# MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

# **BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

Fire Department Update There are seven new hires, two returns and five new volunteers in the department. The department responded to two fire incidents in March and five medical and two mutual aids to Sutton in April. All nine sets of gear that were purchased have been issued and accounted for. The Chief said he does not have compliant gear. He was fitted and the cost will be \$3,840. He is looking into getting a grant to recover some costs on past gear that has been purchased and would like to use this money toward the purchase of the new outfit. The Board approved a motion to authorize the Chief to purchase new gear at his discretion.

Road Work Steve Hall, Road Agent, presented the Select Board with 4 options for this year's road work. To do all the work recommended will cost the Town \$133,581.96. The Town appropriated \$100,000 at Town meeting. The additional can be spent from the Highway operating budget or from the Roads and Bridges fund. The Board approved a motion to accept the contract with All States Construction in the amount of \$133,581.96

**Roller** The Board approved a motion to authorize Steve Hall to purchase a roller and use funds from the 2015 Town Equipment Expendable Trust Fund in the amount of \$3,000.

**Recognition** Karen Hambleton announced Scott MacLean's resignation from the Warner River Advisory Board and shared the Advisory Board's appreciation for his service.

# **Bradford Receives a NH Preservation Alliance Award and Grant**

Although you may not have heard about the work of the NH Preservation Alliance (NHPA), this remarkable organization has certainly shone its beneficence on Bradford this year. Begun in 1985 as Inherit New Hampshire, it was formed to protect the integrity and character of NH communities and landscapes. It is a 501(c)3 charitable group interested in preserving historical landmarks all over the state.

In May, the NH Preservation Alliance awarded the Town of Bradford the "2022 Preservation Achievement Award" for the restoration and rehabilitation of the Bement Covered Bridge. This commendation also included Hoyle, Tanner & Associates, Inc. and Neil H. Daniels, Inc. the team who carried out the fine workmanship.

# To the Editor,

The members of the Bradford Energy Committee have appreciated the letters to the editor over the last few years written by concerned town residents calling our attention to the issues of climate change. Steve Pierce's letter last month really got our attention, especially his call to action for us all to be empowered, be skeptical, and be thinkers. He is so right.

We do need to engage and educate ourselves. There is a lot of information out there and many pieces to this complex issue. Steve recommended Scientific American as a good source, and they have a vast archive of environmental articles on their website. Check out an article on April 12, 2021, that suggested that Climate Change be renamed Climate Emergency. Signing up for an online subscription is an easy place to start.

As members of the Bradford Energy Committee, we are working to weatherize town buildings and to find sources of renewable energy to benefit our town. We attend webinars sponsored by NH Clean Energy and others. Check out an

archive of presentations at https://www. newhampshirenetwork.org/events. The March 28th topic, "Is Net Zero Possible by 2050", is a presentation about an MIT-designed simulator to measure the effects of various possible actions to reduce emissions. Carbon pricing. among other actions, is named as critical to reaching Net Zero by 2050.

As a town we voted to call upon our State and Federal elected representatives to support carbon pricing at the April 2021 Town Meeting. This year we voted to commit to a community wide goal of transitioning to 100% renewable electricity by 2030 and renewable sources of fuel for heat and transportation by 2050. In 2020, the electricity from renewable sources provided by Eversource to our state was only 14% (they do not include nuclear power in their calculation). Clearly there is work to do.

There is much to learn, discuss, and do, and it would be great to keep the conversation going. Suggestions?

the small town of Bradford, population 1,650, to save a rare resource, develop a comprehensive rehabilitation plan, and implement creative engineering solutions to meet 21st century needs."

The committee went on to highlight the distinctive features of our bridge as well as the challenges that were met, and to applaud the resulting increased live load limit and durability. They celebrated the restored Bement Bridge as a "visual, practical and historic contribution to community life."

The Town would like to recognize Cheryl Behr for spearheading the Bement Bridge reconstruction. In 2012 Cheryl applied for a grant from the National Historic Covered Bridge Preservation Program. The funds awarded provided the Town the impetus that resulted in the award-winning reconstruction we enjoy today.

We here at the Bradford Bridge are particularly tickled that our namesake landmark has been so carefully stewarded by the town. And thanks to the NH Preservation Alliance!

