MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

Editor's Note: The Select Board would like to invite residents to become involved in Town activities. The public is welcome at all Town committee and board meetings. Attending a meeting is an excellent way to stay informed and have input on decisions. Don't be shy. Board and committee members, your *neighbors, are volunteering to help you* enjoy living in Bradford. Feel free to contact Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, or Erica Gross, Town Clerk for information about Town volunteer opportunities. Currently there are two vacancies on the Budget Committee and one vacancy on Trustee of the Trust Funds.

SELECT BOARD

Fire Department Chief Nowell reported to the Board that they received a \$50,000 grant that will be used for an AED, CPR machine and 3 sets of gear. Chief is also working on a 50/50 grant through NH State Forestry for equipment including a leaf blower, more pagers and batteries. This is a \$2,500 match. The Chief said they are looking at FEMA grants to update to some extrication equipment at a cost of \$49,000. A new firefighter has joined the department. The department is at 100% reporting.

Generator The Board approved a motion to purchase a new board for the transfer switch of the Community Center generator in the amount of \$3,348.56 to be installed by Joe Torro.

Nonpayment of Taxes While in non-public session, the Select Board took the deed for Map 14 Lot 15 for non-payment of taxes. One other prop-

Three-minute Civics: Voting in the September 13th Primary

NH Primary voting, September 13th, 8:00am-7:00pm, Bradford Area Community Center, 134 East Main Street.

Absentee Ballots: New Hampshire voters may vote by absentee ballot for specific reasons. The reasons include; being absent from the voter's city or town, a religious observance, disability or illness, and employment commitments (including caregiving) during the entire time the polls are open. Absentee ballots may also be available when a weather emergency impacts an election. Absentee ballot applications are available from the Bradford Town Clerk or on line at *sos.nh.gov/elections*.

To check your voter details go to *https://app.sos.nh.gov*. Here you will find "View My Voter Information," which will ask for your town, name, and date of birth. The search will pull up the status of a pending absentee ballot (if you have requested or filed one), and below that you will also find your registration status, your polling location, hours of polling, and a link to sample ballots. Checking your current status online now will give you time to go see the town clerk well before the election to straighten out any issues.

Lastly, please be patient with election officials. They do this job only on election days, they have very specific instructions as to how to do their jobs, and they are responsible to the state election inspectors who visit each active polling location. Poll workers also know that they are responsible to the voters. Bradford has great poll workers, and they want to get it done right.

Kearsarge Food Hub Hosts Congresswoman Annie Kuster

On August 24th at the invitation of the The Northeast Organic Farmers Association of New Hampshire U.S. Representative Annie Kuster participated in a listening session with the local farming and food community. Rep. Kuster



currently sits on the Agriculture Committee in Washington and looks to support small-farm-focused food systems in New England. The listening session was an opportunity to let Rep. Kuster hear the collective priorities in the state.

Sweet Beet Market, Cafe, and Farm hosted this event. At the intersection of farms and community, the Kearsarge Food Hub was a fitting backdrop for the listening session. Together with information about the wide variety of funds that will be available with the 2023 Farm Bill, other topics discussed were fair trade of local commodities; the legitimacy of "organic" labeling; land access, affordable housing, and training for young farmers; and limited FDA-approved meat processing facilities in NH. Following the listening session Rep. Kuster and others took a guided tour of Sweet Beet Farm. In the nursery Rep. Kuster witnessed how market gardening is possible in a small space with labor-saving practices.

Land Acknowledgement Statement – We are on the unceded land of Nd'akinna which has long served as a site of meeting for Abenaki people from Pagôntegok (Contoocook), O'quasskikonaquan (Newbury) and beyond for thousands of years. Nebizonbik (Bradford Springs) provided healing waters and people exchanged goods at the village site behind Lake Massasecum, calling this land home. The town of Bradford honors, recognizes, and respects these Abenaki, as the traditional stewards of the lands and waters on which we gather today. In that spirit, today we will begin by acknowledging that we are guests in this land. We need to respect and help protect the lands within our use and share of the bounty with our Abenaki partners today.



To the Editor:

I am writing today due to new developments that have occurred within NH that I hope will reinvigorate the Energy Committee's solar energy plans.

First, economic and geopolitical factors have forced Eversource to more than double their rates for the time period of August through January. This will have a direct impact on the town and its residents.

Second, and more importantly the Public Utilities Commission unanimously approved community power rules that will allow cities and towns to save money and prioritize renewable energy. I would encourage you to read about it at *nhpr*. *org* "Transformative: Community power rules approved by utilities commission" dated July 29th, 2022.

