MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

SELECT BOARD

Truck Repairs The 2007 10 Wheel dump truck that was purchased earlier this year is in need of a new transmission. The anticipated cost is \$10,264, less the cost of the refunded core charge brings the total to approximately \$8,900. To date, the Town has spent \$12,311 on repairs to this truck. The Board approved a motion to authorize the funding for this repair to be withdrawn from the 2015 Town Equipment Repair and Purchase Expendable Trust Fund.

Road Work The work on West Main Street/ Cochran Hill and Marshall Hill Road has been completed. It's expected to cost \$21,500 for the excavation work and \$5000-6000 for paving. The Board approved a motion to authorize the funding for these repairs to be withdrawn from the 2019 Roads and Bridges Expendable Trust Fund.

Land Acknowledgement Statement – We are on the unceded land of Nd'akinna which has long served as a site of meeting for Abenaki people from Pagôntegok (Contoocook), O'quasskikonaquan (Newbury) and beyond for thousands of years. Nebizonbik (Bradford Springs) provided healing waters and people exchanged goods at the village site behind Lake Massasecum, calling this land home. The town of Bradford honors, recognizes, and respects these Abenaki, as the traditional stewards of the lands and waters on which we gather today. In that spirit, today we will begin by acknowledging that we are guests in this land. We need to respect and help protect the lands within our use and share of the bounty with our Abenaki partners today.

Keep Bradford Safe this Winter

Our Bradford Fire and Rescue is concerned that the high cost of energy this winter could make the risk of house fires even greater as people may depend more on space heaters and fireplaces that may not be properly maintained. Chimneys need annual inspection and cleaning if you depend on wood heat. Softwoods and pine can lead to creosote build-up and chimney fires.

Fire Chief Bryan Nowell stresses the importance of smoke and carbon monoxide detectors in your homes.

FIRE IS FAST! PLEASE:

- Replace smoke alarms older than 10
- Change batteries annually. Write down the date!
- Test your smoke alarms monthly.
- Use carbon monoxide (CO) detectors. CO detectors save lives by alerting you if CO, an odorless, colorless gas, is present from poorly functioning furnaces and stoves.

HELP YOUR NEIGHBORS:

Donate smoke and CO detectors and/ or replacement 9-volt batteries directly to a neighbor in need, or bring them to Bradford Fire & Rescue. They will get it to where it is needed. You can also support local by purchasing detectors at the Lumber Barn.

Bradford Fire & Rescue - Chief Bryan Nowell

Within minutes of sitting down in the Bradford Fire & Rescue training room with Chief Nowell it was obvious that he is committed to the safety of this community and to nurturing a caring culture within the fire department.

Bryan came out of retirement earlier this year to take the job as Bradford's parttime Fire Chief. Before retiring in 2020 he served in the NH Department of Natural and Cultural Resources for 33 years as a Forest Ranger and Forest Ranger Captain. During that time his patrol of the southern eight NH counties included Bradford where he helped with wildland fire suppression and assisted with trainings and meetings at the station. In addition to full-time work as a Forest Ranger Chief Nowell was a member of fire stations where he lived. He served as Call Lieutenant in the Goffstown Fire Department until he took over as Bradford Fire Chief. Chief Nowell brings a wealth of national and international experience in fighting wildland fires as well as instructing federal wildland fire trainings. He is an instructor at the NH Fire Academy for both wildland and structural fire classes and teaches high school students firefighter certification at the Manchester School of Technology.

An important part of Bryan's strategy to keep Bradford safe is making sure the community has access to information about the department and all the equipment. On the afternoon I visited the bays were open and Bryan emphasized that anyone is welcome to tour the department to see our fire trucks and gear.

Since taking over as Chief earlier this year, Bryan has been busy updating fire-fighter gear and rescue equipment using a \$50,000 grant he secured. He has attended select board and budget committee meetings to keep members informed about fire department needs.

As a result of Bryan's encouragement some members of the department are becoming trained in emergency medical technology with the goal of having as many members as possible trained for any call. Over the years the department has evolved from one that has in-town responders to one where many members live and/or work away from Bradford. The goal is having each member secure as many certifications as possible to cover the range of calls received.

And, somehow, this man finds time to hike NH's 4000 footers for the second time, stay actively involved in the Boy Scouts, and serve as treasurer of the local snow machine club and the Central NH Forest Fire Warden Association.

