MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

SELECT BOARD

Appointment The Board approved a motion to appoint Rebecca Herman to the Conservation Commission as an alternate.

Fees The Board approved a motion to accept the fees as presented by the Planning Board. The new fees will cover expected expenses.

Fire & Rescue Dept. Updates As of February 8th, there have been 20 incidents. January: 8 EMS, 7 Fires; February: 1 EMS, 4 Fires. The department responded to two building fires in Warner and one station coverage in Newbury. Members of the department have been training for both EMS and fire. Chief Nowell submitted a FEMA grant for \$125,000, mostly for communication equipment and some replacement personal protective equipment.

Unanticipated Revenue The Board approved a motion to accept \$300 in unanticipated revenue from LCHIP per RSA 31:95-b. This is a Stewardship Grant acknowledging submission of the required 2022 annual monitoring report for the Bradford Town Hall and will be deposited into the Town Hall checking account.

Building Permit Fees Brett Pare,

Director of Facilities for Kearsarge Regional School District, appeared before the Board on 1/30/23 to request that the Board reduce or waive the \$8,425 building permit fee for the \$1.2 million-dollar preschool project at KRES Bradford. At the 2/13/23 Select Board meeting the Board approved a motion that the



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Kearsarge Regional School District Budget Update

In these times where everything seems to be going up, there is no shortage of interest in "why". The school budget did go up this year, in spite of a lot of effort to hold the line wherever possible. Most of the increases reflect our budget seeing the effects of inflation (increased fuel and energy costs, health insurance costs, transportation costs, etc.) as well as lesser items like the new teacher contract taking effect, repairs that would have gotten rolled into the STEAM project and Concord continuing to pass expenses over to us (i.e. increased costs in water testing due to new legislation, etc.). For the first time in a while, the retirement rates are going to be less than the current year. Thus, there is a reduction in the retirement budget for the 23-24 budget from the current year.

Another question that comes up is "why are we voting between two identical amounts for the main appropriation?" I like to think this is actually a good thing and comes from the KRSB (Kearsarge Regional School Board) and MBC (Municipal Budget Committee) communicating so much during budget time. These two Boards begin the budget development process with the school administrators as early as August, which includes holding joint meetings so questions could be asked/ answered. This work concludes with the Deliberative Session early the following January, making sure that everyone understands the reasoning for each item, weighs the impact on the overall budget, and can thoroughly discuss any sticking points that might need further clarification.

There was overall concern about minimizing any increases in these lean times and I feel like the School Board and Budget Committee really threaded the needle with this budget. Kearsarge continues to offer a great school experience for our students while being respectful of the tax dollars of all our residents.

Bradford Energy Committee Asks for YES Vote on Warrant Article 25

The Bradford Energy Committee (BEC) is once again asking residents for a yes vote to weatherize one of our municipal buildings – our Fire Station (Warrant Article 25).

Weatherization of Brown Memorial Library in 2021 resulted in a 25% annual reduction in heating oil use. Voters approved weatherizing our Highway Building in 2022, but the project had to be rescheduled to 2023. The Energy Audit Report of the Fire Station dated February 15, 2021 and subsequent update states that ceilings show areas of missing or poorly performing insulation, windows in the training room are leaking and poorly functioning, the exposed concrete foundation wall is uninsulated and gaps around ceiling fans, lights, doors, and the drying tower must be sealed.

Both the Fire Station and Highway buildings were constructed in the early 1980's and much of the equipment is original. Weatherization of our buildings helps to conserve natural resources, reduces our impact on the environment, and should be done before tackling new heating and cooling systems and other improvements.

Although the financial payback of 16.7 years for the \$25,000 Fire Station weatherization project was not compelling, the recently awarded NHSaves incentive of \$11,871, brings the Town's costs down to \$13,129 with a payback of 9.6 years. Please vote yes on Article 25 so that Bradford moves yet closer to transitioning to 100% renewable sources of electricity by 2030 and renewable sources of fuel for heating and transportation by 2050.

Bradford Police Department News

The month of March is fast approaching which means it is time for elections and Town Meeting. Believe it or not, this is one of my favorite times of the year. From getting to see all you residents roll into elections and saying our yearly hello to seeing many other familiar faces at Town Meeting.

