# MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

### **BOARD OF SELECTMEN**

Farewell At his last meeting as a Select Board member, Andrew Pinard thanked his fellow Select Board members for working with him this past year, stating that it has been a privilege working with them, as well as with Town employees. He also enjoyed working with the Fire Department and Police Department and is grateful for their service to the Town. He thanked Karen and her staff for working with the Select Board and acknowledged all the boards he has worked with throughout the year as well.

**Board Chair** The Board approved a motion to nominate Marlene Freyler as Chair.

Committee Assignments Selectman Mel Pfeifle will serve on the Economic Development, CIP, Planning Board, and Transfer Station. Selectman Marlene Freyler will serve on the Historic District Commission, Energy Committee, Fire Department, and Cemetery. Selectman Beth Downs will serve on Budget Committee, and Highway Department.

Road Race Tim Blagden came before the Board to discuss plans for a 5K road race to raise funds for the Rail Trail project. The race route would go from The Appleseed along High Street, to West Main Street, up Gillingham to a point then down Gillingham back to West Main, up Church Street then along the Tilly Wheeler Trail back to The Appleseed, and then around again as it will be a two-lap race. This would take place on Thursday, August 18, 2022 at 6:00pm. They are hoping for between 100-200 racers.

# **Bradford Town Meeting 2022**

The 236th Bradford Town Meeting may go in the books as one of the most agreeable. All of the warrant articles were approved. Significantly, after about a decade of debate over the usage of the Town Hall, a \$2.6 million bond to finish renovation and construction passed by 71% of the votes cast.

At the beginning of the meeting Andrew Pinard thanked all the citizens and first responders who helped at the scene of the fire at the Student Transportation of America building. "Our hearts are with the victims and their families," he said.



Pictured here, Bruce Storm, interim and newly elected Moderator, led the proceedings admitting that the last time he had addressed a group this size was to let middle school students know it was time to clear the cafeteria. Bruce expressed deepest thanks to Andrew Pinard for serving as Chair of the Bradford Selectboard for the past year and for his support at Town Meeting.

"I have some big shoes to fill," said Mr. Storm and he quoted one of his mentors by reminding the meeting that, "It is possible to disagree without being disagreeable."

### To the Editor:

A week before the war started I was speaking with Ann Eldridge. With a heavy heart and much compassion Ann was asking me about the situation at home, about my family, and expressing her concern about their safety, as did many other friends from the US in weeks and days prior to the beginning of the war. On the other hand at home in Ukraine my family were shrugging their shoulders during our video chats in disbelief that anything could happen. "Putin is bluffing", "There is no way Russians will attack", "The EU and NATO are watching closely, they will not let this happen" - those were the words I was hearing from my relatives and friends back home.

You see, the whole scenario of "Putin wants to liberate the ethnic Russian population from Ukrainian oppression" didn't make any sense to any Ukrainian, so it was hard to believe that war would start

It is a dirty war, built on lies, ruthless control and deception. War with the aim to break the nation. The freedom loving nation, too dangerous of a neighbor, when you are a tyrant. More than 70% of Russian people support their president and this war. Seventy percent?! They live in the alternate reality, where their soldiers are liberating people from a "nazi" regime?!?

Like many Ukrainians, I have asked myself "how can we get through to the Russian people?" If only they knew the truth, that their own sons are dying in this dirty war (over 14,000 Russian casualties in 24 days), that their sons are ordered to strike civilian populations and target hospitals, orphanages, maternity hospitals (109 children have been killed, and thousands of civilians)! Would they find bravery inside to summon people to the streets, by thousands, by millions, to stop this madness?

What can we do on our part here in the US? I invite you to take action if you are not indifferent to the fate of people in my home country who are being targeted as they are trying to evacuate since most of the so-called "green corridors" don't work due to heightened air attacks. They are running for their lives, dying not only from explosions and gunshots but from dehydration and lack of food.