Not only has the NHPA granted award status to the Bement Bridge project, but they have also awarded a \$7,500.00 grant to the Friends of the Bradford Center Meetinghouse. The Friends applied for and recently won a "1772 Foundation Historic Preservation

Matching Grant" from them in a highly competitive pandemic round.

The Friends of the BCM will use their award monies to professionally restore the original 1838 windows on all sides of the Meetinghouse. Grant funds, as well as personal donations, will also be matched by the James Foundation to achieve the total cost of \$33,000.00 needed for the project. Restoration will begin this month. 



## **Director's Report:**

One of the wonderful elements about a public library. is it should contain at least a few objectionable books, and of course what is objectionable, is very subjective. Or as I'm sure you've heard before, there should be at least one book that offends you. This is a sign of a good library! One of the more challenging aspects of being a library director is determining how to build a well-balanced collection of books, movies, etc. It's helpful to understand what people most like to read (it's our mystery collection), but also what may inspire, confront, and stimulate people. I tend to gravitate towards subjects that I find interesting or enlightening. I have always been liberal leaning and a democrat, so let's take for example, I wouldn't buy Glen Beck's The Great Reset for my own personal library, but I did buy it for ours.

Over the past several years, my husband has shifted from middle of the line politics to a much more conservative way of thinking. I have listened to Dan Bongiano, Ben Shapiro, Mark Levin, and Glen Beck, as well as watched Fox news, and honestly, I haven't agreed or liked much of what I've heard. However, for Brett, these people's positions resonate for him. We have had countless passionate arguments about our differences, and we've had to learn how to table topics, and for lack of a better term, agree to disagree. This shift has been particularly challenging for our marriage, but it's made us better listeners and it's pushed me to attempt to understand other points of views although it feels uncomfortable. This is how I curate our library collection. I try to make sure there is something for everyone, and that I test my own boundaries. It is not the responsibility of a library to promote one view over the other, but rather represent the beliefs of both the majority and the minority.

You may walk into the library and see a book cover, a title, or a movie, that bothers, upsets, or offends you, but try and understand that what offends you, may provide insight and perspective to someone else. However, we have a process at the library for when or if a patron asks for a book to be removed. The patron will be asked to fill out a formal Request for Reconsideration of Materials. The request will be reviewed by the Trustees of the Library and will

determine if the book will remain in place or be pulled.

In other library news, we have our summer reading program in place! The theme this year is Oceans of Possibility. Starting after school is finished, June 21st, kids can pick up a reading log to get started on tracking all the books they will read this summer. There will be incentives/prizes and a raffle at the end of the summer.

**Zoning Board Membership** The Select Board approved a motion to appoint Doug Southard to the Zoning Board.

Unanticipated Revenue The Board approved a motion to accept \$250 from LCHIP for completing the annual LCHIP stewardship monitoring report on time. This will be deposited into the Town Hall checking account.

Audit The agreement for the past five years has been for \$14,000 per year. The auditor has offered to extend it another five years. The Board approved this by consensus and the Board chair signed the agreement.

**Town Hall Bond** The bond goes to sale on June 7. The Board approved a motion to authorize the Town to enter into the loan agreement and sell the bond to the Bond Bank.

**Intent to Cut** Signed by the Board for Map 4/ Lot 15, Map 4/ Lot 36, and Map 7/ Lot 60.

## PLANNING BOARD

**Site Plan** Kristen Mihaley of 9 Old Sutton Rd Map 2/ Lot 113 came before the Board to present her site plan application. Her business "Nourish" is currently housed in a section of the house. She is hoping to add a 30 by 26 building to the left of the house and on the current driveway for the use of her business. Public hearing scheduled for May 10.

**Alternate** The Board approved a

motion to accept Kristen Mihaley as an alternate.

**Schedule Change** The Board approved a motion to change the meeting schedule from two meetings a month to once a month. The Planning Board will meet on the 4th Tuesday of each month. The schedule change began May 24.

#### **ENERGY COMMITTEE**

Bradford Energy Goals The Select-board has requested the Energy Committee provide to the CIP Committee a list of renewable and energy saving measures for incorporation into the Municipal Improvements Schedule. The BEC will go through the previous energy audits, speak directly with managers of various town buildings, and come up with a list of recommendations for specific one-time expenditures.