Third, as of August 3rd the Town of Swanzey approved a solar development project that will be a 3.5- megawatt array that will span 15 acres.

Other towns are paving the way forward to move toward renewable energy and save its residents money while addressing climate change. Towns such as Warner, Swanzey and others are setting the example and paving the way for Bradford to follow and implement climate action to set the example for future generations and the country as a whole. Time is rapidly running out to take climate action to preserve the town and state we love for the future; we cannot rely on others or wait to make these changes. I am excited and hopeful to hear what actions the Energy Committee takes toward implementing solar power and community power plans in the future.

• We are also experiencing drought. Bradford is now under a condition of moderate drought.

A Recession Doesn't Equal a Housing Crisis

Are you wondering how a recession affects the US housing market? Here are a few key points to help put some perspective on its impact.

- Interest rates go up at the beginning of a recession but are then lowered to stimulate the economy to move forward. Over the past 5 recessions, rates have fallen an avg. of 1.8% from the peak to the trough. Bear in mind interest rates will most likely rise until inflation peaks.
- Four out of the six times we were in a recession, home prices appreciated. They fell only twice – once marginally in the early 90's and in 2008.
- The number of offers received on a typical home has dropped to 2.8 offers in July, down from 4.5 offers a year earlier. Still well above the prepandemic norm but this shows a moderating of the market.
- In June, 61% of offers were over asking and this has now softened to 51% over asking price on the avg. home sold. Not a huge decline but still a sign of the times. It's still a very competitive market.
- There is a slowdown in the pace of sales. It is looking more like it did in 2018 and 2019, which by the way, were great years for real estate.
- Active inventory is growing but there are still way more buyers than we have sellers. This will continue to put upward pressure on prices.

Thank You


With my heart full of gratitude, love and hope, I write this note of thanks.

erty was discussed, and a lien waiver signed.

Transfer Station Policy The proposed policy had been modified slightly to include the Police Department being able to issue Town stickers if needed. The Board approved the revised Transfer Station and Recycling Center Town Stickers/Placard Policy as presented.

Town Hall Update The Board is exploring long term options for investing Town Hall bond money until it is needed for construction. It was agreed to put the Town Hall funding into a 4-week CD while we continue to investigate options.

Hydrant FD Chief Nowell informed the Board about a pressurized hydrant on Old Warner Road. He said the property is for sale and there is no mention of a hydrant in the deed. He is concerned that the Town's access to this hydrant could be cut off unintentionally by new owners. He asked if the Town could look into getting an easement. Mel will ask Sonny Harris to review the deeds. By consensus, the Board members gave Karen the authority to move forward with legal counsel if Sonny's research didn't reveal anything.

Energy Rates Energy Committee member Sandra Bravo distributed a list of terms regarding renewable energy and asked the Board if they had given any thought to renewing our supplier contract and specifying the use of green energy. Karen noted that this will not be decided for a couple of months. Karen has been in contact with the energy supplier broker discussing the contract which ends November 30. The next rate change with Eversource will take place on February 1. The broker's recommendation is to hold off renewing our contract. She thinks the rates may go down in February and suggests we avoid locking into prices available now.

Daffodils 200 bulbs are being donated by a resident for planting by Rail Trail. NH DOT will review and approve the site.

Lease The drivers' school lease was discussed and renewed. The current rent is \$300/month. There will be no change at this time. The class time is changing beginning in September.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Naughton Property The Committee continued discussion on possible uses for the Naughton Property. Matt Monahan of Central NH Regional Planning stressed that we need to determine how we want the property to be used, and then work backward through the "how" of accomplishing it. He suggested applying to have PlanNH run a charrette on the property. It was noted that the town had done that once before, in 1998. Matt will contact someone from PlanNH to attend the September meeting.

PLANNING BOARD

Fee Structure Matt Monahan of Central NH Regional Planning Commission reviewed the Town's budgetary account and reported that overall, as of July 21, that the expenses of the Town outweigh revenue. Matt suggested the Town increase fees on subdivisions (major and minor) and site plans to help decrease their overall deficit. The committee reviewed fees and will update applications and vote to adopt the new fees.

BRADFORD ENERGY COMMITTEE


Membership The Committee has asked Jennifer Howley to join the Energy Committee and will seek approval of appointment from the Select Board.

Solar Energy The Committee is in the process of obtaining estimates for in-













stalling roof-top solar on all Municipal buildings. Solar companies considered include GSS, Revision Energy, Norwich Solar, and others.