Call your representative in Congress and ask them to advocate for more anti aircraft and anti tank ammunition to be sent to Ukraine. Ask for more strict sanctions against the Russian elite, Putin, and his closest circle.

# Thinking About Going Solar?

The bottom line: The sooner the better. The Residential Solar Federal Tax Credit will drop in 2023 from 26% to 22%!

### Tax Credit Basics:

A tax credit is a dollar-for-dollar reduction in the amount of income tax you owe. Claiming a \$1,000 federal tax credit reduces your federal income taxes by \$1,000. The federal residential solar energy credit is a tax credit that can be claimed on federal income taxes for a percentage of the cost of a solar photovoltaic (PV) system. In 2022 it is 26%.

So, for a \$10.000 solar PV system placed in service during 2022 the federal income tax credit would be \$2,600. On the same installation in 2023 the tax credit will be \$2,200. And, unless Congress renews this tax credit, it will go away in 2024.

The solar tax credit applies to the following:

- Cost of solar panels
- Labor costs for installation, including permitting fees, inspection costs, and developer fees
- Any and all additional solar equipment, like inverters, wiring, and mounting hardware
- Home batteries charged by your solar equipment
- Sales taxes on eligible expenses

If you're not sure the solar tax credit applies to you and your home, here are some of the criteria to keep in mind:

- Your solar photovoltaic (PV) system was installed between 1/1/2006 and 12/31/2023.
- Your solar PV system was installed on your primary or secondary residence in the US.

- You own the solar PV system, meaning you purchased it outright or financed it with a loan. You did not sign a lease or Power Purchase Agreement (PPA).
- Your solar PV system is new or being used for the first time, the credit can only be claimed on the original installation of the solar equipment. For instance, if you bought a house that came with a solar system already installed, you would not be eligible for the credit.

Readers interested in installing solar products should use their best judgment and seek advice from a licensed professional before making any purchase or investment. If you decide you want to proceed don't delay as a solar PV project can take from 4-6 months or longer to complete. Eversource provides some rebates and resources for solar projects at *eversource.com*.

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
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### Ticks are Out!!

In recent years, New Hampshire has had some of the highest incidences of Lyme disease in the United States. Lyme disease is caused by a bacteria carried by the Blacklegged tick. When a tick bites and embeds its head into a person or animal's skin, it can transmit bacteria. Other ticks, like Dog ticks and Lonestar ticks, carry other types of diseases too; some are fatal - however, to date, local transmission of these diseases has not occurred in NH.




Know where to expect ticks. Ticks live in moist and humid environments, particularly in or near wooded or grassy areas. For more detailed information on how to make a tickfree yard, see the state of Connecticut's Tick Management Handbook.

You may come into contact with ticks during outdoor activities around your home like gardening or when walking through leaf litter or near shrubs. Always walk in the center of trails in order to avoid contact with ticks.

Wearing tick repellent clothing is the best - and easiest - way for people to prevent tick bites when they venture outdoors. Did you know you can turn your own favorite clothes into tick repellent clothes? Products containing permethrin kill ticks. Permethrin can be used to treat boots, clothing and camping gear and remain protective through several washings.

Use a repellent on your skin that contains 20% or more of DEET, which can protect up to several hours. Always follow product instructions. Parents should apply this product to their children, avoiding the hands, eyes, and mouth, with a concentration of DEET no higher than 30%. For detailed information about using DEET on children, see recommendations from the American Academy of Pediatrics.

# Fire Destroys Student Transportation of America Building

*On March 3, 2022,* several propane explosions consumed the Student Transportation of America maintenance building on Route 114 in Bradford and critically injured two employees, Bobby Snair and Tim White. As of this writing both remain hospitalized.

As the fire happened during school vacation week, student transportation wasn't interrupted. However, surrounding towns came together over a weekend to coordinate bus routes on the following Monday to accommodate the buses destroyed in the fire.