**Highway Garage** The Shakes to Shingles and NHSaves contracts have been signed and submitted. Repairs to Highway Garage structure must be com-

pleted prior to the start of weatherization. Weatherization work must be installed and accepted by both the Town and Eversource by 10/31/2022.

## **ARPA Funds**

Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, reported that \$80,000 in American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) funds has been allocated to Bradford and that the Selectboard will solicit recommendations from residents on how the funds should be used. The BEC will propose that the town consider using some of the funds for weatherization for low-income residents.

#### **CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

Native Bees Alaina Bandanza will begin her summer research project at the Bradford Bog on May 21, 2022. The Board approved a motion that the Bradford Conservation Commission contribute \$250 to her project for a public presentation at the conclusion of her study.

Plastic Free July Sue Moss of the Bradford Energy Committee contacted BCC member Ann Eldridge in regards to the international initiative called "Plastic Free July." Town-wide plans include educational activities for children, an event at Sweet Beet July 2, and public showing of the movie "Microplastic Madness" at the library. The






Board approved a motion to co-sponsor the movie with the Brown Memorial Library and contribute \$50 toward the cost of screening.

Background Checks New laws now require background checks for new library hires. There are different levels of checks so the Board will need to read deeper into the law in order to decide which kind of background checks they will require.

#### PARKS AND RECREATION

Wilderness Survival Course The Course is being taught by Bob Hebert from Wolverine Tactical on June 11 and 18. We will use the Community Center and the woods behind it for the course. The Board approved a motion to expend up to \$500 from the programing revolving fund to support the Wilderness Survival Course.

# KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

Lacrosse The Board approved the creation of Boys and Girls Lacrosse teams at the Middle School. This will be added as a spring sport.

**Phones** The Board approved the

purchase recommendation of a hosted vPBX phone system from FirstLight in the amount of \$74,065.08 per year for a 5-year contract.

Chromebooks The Board approved the purchase recommendation for 160 1st Grade Chromebooks from CDW-G in the amount of \$56,160.00. ERATE funding was approved by the Board for the 1st grade Chromebooks. The Board approved the purchase recommendation for Para Chromebooks from Whalley in the amount of \$20,520.00.


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# **Bradford Historical Society**

Last year, Bradford was awarded a Lafayette Trail Marker to recognize Bradford as one of the stops on General Lafayette's "Farewell Tour" of 1824 to 1825. A tour initiated by Congress to honor Lafayette's contributions both as a serving officer and successful campaigner in his homeland for support of the revolutionary cause. The Marquis de Lafayette visited Bradford on June 27,



Many stories have been told throughout his route, of lines of people waiting to greet Lafayette including those who have served with him and their families, so much was their respect for him. Our own stories collected about the event in Bradford include Lafayette being hit in the face by an over enthusiast comrade as he flung his hat at the approaching coach. Lafayette apparently did see the funny side and was happy to be reacquainted with the character affectionately known around town as "General Blood" (although he was not a general of course).

Residents lined the road from Warner and excitedly sent word down the line to those waiting in Bradford of General Lafayette's imminent arrival. A young Mason Weare Tappan, later to become Attorney-General of New Hampshire, remembered being at the reception with his father and sitting on Lafavette's knee. These stories at events during the tour showed the spirit of patriotism and loyalty of those present and put forward for future generations, mirroring the loyalty and patriotism Lafayette had shown, and continued to show the people of America.

Bradford also recognized Lafayette in 1913 with the placement of a boulder and plaque honoring Lafayette. The boulder is set upon the granite doorstep from the Raymond Hotel, which stood across the street, and was the venue for Lafayette's reception in 1825.

A more recent campaign leading us up to the Bicentennial celebrations in 2024-2025, is by The Lafayette Trail, led by Julien Icher, who has been researching and marking out the route of this tour across the country. # Obituaries Barbara Conner French



Barbara Conner French of Henniker, school nurse and NH State Legislator, died peacefully April 20, 2022. She was 95 years old. A memorial service will be held on June 11, 2022, 10am at the Congregational Church in Henniker.

Barbara was born to Hugh and Florence Conner on July 1, 1926, in Norwood, MA. She spent her first 12 years in Providence RI, moving to Henniker, her father's hometown, then around New England, returning to Henniker after becoming a nurse.