On behalf of the staff at the Police Department, I want to start by saying "Thank You" to all the Bradford residents for your continued support over the years. I started my law enforcement career here in Bradford back in February of 2005 and would not trade it for the world. I believe we live in a great area full of great people. It's like "Cheers" just in a different setting. (Admit it, you probably just sang the theme song in your head).

Anyway, I wanted to take a moment and give everyone a quick rundown of the proposed police department budget for 2023.

The 2023 proposed police department budget at the beginning of the process was \$603,548, a 1.44% increase over 2022. Factored into the proposed budget were the following:

- Wages a 5% wage increase for staff which will be a combination of cost of living and merit increase. Along with this comes a small increase in retirement and payroll taxes.
- Gas/Oil you will see an increase in the gasoline/oil line item from \$8,000 to \$11,000. Our gas line was \$11,000 a couple of years ago but has been cut down over the years. No one predicted how much gas prices would rise in 2022 and therefore many budgets came up short in this area. Well, now we can gauge based on the current average price of fuel per gallon. A department study was done on how many gallons of fuel we use a year and the numbers were consistent over a 4-year period. Take the gallons used and multiply by the average price of fuel at this time and that is where the increase came from.
- Overtime The department underwent some staffing changes in 2022. We now have a full-time salary Chief of Police, we lost a full-time officer and subsequently hired a certified officer to fill the vacancy, and we hired a part-time officer to help fill some open shifts due to vacations, illness, court, training, etc. Due to these changes, I reviewed our overtime budget and felt comfortable cutting it 5% or roughly \$1,240. It was also presented to the boards that I would re-evaluate after a full year (2023) with the new staffing and see if this line could be trimmed anymore. Overtime is a tricky one because, apart from mandated training and the 11 federally recognized holidays, there is no way to plan for it and it is a complete guesstimate. To me, overtime is in the budget for unscheduled events such as callouts, open shifts due to illness, injury at work and needing to get coverage or emergencies during or at the end of a shift such as accidents, arrests, natural disasters, etc. Per full-time officer (3, as I only used hourly paid full time employees), we only budget for an additional 30 hours for the above stated reasons, 8 hours for mandated training, 24 hours for court, and 10 hours for sick coverage and holiday pay. Currently Bradford PD is one of the few departments in our area that cover 24 hours a day, 7 days a week. My hope is that this is the service the townspeople are accustomed to, want and expect and that we can continue to provide that. It is very important to me that if a Bradford resident calls for help, they will get a Bradford Officer in a timely manner.
- Utilities A very slight increase in electricity and rent.
- Supplies a very slight increase in supplies to account for the increase in the cost of items.

After the budget made its way through the process from November to February, the only changes made were the overtime line item being cut another 22% by the selectboard in a February meeting. The final bottom line of the Police Department budget recommended by both the budget committee and Selectboard was \$599,026 which is a .68% increase over 2022.

At the 2022 Town Meeting, a warrant article passed to purchase a new Police Utility Vehicle. This new vehicle was go-

ing to replace a 2015 Ford sedan. The new vehicle, a Ford Police Utility Vehicle, was ordered just after the town meeting at the current state bid pricing of \$33,811. The vehicle was expected to take 8-9 months to arrive. We were notified in late August that Ford had discontinued production of the 2022 Police Utility Vehicle and were not fulfilling all previous orders that were not assigned a VIN from the factory. Ford also increased the state bid pricing for 2023 to around \$43,000 and advised it could be a 12-month wait for a new vehicle. My original intention was to go with a Chevrolet Tahoe after the 2022 Town Meeting but there was a substantial cost difference. However, after reviewing new state bid pricing, the Tahoe was now less than the Ford. A Tahoe was ordered in early September and was delivered in late December.

The only department warrant article for the 2023 Town Meeting will be for \$20,000 to fund the police vehicle capital reserve fund. A couple years ago we set up a schedule to replace vehicles every 6 years instead of every 4-5, and the yearly contribution was based on current market prices. Due to the rising cost of equipment and vehicles, which were previously around \$33,000 and are now \$42,000 for just the vehicle, future warrant articles to fund the capital reserve fund will probably increase to 27.5 or 30k per installment. This potential increase will ensure that there is enough in the fund to purchase a vehicle when the time comes. The next vehicle is set to be replaced in 2024.