With his vast experience in firefighting, fire department management, and community involvement Bradford is very fortunate that Chief Nowell is leading Bradford Fire & Rescue during the current complicated equipment supply and staffing challenges. He has already reached out to several community organizations, and he is happy to show his pride in our department. 
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KMB Quilt Winner

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Town Hall Update

If you've driven by the Town Hall in the past couple of weeks, you have probably seen activity there. Furniture, town records and other items that needed to be emptied from the building were identified, boxed up and moved to storage in the Masonic building. Equipment has begun to arrive on-site as well. Unfortunately, the Town's LCHIP application for the rehabilitation of the windows was not selected for funding.

Michael Bruss, of Bruss Project Management, has been hired to serve as the Town's Clerk of the Works for this project. Michael has long-standing ties to Bradford and is very familiar with much of the history of the Town Hall project from the time Bruss Construction was involved. In addition to more than 35 years' experience in project development and management, he has experience with the rehabilitation of historic structures and New England Town Halls, LCHIP and energy efficient solutions for older buildings. He is a perfect fit for this project.

Calculations for the capacity of the sprinkler system cisterns have been completed and the number of gallons requiring storage is approximately 25% less than first thought. This is good news as the space available under the parking lot to house the cisterns, septic system and propane tank is limited. Once the sprinkler system plans are completed, the final site plan can be drawn.

Mobilization of the renovation effort will continue over the next couple of weeks to prepare for the revised start date of December 12. This is a month later than hoped, however, it has allowed the project team to continue to hammer out many final details of the project. Recycling Holiday Wraps

Holiday wraps, greenery, decorations, and unique foods definitely enhance our seasonal celebrations. But what can we do with all those things that we do not want to reuse or that we must discard? At the Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center we have some helpful solutions.

- Our mixed paper vendor accepts any paper that rips, except those papers that are shiny or contain foil. Please discard all shiny and metallic gift wrap and all ribbons and bows along with your household trash into the municipal waste compactor container.
- Remove any and all decorations from your unwanted holiday wreaths and Christmas trees, and, instead of taking the greenery to the burn pile, place the greenery beside the compost container for recycling. Some residents feed it to their goats and sheep!
- Holiday decorations that are still in good condition and usable may be placed in the swap shop for others to enjoy next year.
- If you have leftover food items, please compost them or place them on the compactor for farm critters.



Undercoating The Board approved a motion to authorize Steve Hall, Road Agent, to undercoat four dump trucks at a cost of \$1,400.

Emergency Plan Fire Department Chief Bryan Nowell has received three bids to update the Town's LEOP (Local Emergency Operations Plan) which expired in 2008. The grant to update the LEOP is funded 50/50 through Homeland Security. They pay \$4000 and the Town is responsible for the remaining \$4000. The Board approved a motion to authorize Bryan to reach out to Hubbard Consulting to put the LEOP update in motion.

Budget Concerns The budget remains very tight. The Board approved a motion to instruct department heads to be cognizant of their use of overtime and other expenses.

Unanticipated Revenue The Board accepted \$25 additional revenue for the 2019 Town Hall Trust Fund and \$500 for the 1964 Scholarship Fund per RSA 31:95-b.

Town Hall Update Two resumes have been received from parties interested in serving as Clerk of the Works for the Town Hall Project. The Board felt that Bruss Construction Management best fit the Town's needs. Michael Bruss has experience with large municipal construction projects, historic buildings,

LCHIP and is familiar with the project.

Tax Rate The Board set the tax rate at \$24.69. Municipal \$9.35/ County \$2.46/ Local Education \$11.63/ State Education \$1.25.

BUDGET COMMITTEE

Membership The Committee signed an appointment to have Kimberly Firth join the Budget Committee. Erica Gross swore Kim in and the appointment was official.

Budget Review The Committee did an initial review of the 2023 budget. Discussion ensued regarding employee and benefit related costs and what options were being reviewed. Also discussed was the 2022 invoice from Henniker Rescue and the increases to gasoline prices. Beth Downs provided some feedback on some of the key areas of concern given increasing economic pressures. Welfare, continuing accessibility to services such as senior programs and Library services, fuel, and heating costs. The Committee discussed what possibilities could be explored to maintain key services while offsetting increasing costs.