She is survived by her children, Michael and Susan, grandchildren, Olivia and Johan, and one great-grandchild, Johan and Maddies's, Mateo.

Barbara earned her first degree from the University of New Hampshire, a B.S.N. Cornell - New York Hospital School of Nursing, and an M.Ed. from Mount Saint Mary College. Her professional experience was extensive: a clinical nurse, Cornell; NY Hospital; head nurse instructor, NH State Hospital, child welfare social worker; NH Department of Welfare, drug education consultant, NH Department of Education. Her greatest passion and satisfaction came from working as a school nurse at Rundlett Junior High School, Concord, for 27 years (1963 to 1990). She dearly loved all "her kids", and they loved her.

Barbara served in the New Hampshire House of Representatives for 20 years, representing Henniker & Bradford, 1992 to 1994, 1996 to 2012, and 2010 to 2016 when she retired at the age of ninety.

Because she was a people person, Barbara campaigned, door-to-door to the homes of her constituents. She got to know many people this way, and she respected the views of everyone. Barbara enjoyed riding in Bradford's Fourth of July Parade, saying hello to all the people lined up along the parade route.

Although she was, as some have said, "vertically challenged", Barbara had a strong voice and was a force to be reckoned with. She led with respect and love, and always stood on the high ground. Her colleagues found it was difficult to say no to her. She was highly respected by Republicans and Democrats alike.

She was a member of the NH House Health, Human Services & Elderly Affairs Committee and the Primary Prevention & Wellness Council (co-chair), Environment & Health Commission (co-chair), Osteoporosis Education & Prevention Council (chair), Economic Justice Task Force, and Public Health & Environment Council.

As a state representative, Barbara was a sponsor and co-sponsor of numerous bills that were signed into law. These ranged from issues involving healthcare, environment, well-being of children and families and even to allow sampling of beer or wine at farmers' markets. She was most proud of the creation of the NH Healthy Kids Corporation, which provides healthcare to thousands of NH children, and the Child and Family Resource Centers that support wellness and primary prevention services for children and families at the community level.

Barbara received many awards: the School Nurse of the Year 1990 from the NH

School Nurses' Association, Legislator of the Year 1998 from the NH Nurses Association, NH Democratic Party's Eleanor Roosevelt Award in 2005, National Alliance on Mental Illness NH Outstanding Legislative Leader 2014, and first annual Barbara

French School Health Advocacy Award presented to its namesake Barbara French by the NH School Nurses' Association in 2016.

A true believer in civic service she was active in Henniker/Bradford communities. In Henniker, Barbara served on the Parent Teachers Organization, Planning Board, Recycling Committee, Energy Committee, Henniker Against the Nuclear Dump, and Henniker Peace Community. In Bradford, she was president of the Massasecum Timber Corporation on Lake Massasecum, and president of the Lake Massasecum Improvement Associationthat presented her with a Certificate of Appreciation in 2013.

Barbara was delighted to support Bradford's Theodore Lettvin Concert Series and loved the Henniker Concert Series. She sang in the Henniker Congregational Church choir for 60 years.

The Church was her beloved community. She was active in the Evening Fellowship. Barbara worked on the annual Christmas Fair. She started the annual tradition of reciting the original Mother's Day Proclamation, a Peace proclamation written by Julia Ward Howe, on Mother's Day in church. Barbara dressed in period clothing, circa 1870. In her last years, Barbara held the distinction of being a member of the church more years than any other current members, more than seventy years.

A devoted family person, Barbara was a kind, generous, and loving mother. She took great pleasure in caring for her grandchildren when they were young, often picking them up after school or taking them to her cottage on Massasecum.



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Barbara recognized the importance of daily exercise as a cornerstone of health. She walked a mile each day and shorter distances for the last months of her life. She was an avid swimmer and swam daily into October.

Linda Tanner, Barbara's colleague in the legislature, said it so well in a tribute she delivered in the legislature's session, May 5, 2022:

"Barbara was a force to be reckoned with, highly respected by those who knew and worked with her, and a dedicated fighter for quality public education, wellness, accessible and affordable health care for all, protection of women's reproductive rights, and protection for the environment. She worked to protect and provide for those in need, the vulnerable - the young and the elderly. We will miss her in this fight for a better world for all."

