Winter Safety from the Road Agent, Police Chief and Fire Chief

Given the significant quantity of snow we have received recently, it is a good time to review safe winter practices. Please be reminded that:

The Town's Snow Removal and Ice Control Policy is in effect. You may view the complete policy on the Highway Department webpage at *www.bradfordnh.org*.

The Parking Ban is in effect from November 1 to May 1 and prohibits parking in or on the Town's roads or rights of way. The Town has the right to tow

ENERGY COMMITTEE

Municipal Solar Pursuant to the possibility of placing a solar array at the Transfer Stations and the disposition of gravel excavation at the transfer station, Energy Committee member Kathleen Bigford met with the Selectboard in December to determine whether a cost/ benefit analysis for gravel excavation by the Town had been done and was told it had not. Subsequently, Kathleen reached out to Steve Hall about this and found that the process needed to wait until the spring to run tests. Therefore, Kathleen decided to investigate townowned land at the "Naughton" site. That investigation is on-going.

or ticket violators. The purpose of this winter parking ban is to allow winter maintenance crews unobstructed snow removal and ice control routes, as much as possible, to maintain the maximum effectiveness of their efforts.

Pursuant to RSA 236:20, RSA 47:17, paragraph VII and RSA 41:11, it shall be unlawful to plow snow across any and all Town roads, including Class V & VI, or to deposit snow within the traveled portion of Town roads.

Jessica's Law, which is a New Hampshire State Law, is in effect. It requires the clearing of ice and snow off the top of a vehicle prior to driving it. Failure to do so may result in a \$500 fine.

Clearly visible house numbers at your home can save a life. Remember that you are required to have them and to keep them cleared of snow.

Your home's venting systems must be kept clear of obstructions. High efficiency furnaces, water heaters, and other energy-saving appliances may have exhaust vents that exit your building through an exterior wall rather than through a chimney. These vents can become blocked in the winter months by snow and ice, which can affect the safe operation of the appliance. Please ensure that all snow, ice and other obstructions are removed from your venting systems. Thank you for helping us keep Bradford safe!

You've worked hard for your money, now let's ensure you keep it

We are living in a world where most rely on technology on the daily, whether that reason be for business or pleasure.

Regardless of the reasons you use technology, scammers continue to prove that there is no rest for the wicked. Scammers seem to be getting very clever, adjusting their strategies with the times to achieve their goals. What are their goals? To get your personal information and money.

We at the Bradford Police Department would like to help educate everyone by sharing some of the scams residents have, or almost have, fallen victim to as well as what to do if you feel you have fallen victim of a scam. Scammers are like viruses: They continually evolve in response to the latest news and trends, using new ways to separate us from our cash. Some popular current scams are:

Romance Scam

Scammers pose as having an attraction to you online to initiate conversation. In the midst of conversation, they offer to exchange nude photos, with you sending first.

• We also urge you not to send photos of yourself, or body parts typically covered by a bathing suit, to strangers online. These photos can and will be used against you as scammers will threaten to send these photos to your family and friends if you do not pay them.

One-Time Password (OTP) Bot Scam

Scammers are utilizing automated programs to trick people into sharing your two-factor authentication codes sent from financial institutions. Be skeptical when someone contacts you.

• Scammers use spoof calls and emails to make it look like they are coming

from different sources, including government agencies, charities, financial institutions and large companies. Do not share personal information, usernames, passwords or one-time codes that others can use to access your accounts or steal your identity.

Puppy Purchase Scam

Scammers try to exploit dog lovers by offering cute puppies for sale. They offer an initial fee that sounds reasonable and then follow up with additional charges with a promise to refund these charges upon the safe delivery. In the end, you will get nothing.

• If you are in search of a puppy, go to a local animal shelter or breeder. Avoid searching online as this is typically how this scam originates.

Computer Virus or Microsoft Scam

Scammers have found a way to either 1) send a pop-up message to your computer stating that you have a virus/malware or, 2) send a pop-up message to your computer pretending to be from Microsoft or your anti-virus software company. The message will usually contain a phone number to call or a link to allow remote access to fix your computer.

Calling the number will most likely land you on the phone with a scammer pretending to work for the company. They will then ask for remote access to "get rid of the virus" while they are simply combing through your files for your information and passwords.

• Most virus software run scans to detect viruses and then have steps to remove the virus. These companies do not send pop up messages or make phone calls. The safest thing to do, if you receive something like this or if your computer is acting funky, is to call your virus software directly using the number on the software download email or website.