PLANNING BOARD

Permit Application Ms. Lindsey White from GZA GeoEnvironmental and Mr. Sam Reiss from Eversource presented the Conditional Use Permit Application for an upcoming distribution line retirement project. Eversource would like to retire their 3410 Distribution Line and remove the poles and infrastructure from the existing right of way. The line is about 6.5 miles in length crossing through portions of Bradford, Sutton, and Warner. They will be removing 145 existing poles, 34 of which are located in Bradford. The project requires temporary wetland impact to access each pole and have a work area for safety equipment and vehicles. The poles will be cut in smaller pieces and removed offsite. The line will be removed from the right of way. The Planning Board approved a motion to approve the 3410 Distribution Line Structure Removal Project presented by Eversource.

Sign Chair Bruss opened the discussion on the Bradford Historical Society signage. She stated as long as it fits within the sign regulations, they can update the







file. Ms. Tracy Quigley from the Historical Society will move forward with ordering the sign.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Variance The Board approved the application for a variance to Article V Section B2, and to Article III, Sections D1 and D4 of the Bradford Zoning Ordinance, on the property identified as Map 2 Lot 108, located at 80 Gillingham Drive.

ENERGY COMMITTEE

Research Jenny Howley gave an update of the research into the steps necessary for Bradford to join the Community Power Coalition. Kathleen Bigford gave an update of research into the possibility of a municipal solar installation. Research on each of these projects is ongoing as well as information Sandra Bravo is gathering relevant to solar installations on town buildings. The committee agreed that all town buildings need to be weatherized and energy efficiency accomplished before renewable energy projects can be undertaken. Capital Improvement Plans currently have weatherization scheduled for 2024-2026.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Hoyt Brook Monitoring George Beaton, Ann Eldridge, Carol Meise and Becca Herman recently met with Ben Nugent of NH Fish and Game and George Embley of Trout Unlimited to do a training session for collecting data in a long-term stream study of Hoyt Brook. Monitoring will begin in the spring of 2023 and will be performed four times per year. Additional volunteers welcome!

Tire Shredder Commission member Ann Eldridge attended the Ausbon Sargent Conservation Commission Chair Semiannual Meeting. One of the topics of discussion was the possible group purchase by several towns of a tire shredder to market used tires. Ann has contacted the Bradford Energy Committee, and Lois from the transfer station to gauge interest and plausibility.

KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

Septic Pumping The Board approved a motion to approve the purchase recommendation for septic pumping at the High School in the amount of \$10,000.00 from Stearns Septic.

Enrollment The October 1, 2022, data from the New England School Development Council (NESDC) shows that over the next 10 years, the District's enrollment is projected to fluctuate around 100 students up or down. It was noted that this is a very stable situation. The projections show that in 10 years, the 2032-33 school year will increase from 1,687 students to 1,859 students.

STEAM Renovation The Board approved a motion to postpone the STEAM Renovation project for a period of one year out of concern for the interest and inflation rates.

Preschool South The new preschool in Bradford will be a modular building with three classroom-style spaces. Behind the building will be a new playground for the preschool. Mrs. Robertson, Program Director, announced that the district's two preschools will be named Kearsarge Regional Preschool New London and Kearsarge Regional Preschool Bradford.







- · 1 cup unsalted butter, softened to room temperature
- 3/4 cup confectioners' sugar
- 1/2 tsp. salt
- · 1 tsp. vanilla extract

Name of Business?

Soul Source, LLC.

What do you do?

This is a retail store that strives to carry "Made in USA" products for the home, including organic linens, stainless steel and cast-iron cookware, bedding, pillows and mattresses, as well as sectional sofas. The store features local wood crafters and pottery as well as other gift and unique kitchen accessories.

When did you start the business? The store opened on the 4th of July

weekend of this year.

Why did you start the business?

I felt that there was a gap in the market. We can all purchase products that are made overseas that are loaded with chemicals that are not beneficial to our health all day for reasonable prices. I was seeking a place where I could purchase goods that were made in the USA using materials that are beneficial to our health. For example, the mattresses and sofas that Soul Source sells are made with wool, coco fiber and organic latex. Most mattresses are treated with fire retardant chemicals Because wool meets all the federal requirements as a fire retardant, chemicals are not necessary. Similarly, most of our cookware is not particularly healthy to cook in. Soul Source carries two of the healthy cooking options. 360 is the only stainless steel cookware produced in the US that does not use chemicals, they instead use a sanding process that produces one of the best mediums to cook in. 
