

MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports SELECT BOARD

Town Clerk Selectwomen Beth Downs expressed concerns that the hours of the Town Clerks office are not conducive to people who work during the week. Town Clerk Erica Gross agreed to change the hours to 10am-7pm on Thursdays.

ZOOM After speaking with the NH Municipal Association, Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, said there is no obligation for the Town to provide access to meetings via Zoom link. If people want to participate by Zoom, they can call Karen for a link. By consensus, the Board agreed with this moving forward.

Police Department The Board approved a motion approving the grant for the Body 1 cameras and to have Chief Shaughnessy follow through the grant process, with the knowledge that the price will not exceed \$12,365. This grant is a 50/50 match.

Fire Department Chief Nowell thanked Reeds Wrecker for donating their services when a fire truck got stuck on Johnson Hill Road. Currently the department is documenting the percentage of their fire/rescue calls. New polos, sweatshirts, t-shirts, and ball caps were purchased or the FD courtesy of the Bradford Fire Rescue Association. Chief Nowell has met with Chief Shaughnessy, and they are looking into doing some joint CPR training with the Police Department.

CAP Lease Renewal The Board approved a motion to raise the rent to \$775 and make them aware the rent may increase next year as a result of higher energy costs.


Creativity and Resiliency in Downtown Bradford

Recycling Alkaline Batteries

The Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center collects alkaline batteries for recycling. The main goal of recycling these batteries is to retrieve the zinc and manganese. At the battery recycling company a strong electrical current on a conveyor belt separates the casings from the powder. The zinc and manganese powder is converted to pellets. These are used to produce fertilizer to grow plants or to make new batteries. The metal casings are melted down and made into new casings.

Instead of putting used batteries in the trash, please keep them separate and place them in the clearly marked container on the compactor for recycling alkaline and all kinds of batteries. We ship these batteries to Call For Recycling. Ken and I appreciate the many residents who participate in this small but important recycling program.



He feels our society is at risk for falling under the Communist play book. People are labeled as Marxist, but what does this mean, that they are scary radicals, that they are calling for revolt, or perhaps they are merely interested in racial and social justice more reformist than revolutionaries. Marxism isn't just one thing. It encompasses several theories: economic, social, and political. I thought if I was struggling with this subject, there may be others that would be interested in learning more.

Open conversation and respectful debate should leave us with questions that require further thought and introspection.

Old Mountain Road William Lucas came before the Board with concerns about erosion on Old Mountain Road. He wants to have an onsite meeting with the Road Agent to look at drainage in the area. Members of the Board, Karen Hambleton and Sandra Bravo, Class VI Road Monitor, also added that Fish and Game, Conservation Commission, and members of the group that planted trees along Old Mountain Road should be included in the meeting.

Energy Committee Sandra Bravo reported that the Committee has gone through all the energy efficiency recommendation reports and reached out to the departments trying to find cost saving ideas. The Select Board asked if the Energy Committee could get quotes for the recommended energy improvements for the CIP. Sandra said she was uncomfortable with what the Board was asking of her, the Committee does not have the expertise or time to call professionals and would like to see someone else step up.

Raffle Permits Bradford Police Chief drafted a raffle permit based on the permits of other towns. The Board approved a motion to accept the raffle permit as presented. The Police Chief or Select Board will sign off on these permits.

Milage Rate Effective July 1st, the IRS will raise their milage rate by 4 cents raising it to 62 cents. The Board approved a motion to raise the Town's milage rate to 62 cents per mile.

Dump Body The Board approved a motion to approve the expense of \$29,950 for the new dump body for the 2017 International dump truck with funding coming from the 2015 Town Equipment Fund. **Purchasing Process** Matt Monahan, Central NH Regional Planning, and Karen Hambleton had a conversation with attorney Matt Decker. He will write a statement that outlines the process as to what people need to do if they are interested in purchasing property in town and outline the Town's responsibility in providing detailed information about properties.



Benovolent Local Businesses

Bradford Center is a tiny spot at the heart of a tiny town in rural New Hampshire. But big things are happening there. For one thing, the summer music series organized this year by the Friends of the Bradford Center Meetinghouse has drawn record crowds of concert goers eager to enjoy the lovely setting and good times. For another, it has inspired generosity and civic pride in abundance.

Two local businesses really stepped up this summer to meet the restoration needs of the historic buildings at Bradford Center. Merrimack County Customs and Wet Basement Solutions came to the rescue to ensure safety for visitors and structures alike.



Jason Allen and Luke Watson of Merrimack County Customs built a new railing for the Bradford Center Meetinghouse ramp for free.

Jason Allen of MCC says "I'm a firm believer in giving back and creating excitement in our community. We like to support local organizations and events because it's better for everybody." Together with his lead shop guy, Luke Watson, he installed a simple yet stunning railing on the access ramp at the Meetinghouse, completely for free. Both men were local boys who went through the Kearsarge School District and now recognize the value of helping their home town cope with the challenges of modern living.