Marketplace Scam

The art of collecting unused items from around your house and selling them at a yard sale is becoming obsolete with Facebook Marketplace and Local Area Online Yard Sale sites. These sites are super easy to use, are a great way to expand your customer base, and not have to sit in your driveway or yard all day for \$20-30.

However, be aware of this scenario: A buyer requests a shipping quote for an item. They then send money in the form of a check in an amount that is usually more than you asked for. Then "due to their error," they ask you to deposit the check and send them the remainder after keeping a little extra for your troubles.


• Do not refund or forward overpayments. Be careful whenever a company or person asks you to refund or forward part of a payment. Often, the original payment will be fraudulent and taken back later.

Bail Money for a Family Member Who Has Been Arrested Scam

A scammer will call you pretending to either be a family member or a law enforcement official that has arrested the like. They want you to send them bail money while not calling their parents because they will get in trouble.

• We arrest a fair amount of people here in Bradford and never, ever have we asked for payment over the phone. Do not send bail money over the phone or web.

How to Avoid a Scam

While scammers' delivery methods and messaging can quickly change, a few basic security measures can help protect you from the latest and most common scams:

• Add multi-factor authentication to any accounts that offer it. This provides extra account protection by requiring two or more credentials to log in. Besides your password, you'll need a second credential to verify your identity. That could be something like a passcode you get via text message, a security key, or an authentication app. Or something like a scan of your fingerprint, your retina, or your face.

• Research companies. Before you make a purchase or donation, take a few minutes to review the company. Do a web search for its name plus "scam" or "reviews" and research charities.

• Be careful with your phone. If you suspect a spam call, do not respond or press a button. The safest option is to hang up or ignore the call entirely. You can always look up the organization and initiate a call yourself if you are worried there may actually be an issue.

• Look for suspicious payment requirements. Scammers often ask for payments by wire transfer, money order, cryptocurrency or gift cards. These payments can be harder to track and cancel than other forms of payment, which can leave you stuck without recourse.

If you're the victim of a scam, you can file a report with the FTC and your local law enforcement. The report may help others avoid similar scams. We also recommend that you contact your bank and/or credit card companies to discuss changing your account numbers and getting new cards and/or checks issued. You should inquire if these same institutions offer some sort of credit monitoring service to protect you in the foreseeable future.

Bradford Fire & Rescue News

January 16, 2023. The Bradford Fire & Rescue Association donated new battery-operated extrication equipment to the Town of Bradford Fire & Rescue Department. These tools will enable the Department to answer calls requiring extrication without having to wait for Henniker to arrive. Pictured here are the new tools and Fire & Rescue Department members participating in an extrication equipment training session. In other Department news: On January 6, 2023, 20 units of blood were collected which equates to 60 people helped. This was a very successful event and thank you to everyone for signing up. Our next blood drive will be May 8, 1-6pm.

As of January 18 the Department has answered 9 calls: 5 fire and 4 rescue. One Emergency Medical Systems (EMS) call was for a possible ice rescue. Please be aware of the ice before venturing out onto it. Thankfully it was a good intent call and no one had fallen through. One fire call was for outside fire and type of material being burned. Remember when the ground isn't covered with snow a

written burn permit is required and the material needs to be clean wood and brush under 5 inches.

2022 finished with 218 total calls up 1.4% from 2021, but with several serious EMS motor vehicle accident calls as well as the gas explosion at the former Valley Transportation building.

Thank you to all the members of Bradford Fire & Rescue for their service to their community and to the Town for their support. We are always looking for new members. Please reach out to the Department if you have a desire to assist in their mission.

TRANSFER STATION

Socializing at the Transfer Station

There's no doubt about it: The Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center is a hub of activity! In the busyness of tending to discards and recyclables and expecting to get the errand done quickly, residents often leave their cars idling while catching up with friends they have not seen in a while. Meanwhile, their forgotten idling cars are polluting the surrounding area.

There are several good reasons for shutting off the cars while doing business at the Transfer Station. First, idling cars produce chemicals that are hazardous to the health of residents, Transfer Station employees, vendors, and others doing the Town's business. Second, idling cars leave residue that damages engine components, increasing fuel consumption, and causes untimely repairs. Other natural resources are consumed when parts are replaced unnecessarily.

Third, most cars use unleaded or diesel gasoline, and idling cars serve to deplete our natural resource of oil.