I had a chance to catch up with Jim Raymond, Bradford's Interim Fire Chief, who commented:

"This five-alarm fire was the largest Bradford has seen, requiring lots of water and people. To see all the people and equipment that came together to fight and contain the fire is beyond words. It was a well-fought fire, and the Bradford Fire Department can hold their heads high. Every fire is dangerous, and it is a



credit to those involved that firefighters were not hurt. Since the fire had burned most of the building by the time we arrived, the biggest concern was containing the fire, protecting adjacent buildings and the Ayer and Goss gas tanks on close-by property.

As an interesting twist of fate, when the fire happened I was looking to cruise through my final ten days as Interim Chief!" Thank you Jim for stepping up to lead as Interim Chief of the Bradford Fire Department and for all you did on March 3rd.

**Transfer Station** The Board approved a motion that the transfer station will no longer accept demolition waste, furniture, large carpeting, bulk plastic, insulation, and fiber glass. These changes begin May 1, 2022.

Office Help The Board approved a motion to allow Town Administrator Karen Hambleton to find an interim person to help with work in the Town Office.

**Scholarship Donation** The Board accepted a donation of \$400 for the 1964 Scholarship Fund.

**Covid Protocol Update** The Board approved a motion to lift the mask recommendation mandate in Town buildings.

Wage Increases The Board approved a motion to allow Department Heads to distribute the 5.9% increase with a 2% merit based on performance as they wish.

# ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

**ERZ Approval** The Economic Revitalization Zone (ERZ) Tax Relief Program has been approved by the Select Board. Matt Monahan of Central NH Regional Planning will have a map created that shows the RSA 79-E and the Revitalization Zone shown on a single map and the Committee will work with the Town office to get this posted, along with a program summary, on the Town website so it is easy to identify these programs.



### PLANNING BOARD

Change of Use The Board held a discussion of change of use for the current Bradford Junction Restaurant. Lisa Fantasia plans to run a bakery called "Wicked Sweet Cakes and Treats" at this location. The Board declared this new business does not constitute a change of use and she can move forward with her plan.

Retail Store Anu Saini, owner of Map 17 Lot 2, 2 East Main Street, and Christine Frost, potential renter, came before the Board to discuss plans for a retail store. Christine is hoping to lease the space from Anu to operate a retail store selling Made in America home goods called "Soul Source LLC", a business that she has created. A site plan is already on file from September 14, 2021 and there will be no new construction. Initially she will be open Fri, Sat, Sun. She is hoping to open in June 2022. There was no need for a formal vote at this time and it will go on the agenda pending for the upcoming meeting.

### ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Variance A public hearing was opened to review the application by Mark and Laura Black for a Variance to Article III, Section D-1-4 to replace the existing house with a new dwelling located at 24 East Shore Drive, Map 22, Lot 13. The

Board approved a motion to approve the application with the following conditions: Construction shall include systems to increase filtration of runoff from roofs of all structures; The entire driveway shall be constructed using pervious surfaces such as permeable pavers; A rain garden and/or swale shall be planted with native vegetation between house and shoreline of Lake Massasecum.

### **ENERGY COMMITTEE**

**Town Hall** Bradford Energy Committee involvement has been invited by the Selectboard to recommend energy saving measures, to research energy efficient heating and cooling possibilities, and to identify grant opportunities to fund the additional costs of such measures.

### **Municipal Weatherization Status**

The Town approved warrant article 30, to raise and appropriate the sum of \$13,000.00 for the purpose of implementing energy saving measures to reduce the annual energy consumption of the Highway Garage as outlined in the Energy Audit Report sponsored by Eversource Energy dated February 9, 2021. The BEC needs to get two updated quotes for the work which will need to be coordinated with repairs to the door and cement wall of one bay.

**Solar Energy** The BEC is looking into the feasibility of solar panels at the

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highway department. Committee member Kathleen Bigford will contact Granite State Solar for a detailed analysis. She will also find out how many trees would need to come down and at what price before solar could be installed.