Net Metering The Committee is trying to determine if a smaller group net-metering project on Town owned land is feasible. Eversource previously indicated the grid could not accommodate one MW of new power. Newbury is building a 100 KVA (100 KVA = 1/10th of one MW). This is about 10 times more power than a standard rooftop installation. Committee members Sandra Bravo and Kathleen Bigford will tour a 100KVA installation in Newbury.

CEMETERY COMMISSION

Cemetery Usage The Board discussed discontinuing usage of cemeteries when they are full or have irregular ground issues, etc. Other towns in the area classify their cemeteries as a "Historical Cemetery" and do not allow any more burials.

Baptist Cemetery The iron (rebar) fence along the road at the Baptist Cemetery on Main Street has been repaired by Dave Camire, Jr. The welds had separated and were a safety hazard. Thank you Dave Camire Jr for volunteering time and tools for this repair.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Book Sale The Library will have its fall book sale from 9am-1pm on Bradford

Board Retreat The Trustees will participate in a Board Retreat on October 5 from 5:30-8:30pm. This meeting will be in addition to regularly scheduled Trustee meetings.

Celebration Day, Saturday, September 24.

KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

Bradford Pre-K The Board approved the purchase recommendation for a 25% deposit, not to exceed \$175,000.00, for the Bradford Pre-K project using Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief funding.

Septic Pumps The Board approved the sole-source purchase recommendation in the amount of \$18,687.00 for septic pumps at New London Elementary School from Stearns Septic Service, LLC.

Chromebooks Mrs. Turner informed the Board that Chromebooks are no longer being sent home with middle school students as the damage to the Chromebooks that occurred while at home was expensive. The Superintendent noted that there is currently nowhere for that many Chromebooks to be charged overnight at the Middle School. The Board approved the sole-source purchase recommendation in the amount of \$22,200.00 for 12 charging carts for Middle School Chromebooks (1,850.00 each) from CDW-G.

TRANSFER STATION

Ever since Susan Moss moved to Bradford she has been doing a lot of volunteering, giving, and most recently, passionately educating people about the plastic waste. She mentioned to me that there is plastic everywhere, including on the ground!

In June, Susan hung a poster at the Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center. The poster, entitled "Reducing Plastics in Everyday Life," was prepared by the New England College Climate Action Course. Susan also informed me about "Plastic Free July." It was impressive to hear so many residents talking about reading the article in the Bradford Bridge and asking if we had any ideas to contribute to the "Plastic Free July" campaign. They commented about being amazed at the amount of plastic that they use, and they expressed some ideas as to how they were going to participate in the campaign. They generally indicated that they plan on continuing the "Plastic Free July" beyond the campaign itself.

Susan's clear and adequate education about lightening our carbon footprint through limiting our use of plastics has been effective. 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How the Inflation Reduction Act of 2022 – the "Climate Bill" – Helps NH Residents

For households, the incentives help make things like rooftop solar panels, electric vehicles and energy-efficient appliances more affordable... In all, consumers may qualify for up to 10,000 -or more – in tax breaks and rebates, depending on the scope of their purchases." Some of the specific energy incentives include (with limitations).

• \$7,500 tax credit for new electric vehicles through 2032; \$4,000 for used electric vehicles;

• 30% tax credit for solar panels, wind energy and battery storage technology for costs incurred from the beginning of 2022 to the end of 2032;

• Up to \$2,000 a year for home efficiency projects;

• Rebates on non-appliance upgrades: \$4,000 for an electric load service center (breaker or fuse box) upgrade; \$1,600 for insulation, air sealing and ventilation; and \$2,000 for electric wiring;

• Up to \$8,000 of home energy rebates; and up to \$14,000 via the "high-efficiency electric home rebate program." Households can get to that maximum by buying efficient, electric appliances: Up to \$1,750 for a heat pump water heater; \$8,000 for a heat pump for space heating or cooling; and \$840 for an electric stove or an electric heat pump clothes dryer.

A recent report prepared by BW Research Partnership for The Nature Conservancy in New Hampshire shows that federal investments such as clean energy tax credits, infrastructure investments, transportation and building electrification investments, and reforestation and conservation grants could result in:

• About 4,400 jobs supported annually for 10 years (a total of 43,900 job-years), or 16.7 jobs per million dollars of federal investment.

• Nearly \$350.7 million in value added annually for 10 years – \$1.34 for every federal dollar invested.

• About \$190.2 million generated in employee compensation annually for 10 years.

• Nearly \$40.9 million in annual local, state, and federal tax revenue for 10 years.

The Bradford Energy Committee looks forward to helping the Town, residents and businesses implement many of these options bringing us closer to meeting our energy goals and mitigating the worst impacts of climate change. More to come!