Please turn off your engine at the Transfer Station. Ken and I desire to maintain the Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center as a safe, healthy, and pleasant working and meeting place for everyone.

Looking Ahead To 2023

In 2021, there were 25 sales in Bradford. The lowest price was \$99,000 for 55 Water Street; the highest was \$600,000 for 311 Fairgrounds Road. The average days on the market was 28 days, with a median of 8 days.

In 2022, there were 32 sales of single-family homes. The lowest price was \$96,000 for 17 Fairgrounds Road; the highest was \$700,000 for 203 East Washington Road. The average days on the market were 28, with a median of 13 days.

So what can we expect from the 2023 Real Estate Market? Towards the close of 2022,

Lawrence Yun, Chief Economist for the National Association of Realtors offered some predictions at 2022 NAR NXT, The Realtor® Experience , in Orlando, Florida.

◆ For most parts of the country, home prices are holding steady since available inventory is extremely low. • Signs point to mortgage rates topping out.


◆ In 2023, Yun expects home sales to decline by 7%, while the national median home price will increase by

> 1%, with some markets experiencing price gains and others price declines.

 ♦ He also projects a strong rebound for housing in 2024, with a 10% jump in home sales and a 5% increase in the national median home price.

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



MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

Municipal Weatherization Updates The weatherization at the Highway Garage has been rescheduled to May 2023. The 2023 draft CIP currently has weatherization projects scheduled for 2024-2026. The BEC has presented the recommendation to proceed with the weatherization of the Fire Station in 2023 to the Selectboard and Budget Committee. Updated estimates from two contractors have been received. Fire Station weatherization could be eligible for 50% savings. NHSaves is in the process of determining eligibility of the project.

Rooftop Solar Updates The Town Hall roof is able to support solar arrays. The Stewardship Agreement the Town has with the Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) requires that solar panels be "inconspicuous on the site and from the public rightof-way and do not damage or obscure character-defining historic features". The Selectboard does not want to pursue rooftop solar. The Highway Garage roof is not suitable to support solar panels. Long term use of the BACC needs to be determined before considering solar. An estimate for the Fire Station has been requested. Rooftop solar at the Library is improbable due to required tree removal.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Membership The Committee approved

a motion to appoint Becca Herman as an alternate.

Funds The unexpended 2022 budget balance of \$415 will be rolled over and put into the Land Protection Fund.

Native Bees Alaina Bandanza has expressed a willingness to give a public presentation this spring on the native bee species found at the Bradford Bog. She researched the bee population there this past spring/summer, as well as the ecology of bees in our region. Alaina remarked that the Bog was one of the most active sites for native bees in all of her research sites!

Groundwater Protection The Warner Groundwater Protection Committee was formed with a grant from NH Department of Environmental Protection to protect the town's drinking water resources from future harmful land uses which may contaminate or compromise the aquifer and wellhead protection areas. The Conservation Commission is planning future discussion if this is something Bradford should consider.

KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

Unanticipated Revenue The Board approved motions to accept unanticipated revenue awarded from Primex for \$6,589.97 for an insurance claim, and \$380,000.00 in the form of a grant from the Security Action for Education (SAFE) Grant.

Chamber Music Festival Oliver Andrews, (Violin in the String Ensemble), Thomas Shepard, (Bass Voice in the


TTBB Ensemble), and Kristen Garzia, (Flute in the Flute Ensemble), were selected for the New Hampshire Band Directors Association (NHBDA) Chamber Music Festival on Saturday, January 7 at UNH. These students were selected to this festival because of their high All State Audition scores.

Purchase Recommendation The Board approved a motion for a \$35,000.00 purchase recommendation as presented in the non-public session.

NHSaves Home Performance with ENERGY STAR – Moderate Income Program



Update on NHSaves Assistance for Weatherizing Homes and Replacement of Inefficient Appliances and Heaters. After our article went to press in the January Bradford Bridge we received some updated information regarding eligibility and benefits for the NHSaves Home Performance with Energy Star Moderate-Income Program. This program helps homeowners and renters whose income exceeds the eligibility requirements for fuel assistance but struggle to cover the required customer copays for the NHSaves programs.

The 2022-2023 Income Eligibility Guidelines (60-80% of the State Median Income) for the program from the NH Department of Energy's Electric, Fuel and Weatherization Assistance Programs webpage is shown in the Table below. As before, eligibility must be determined by the Community Action Program (CAP) at 603-456-2207.

