit supplies were harder to get and prices went up. When bids were opened in May 2020 the lowest bid was \$1,600,000.00. A warrant article should have been put together in January, but the error was not realized until after the Budget Committee held their public hearings. To prevent exceeding the 10% rule it was recommended that the fire truck appropriation be struck down and voted on next year.

All other line items were passed for a total budget of \$2,633,847.00.


Warrant Article Highlights

Following the vote for the general budget, a motion was made to move up article 17, a warrant article for the purchase of a new Class A pumper truck for \$375,000. Fire Chief Jeff Leblanc explained the need for the new pumper. Selectmen Andrew Pinard expressed concern that the town does not have actual quotes for the pumper and that \$375,000 may not be enough money. The article was amended to read: To see if the Town would authorize the Select Board to form a committee to provide specifications and costs for a Class A pumper, the purchase of which is to be presented at the 2022 Town Meeting. The article passed as amended.

Another Fire Department article was amended to change the appropriation from \$70,000 to \$150,000 for the 2006 Fire Department Heavy Equipment Capital Reserve Fund. The article passed as amended.

The article to appropriate \$5,000 for 2015 Town Equipment Repair Expendable Trust Fund was amended and increased to \$40,000. The article passed as amended.

All other articles passed. The meeting ended with a message from Jacqueline Pherson letting voters know that the two girls that received the Bradford School Scholarship in 2020 also received \$1,000 scholarships each from the Bradford Women's Club. The meeting adjourned at 11:46am.

We make our own herbal products and bring those together with products from diverse makers to offer various family wellness and beauty products. We have just started running herbal education programs and workshops, and have already built the foundation of an open-hearted community.

We've also been incredibly fortunate to have the support of other local businesses like 5 Acres Garden Center & Pet Supply. They've allowed us to hold pop-up shops at their location and they also carry some of our products. Our Moon Mama products are also available at collaborating businesses in the area including Nourish Holistic Health and Nutrition and the Warner Public Market.

When did you start the business? Our official launch was October 2020!

Why did you start the business? Just as we have witnessed a return to sourcing and eating our food locally, we recognized a need to have local, trusted, sustainable solutions for our health and wellbeing. We started Moon Mama Herbals

as a local source of both herbal products and learning. We also wanted to encourage people back to nature in a way that is a more empowering, accessible, and integral part of them than they may realize.

What is your background? That is a short question with a long answer! In my previous life, I have been an HR leader, a diversity consultant, public speaker, and workforce educator, all within the health and human services disability field. I began studying herbalism about eight years ago around my "day job." Two years ago, we moved to Bradford and felt very welcomed by our neighbors and community. 

It is a chance to build something special that allows us to serve our community while following my passion and purpose. It's not easy! There is no "end of the day" when you are building your own business. However, all the hard work and effort feels like an investment in myself and what I care about. In this case, that's bringing others back to herbalisms art and science through trusted local products and education.

Who helps you run the business? Maria and I run the business together. My husband, Stephen, helps around his work schedule building fixtures, helping to wildcraft herbs, and make herbal products with me. During the holidays, it was not unusual to find him late at night, heat sealing bottles for me to keep up with orders! A great problem to have. We've been searching for space in Bradford to open up a full herbal apothecary. We have had some starts and stops with potential space, but we continue our quest for the right spot. Although there has been some availability outside of Bradford, we would like to open here as part of the community I fell in love with when we bought our house. Our physical space will house the retail shop carrying herbal teas, bulk herbs, tinctures, tonics, body botanicals, gift items, books, and more. Remembering When...

I'm not sure what the motivation was, but I was outside on our deck having my morning coffee and listening to the cow birds in the overgrown pasture next door when I found myself thinking back to some of the businesses in town that are now either gone or replaced along with the many owners that ran them.

I am not a "native" of Bradford, I moved here with my family in 1969 at age 13 initially hating to move here and be apart from my many friends in Concord, NH. However I soon adjusted to my new surroundings. Aside from two very brief times living away, I have lived here in this town most of my life and I remember when snowbanks seemed to be two stories high and when Sonny Harris's dad Del Harris would yell at me during baseball practice for picking strawberries in the outfield at Brown Shattuck.

I remember Cressey and Williams and Ralph's Texaco service station on West Main Street. Carl Cressey could tinker up any small engine and sell you a farm tractor in the same breath. And Ralph could fix any automobile that showed up in his garage.

How about Danforth's IGA and the old Merrimack Farmers store? You had to hold onto your grocery cart at the IGA or it would just take off down the aisle on the sloped floors, but they had pretty good groceries. Merrimack had everything from hand tools to food and grain for livestock and the place smelled really good too. Across the street was Dodge's Hardware where they had everything from a soda fountain and ice cream to paint and any type of hinge you could ever need.

I remember when Trade Winds on East Main Street was the first "convenience" store in town. They had everything from motor oil to fishing and hunting supplies and pretty bad sandwiches. Speaking of hunting and fishing supplies, how about Dickie's Bait and Tackle Shop? Dickie didn't sell sandwiches, but he had everything anyone ever needed to fish or hunt along with good advice on how to use it.


I remember when Bracket Scheffy had a law practice down at Lafayette Square in town and there used to be auctions outside the garage across from the IGA I think on Friday nights? And square dancing at Fortune's Barn up on Fairgrounds Road, too, but I never went to any of those.