How to Shop for Electricity

One way to reduce your electricity bill is by switching to another supplier. In New Hampshire, no one is required to buy electricity from their utility. Instead, you can purchase electricity from competitive third-party providers that may offer cheaper rates than the utilities. This means that your electricity will come from a provider other than Eversource and you will still pay Eversource to deliver the power.

I will preface this by saying that at a recent talk about energy resilience in NH Sam Evans Brown, Executive Director of Clean Energy NH, advised ratepayers to wait before seeking lower rates. Eversource has the current rate of about \$.22 per kilowatt hour until January 2023. His reason for waiting is that rates are currently volatile and you may wind up paying more than the Eversource rate for many months.

That being said, here's how to shop for cheaper electricity and switch providers.

1) Review the list of competitive energy suppliers at energy.nh.gov and compare the offers that are available. Various providers may have different prices or contract lengths, or offer renewable energy options. As of August 22nd, the cheapest rate was \$.17 per kilowatt hour on a 28-month contract.

2) Carefully consider the rates and terms of the contract. Note that often these

contracts lock in a rate for a long period of time, such as the 28-month contract in the above example. Utilities change their rates every 6 months, so there is a risk that you could end up paying more than the Eversource standard rate if it goes down in the future.

3) Be sure that you understand the terms of the contract by asking the provider questions about the contract. You need to know:

- how much they will charge per kilowatt hour of electricity,
- whether the price is fixed or variable,
- and whether there are additional charges or recurring fees.
- The Public Utilities Commission (*puc.nh.gov*) provides information so you can make an informed decision.

4) Once you decide which provider you want to use, you can sign up to purchase energy from them either online or by phone. The provider will inform your utility of the switch.

5) Your billing may change. Some providers bill jointly with the utility, in which case you would still receive one monthly bill. Others bill separately, in which case you would receive one bill from your utility for delivering the electricity, and another bill for the energy you used each month from the new provider.



Butterflies

Egg cartons aren't recommended containers for raising wildlife, but that is where I once detained forest tent caterpillars to have the satisfaction of watching them eat the lilac leaves I offered them. When I was six, my parents gave me a colorful book on butterflies of North America. Identification was so easy then.

Now there are regionally specific and daunting guidebooks distressingly sprinkled with qualifiers: 'seasonably variable', 'sometimes', 'except for', 'crosses with', variations occur', and,



my favorite, 'species specific identification difficult or impossible in the field'. What color are the eyes on that fritillary? Is there a single white spot on the dorsal forewing? The official Namers of Things are still arguing amongst themselves.

It's birdwatching miniaturized and without sound effects. Upper and lower surfaces are scaled with different colors and patterns. Lights blinking on and off – now you see them and then, with wings folded, now you don't.

Butterflies are a tiny subset of the huge moth clan. Not all moths fly at night and there are even a few night-owl butterflies. Around here, the sure difference between the two is found in their antennae – if you manage to see them. Butterflies have 'clubbed' or thickened tips of their antennae and moths have more options. Antennae can be compared to noses – structures for gathering chemical cues off the wind. There are taste buds at the ends of their long proboscises. In addition, females can 'taste' with their feet in a tap dance performed to select appropriate plants on which to lay their eggs. Some have tympans or 'ears' at the base of their wings and all seem to have decent vision though not as good as ours. They can detect the UV spectrum which we can't. This does not explain why it is so hard to sneak up on a butterfly with a camera and yet 2000-pound vehicles are a major cause for their decline.

Compared with bees and wasps, butterflies are not superlative pollinators.

'Pollinator gardens' are great for attracting adult butterflies and, like birdfeeders, they allow wildlife to be seen easily. But to create more wildlife, the larval food is needed the specific food plants for the caterpillars of butterflies. And in turn, those excess caterpillars will be the food for more bird nestlings. The lawnifying and unwilding of the landscape is a serious problem. Butterflies don't care a fig for our hostas of hydrangeas, rhododendrons or roses. They leave their offspring in the care of nettles and docks, wild violets and asters, sedges, grasses and other uncultivated and largely unwanted species of plants.

New Hampshire is catching up on documenting what species of Lepidoptera are here. We're at the sketchy northern edge of the southern varieties and the southern edge of the northern. The ups and downs of the terrain mix it up further. NH Fish and Game with the assistance of butterfly clubs and land trusts are making note of what was likely to have been here, what's here now, and what changes are likely to occur with the changing of the climate. There are far fewer moths at the night windows, butterflies in the fields, and insects in general compared to when I received that first tiny tome, 'A Child's Book of Butterflies', back in 1959. With my trifocals, inadequate camera, and a pair of binoculars, I will try to assist in the data collection. You can too