Updated NHSaves benefits for eligible homeowners and renters covers 100% of weatherization (air sealing and insulation) up to \$15,000. Inefficient heating and water heating equipment may be replaced with energy-efficient units. The program will also look to replace inefficient refrigerators and freezers. Other upgrades include new thermostats, LED bulbs, faucet aerators, pipe wrap and potentially replacing windows and doors.

Keep money in your pocket with LED light bulbs!

If you haven't made the switch to LED light bulbs, now is a great time to brighten up the long winter nights with these energy and cost saving wonders. Lighting accounts for about 15% of the average home electricity use. LED bulbs use 75-90% less energy than traditional incandescent bulbs, and at least 25% less energy than Compact Fluorescent Bulbs (CFL's).

With electric rates of over \$.20 per kilowatt hour, any reduction in energy use can make a big difference in your monthly bill. For example:

One 60-watt Incandescent bulb running for 5 hours a day for one month will cost you about \$2. Replace that bulb with a 10-watt LED, which has the equivalent level of brightness, and your cost for running that one bulb will drop to about \$.35 for the month.

LEDs have a lifespan that is at least 20 times longer than incandescent bulbs and 3 times longer than CFLs, which will more than make up for their higher initial cost. Expect to find LEDs for \$2-6 per bulb. Not bad for a bulb that will last 10-25 years! If you have avoided using LED bulbs because the light is too harsh or too blue, it's time to have another look. Look for LEDs that are labeled "warm white" or check the Kelvin (K) rating on the box. You will find that 2700K will feel just like your old favorite incandescent bulbs. 3000-3500K will give you brighter light for work areas. Higher than that and you will be into very bright and bluish light.

And here are a few other important details: Unlike CFLs, LED light bulbs operate well in cold conditions, and frequent switching on and off will not shorten their lifespan. CFLs contain a tiny amount of Mercury, LEDs do not. Some LED bulbs are suited for enclosed fixtures or are dimmable. CFLs are not dimmable.

According to www.energystar.gov: If every American home replaced just one light bulb with one ENERGY STAR LED bulb, it would save about \$580 million in energy costs and prevent 7 billion pounds of greenhouse gas emissions per year, equivalent to the emissions from about 690,000 cars.

Town Hall Update

The project is underway! On January 16th, Trumbull-Nelson officially began work on the project. Prior to the start date, the GMP (Guaranteed Maximum Price) contract was finalized and signed, and LCHIP gave us their thumbs-up to begin demolition and interior wall framing. Since the Town's documents and furniture had been moved out in November, the first task was to remove all the unwanted items and construction debris left behind. Next, several interior walls on the first floor, the old heating ductwork, the dropped ceiling in the old police station, and all the fluorescent lighting fixtures were removed.

The project team held their first on-site meeting the week the demo started. It was helpful to discuss and answer questions while being physically present and able to view the issues at hand. The team is working hard to maximize the energy efficiency of the building while remaining cost effective. This includes installing efficient heating and cooling options, LED lighting, installing storm windows, sealing the building's envelope, and maximizing the insulation – particularly in the attic. These measures will reduce the annual costs of heating, cooling and lighting the Town Hall once it is back in use. The Town is working with Eversource and DMI (Demand Management Institute in Needham MA) to take advantage of grants and rebates for the energy efficiency improvements.

In addition to energy efficiency, the project team has focused their attention on the site plan. With the details of the septic system finalized, and the location of the sprinkler system cisterns taking shape, the project team is pursuing the idea of running the electrical feed into the building underground. Elevation and position of the sprinkler system cisterns are the determining factors as to where the conduit can be laid.

The MVSC is one of over 70 programs and services provided by the Community Action Program for Belknap and Merrimack Counties (CAPBM). CAPBM is one of over 1000 Community Action Programs (CAP) nation-wide, established in May 1965 as a result of the Economic Opportunity Act signed into law by President Lyndon Johnson. The program receives federal, state, county, and local funding supporting its mission to promote the physical, emotional and economic well-being of older adults and to promote their participation in all aspects of community life.

To achieve this mission, the MVSC here in Bradford provides a range of free services including Meals on Wheels and community meals at the Center, health clinics and wellness activities, and a broad range of social opportunities to help fight isolation and keep seniors independent in their own homes. In the months to come, services and activities will be described in more detail in the hopes of enticing newcomers.