### **CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

Warner River The 2020 Warner River instream survey found algal blooms near Breezy Hill Rd and also ATV traffic downstream in Warner.

**Bradford Bog** The Selectboard has approved the wild bee research at the bog to be conducted by UNH and also drafted a letter of support for a grant for UNH to study cedar regeneration at the bog.

### LIBRARY TRUSTEES

**Easter Egg Hunt** The Library Easter Egg Hunt will be at the Brown Memorial Library on Saturday, April 16, 2022, at 11:00am.

Conference The NHLTA Spring conference will be held on May 10, 2022 at the Grappone Center in Concord, NH. Trustees Maria Storm and Devin Pendleton, and Library Director Ellen

Barselle plan on attending.

### KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

Legislation The Board had a discussion with Senator Ruth Ward, Senator Rebecca Whitley (via Zoom), Representative Karen Ebel (via Zoom), Representative Thomas Schamberg, and Representative Linda Tanner regarding NH House Bill 1371, AN ACT relative to school district policies on facial masks of students in schools, and NH House Bill 1679-FN, AN ACT relative to the dissolution and repeal of cooperative school districts. The Board approved a motion to note the Board's disapproval of House Bill 1371 and House Bill 1679-FN.

Safety Concerns The fire escapes in Warner need to be completely redone. The estimated cost is \$250,000. The front windows of the school need to be replaced as they provide a second emergency exit. An estimate will be obtained next Summer. School Board Member Ben Cushing stated that he was not pleased to hear that discussions of replacing the same fire escape had come up 15 years ago and no action was taken. He emphasized that the replacement

of the fire escape and the windows are a life safety issue and should be prioritized.



### Beet Hummus

Category: Appetizer

Servings: 6

Prep Time: 20 min

Cooking Time: 5 min

### INGREDIENTS

- 1 medium or 2 small red beets
- 2 garlic cloves
- 1 can **chickpeas**, drained and rinsed
- 2 tbsp. tahini
- 2 tbsp. extra-virgin olive oil
- 2 tbsp. fresh lemon juice

- 2 to 3 tbps. warm water
- ½ tsp. each of cumin and coriander (optional)
- · Sea salt and freshly ground black pepper
- For serving: baguette, pita chips, crackers, carrots, radishes, apples, snap peas

Note: Pick up all BOLD ingredients at Sweet Beet Market!

### PROCEDURE

- Preheat the oven to 400°F. Drizzle the beet with olive oil and then wrap the beet and garlic together in foil. Place on the baking sheet and roast 30 to 40 minutes, or until the beet is fork-tender.
- When cool enough to handle, peel the beet skins under running water using your hands. Chop the beet and place it in a blender. Add the roasted garlic, chickpeas, tahini, olive oil, lemon juice, and water and blend until smooth. Add cumin and coriander, if using. Chill until ready to use.
- · Slather onto baguette or serve with crispy raw veggies, pita chips, or crackers

She was a proud member of the Abenaki Artist Association for her work in learning basket making in the traditions of her Abenaki Dyer ancestors.

After retirement Isabell enjoyed the "best years of her life" as she would say. She bought an RV (in her 70s!) and took to the highways with her siblings— to the horror of fellow motorists and especially truckers. The stories of her adventures entertained all who knew her, especially her family. She subsequently made her home in Supply, NC where several of her siblings had relocated. Free from the ice and cold of the north, she enjoyed her home near Holden Beach immensely. She especially loved entertaining family and friends and attending "music" — local bluegrass sessions.

Isabell was predeceased by her parents, her brother Carl, and her sister Helen. She is survived by her brothers Walter, Ralph, Wallace, and Harold, as well as her sister Delia Morrill. Isabell is also survived by her five children: Sherry Gould, Brian, Rebecca, Anita and Seth; 10 grandchildren, 13 great-grandchildren and 2 great-great-grandchildren. # Aaron Timothy Simonton




Aaron Timothy Simonton, formerly of Concord, died March 9, 2022, from natural causes.





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