Jason knew in high school that he would someday own his own business. Merrimack County Customs has been known for quality and expert welding, fabrication, and metal cutting services since 2013. Their services consist of railings and stairs, structural work, custom fabrication, and CNC metal cutting.

The concept of custom work resonates with Jason on many levels. MCC uses both new and traditional technology to create products that put the custom in any customer's purchase. He uses 3D computer drafting tools to present and modify the product and make sure the customer is pleased. He specializes in home installations and acknowledges that a staircase is often an important visual feature in a home. The advance design work is both efficient and environmental as it eliminates wasting materials and time. Jason also envisions customizing his family business to meet changes that inevitably arise. He admires the creative mind of business magnate Elon Musk and plans to encourage and support businesses in Bradford that address today's problems.


Dave Szymkiewicz similarly displays remarkable ingenuity and work ethic with his Wet Basement Solutions. Dave grew up here and always appreciated the special mystique of Bradford Center. He knew folks like Walt Heselton, who was the beloved "Unkie" to all the local kids. After owning the Center Schoolhouse following its closing in the1930s,



Dave Szymkiewicz of Wet Basement Solutions voluntarily restored the Center Schoolhouse foundation and protected the building for years to come.

Walt donated the building back to the Town for restoration fifty years later in time for the Bicentennial celebrations, inspiring generosity in neighbors like Dave.

The Schoolhouse, previously under the stewardship of the Bradford Historical Society is now being protected and restored by the Friends of the Bradford Center Meetinghouse. It needed major help this spring when mold bloomed up from... you guessed it... the wet basement. Dave immediately came to the rescue and has been hard at work repairing the foundation, installing a new sump





The Selectboard approved an expense of \$29,950 for the new dump body for the 2007 International dump truck with funding coming from the 2015 Town Equipment Fund.



Victory Garden Revival Thrives in the Kearsarge Region

In March of 2020, as New Hampshire locked down to bring the COVID-19 pandemic under control, organizers from Spring Ledge Farm, Colby-Sawyer College, Kearsarge Neighborhood Partners, and the Kearsarge Food Hub collaborated to form FEED Kearsarge (Food Expansion, Education, and Distribution).

Taking Inspiration from the victory gardens planted during World War II, the Victory Garden Revival came from FEED Kearsarge's first program called Tray it Forward. For this, trays are donated by the community, with seedlings started by Spring Ledge Farm of New London, and distributed to registered individuals by volunteers.

In May of 2022 the third annual Tray it Forward Program delivered over 400 free seedling trays to 108 individuals, food pantries, and local organizations. Many of the individuals who receive trays register through food pantries, ensuring FEED Kearsarge's goal of helping people who are food insecure.

Beyond food security these partners work together to build community, share knowledge, and cultivate JOY as well as fresh, healthy local foods. That's food sovereignty!

Current programs of FEED Kearsarge include the Tray it Forward program, as well as gardening support and commu-



nity building. Visit *https://www.face-book.com/groups/victorygardensupport/* to see gardeners in action.

The Victory Gardens are a way to educate individuals on growing their own food, as well as encouraging the community to come together during and after years of isolation.

The Kearsarge Community Network has contributed to FEED Kearsarge's continued accomplishments. Monthly meetings link like-minded organizations together. The group is funded by the UNH Cooperative Extension with funds from the Rural Health and Safety Education grant to improve community resilience in rural New Hampshire communities impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic. The grant resulted in the "Building Community Resilience" project, and the formation of the Kearsarge Community Network.

"There's a lot of energy in this particular region," said Melissa Lee, Field Specialist at the Merrimack County Extension Office. According to Lee, the choice to direct funds to Kearsarge was a "sense of readiness" in the community, who needed not more resources, but an "opportunity to increase communication."

This opportunity became reality thanks to the help of Carol Conforti-Adams, the Extension's local coordinator and main voice for the KCN. Although funding will cease at the end of this calendar year, Conforti-Adams has already committed to staying onboard to keep the Kearsarge Community Network afloat.

Hanna Flanders of the Kearsarge Food Hub says of Carol's involvement, "... Carol has passion for community wellness, joy and vitality. She's really interested in making sure that the work that's started by the grant is continued once the grant is over," emphasizing the role the KCN played as a "cross-pollinator" of local organizations' efforts, "Through that cross-pollination, opportunities that were not visible became visible, became acted on, and became real."

Victory Gardens can be visited at Colby-Sawyer College, Warner Connects and the Bradford Food Pantry. As vegetables ripen they will be distributed to food pantries. There will be a tour of the garden at Warner Connects on August 4th, at 11:30 am. Bradford will be on tour in early September.