Neil Pratt Hayward died at home, May 1, 2022, in Sunapee at age 81, surrounded by his loving wife Vicki and daughters, Tonya and Tracy. Neil was born on April 25, 1941, in Hanover to Fredrick Hayward, Jr. and Lucy Hayward. He graduated from Bradford Academy in 1959 with a high school diploma. Neil attended college while in the Air Force.

He married Vicki Lynn Hayward (Limlaw), his soulmate, in 1974. After moving to Florida, they owned and operated a trucking company, brokerage and fabrication shop. Neil had customers from all over the country wanting him to build them a custom semi-truck.

The couple welcomed three children into their home. They were adamant about letting them know how much they were loved, and encouraging them to strive for the best. Neil had three older children from a previous marriage who spent time with their father and Vicki. In 2011, the couple moved back to New Hampshire and retired. Both joined the Newbury Fire Department where Vicki remains employed.

Neil is predeceased by his parents, Lucy and Fred Hayward; brothers Freddy Hayward III and Gary Hayward of Fairlee, VT, and Sammy Hayward, of Louisville, KY. # Travel Diary: Dublin, Ireland

Last month, on a cloudy day in Ireland, I tested positive for Covid-19 at the Dublin Airport. I hit pause. My husband of 39 years got a coffee (Americana, no milk) and I got a tea. In these situations, tea (a little milk, no sugar) is always best. We had been traveling for 2 weeks with family and friends in Ireland and Scotland.

It couldn't be. I am a teacher and in the 2 years since the virus started spreading, I had yet to get sick. In the New York Times, I read that US Secretary Blinken tested positive, April 30th after attending a White House Correspondents Dinner, and now I tested positive on May 1st, after attending a family wedding in Scotland.

My sister-in-law suggested the CDC website. "All passengers arriving in the US, regardless of citizenship, must produce a negative covid test with documentation of such, before boarding a return flight to the US or, wait 10 days, retest and get a doctor's note documenting recovery."

Well, the wedding in the Scottish Highlands in a small castle with kilts was simply glorious. The newlyweds live outside of Edinburgh and were delighted that so many family members and friends could attend from the US and South Africa.

That's when "you know what" occurred after the wedding. That's what our little boutique hotel in Dublin called Covid. In the welcome letter, they said, "If you have you know what, let us know, and we'll deliver whatever you need." It turns out, unbeknownst to us, both Ireland and Scotland were recovering from an

outbreak when we arrived April 13th.

James Joyce was a companion during recovery. I had symptoms and although not feeling too bad, I



was unwell. Janet Skeslien Charles' novel, The Paris Library, brought some relief as well. So did writing.

"Here's himself," I heard one day in our hotel lobby in Dublin two weeks before. We had been hiking in Ireland for the week; Bliss, his sister Mary, her husband, Tim and I in Kilkenny, Doolin and Dingle. I've never seen so much green, so many sheep, and felt so much joy at finally arriving in the country where my grandmother, Kate, had been born and raised.

"Here we are, it's herself," a woman called out to our B+B host, Marian, upon arrival in Doolin. "Ah so it is, herself. Well come this way, " said Marian.

Preparing to travel is like picking a good novel. You do your research, read the title, the back of the book, and then the first paragraph. Halfway through the novel, as in the case with James Joyce's

Dubliners, I stopped reading and thought long and hard about continuing. "The night was cold and gloomy," Joyce wrote, his tone sometimes dark. May 1st was a gloomy day for me at the Dublin Airport with an uninvited guest. I was now part of Clan C.

I did isolate in Dublin for 7 days after landing in a hotel/apt on the edge of the city near the Grand Docks on the River Liffey. Once my symptoms subsided, I walked around the city, with a mask, away from people, with my husband, who tested negative. One day while waiting outside Off Beat Donuts in Dublin (get the jelly, the OB), I read an Oscar Wilde quote on the donut bag. "The optimist sees the donut, the pessimist the whole."

During the additional 12 days of my trip in Dublin, I saw the donut. I eventually met the CDC requirements to get back to the US, waited 10 days, saw a doctor, got my Letter of Recovery and flew back to Boston after a month overseas.

It was a grand trip. I will keep traveling, keep reading and try at some point to finish Joyce's novel, Dubliners. I will see the donut.

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
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












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