To reiterate what was said above, Bradford PD is one of the few area departments that cover 24/7 and I take great pride in the fact that we provide that service. It is the service that the residents asked for, have come to expect and therefore will continue. It is a bonus to the town, and speaks volumes to the staff that we have in place, that we can achieve this with less full-time personnel than those around us while, if comparing apples to apples, keeping a budget that is less than area departments who do not provide 24/7 coverage.

Recycling Lithium Batteries

It is amazing how much research must be done in order to operate the Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center safely and efficiently and for the benefit of our environment and family health. I was talking with my neighbor, who is a geologist, about mining metals. He said that mining lithium is really intense – making Lithium-ion batteries expensive to produce. His comments led me to research lithium.

And he sure is right! The environmental impact of extracting lithium is immense. Much of my research gave extraction impact and manufacturing statistics. Here is just one example: To extract one ton of lithium uses 500,000 gallons of water. Mining pollutes the water surrounding the site, misuses tremendous amounts of water, and creates a substantially reduced water table. The use of the heavy machinery that is needed emits carbon dioxide pollution. Fertile land is depleted, causing desertification and disruption of the local weather. Massive amounts of mining wastes are produced and must be deposited somewhere. And there are threats to the health and welfare of the local community. Mining the required cobalt and nickel also creates its own array of environmental and humanitarian impacts. Lithium is extracted in North Carolina, Australia, and other limited places around the world.

No matter how small, recycling lithium batteries is important. Before you dispose of electronics, appliances, and toys, please remove the batteries and place them in the container provided for the collection of all kinds of batteries. When enough batteries are collected, we package them up and send them to be recycled.

Hopefully, the research that is done in regard to running the transfer station is helpful to residents when they discard and recycle their various wastes and when they need to make personal purchasing decisions.



I got in, hoping for some sense of direction and glad not to be in the driver's seat. I noticed the back of his car was hastily packed - jugs of water, blan-

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kets, shovels and our dog. He was calm. But, serious. He pressed down on the gas pedal and I instinctively buckled my seat belt. With disregard for red lights or yellow lines, we pressed our way through downtown and made for the side streets not everyone knew or could navigate quite as confidently as we could. Finally, in the darkness of the winding, dirt road – I could take a breath.

"Where are we going, Dad?" His response, with a wild look in his eye, "Canada, my boy!"

"My boy." He hadn't called me that in a long time. And that look. I remember that look when I fell off my bike at 15 catching a rusty nail as it tore into my knee. Or the time, Sam, clipped the top of the halfpipe on his snowboard landing with a blow that broke his collarbone as we watched in horror from the top. Driving to Canada? Sam lives in Smooth Rock Falls, a town in northern Ontario, a day's drive from the city. It's dark and I've had a long day at the office and in no mood for a drive to Canada. I've driven this route so many times, why now? Smooth Rock Falls is the place Dad always wants to return to. He dreams of fishing on the Mattagami River. The clear blue water, the frequent icy shores, the air so crisp and fresh. He wants to go back there to live and if Sam wasn't traveling so much, he could. There's just the three of us now and when Dad gets it in his mind he's going to Canada, there's no stopping him.

"George, George," His hand is on my arm as I drift back out of a few minutes of sleep. "George!" My eyes focus. I check my watch, it's midnight and we are in a line of cars at the border.



So far in 2023 we have had 25 incidents:

In January: 8 Emergency Medical Services (EMS), 7 Fires

In February, as of the 14th: 3 Emergency Medical Services (EMS), 7 Fires

We have responded to two building fires in Warner, one station coverage in Newbury, and a mutual aid structure fire in Weare.

On February 14th we responded to a reported vehicle fire with exposure to a building at the Naughton & Sons Recycling. The fire went to a second alarm and multiple communities responded to assist Bradford. The fire was contained to two trucks with some exposure to a third, no damage to any buildings.

We have responded to several Carbon Monoxide calls, two incidents had detectors which alerted the owners. Remember to replace aging units and remember to change your batteries when you change your clocks for daylight savings, March 12th, 2023, 2:00 am.

Other activities include: members have been training for EMS and fire; a grant application was submitted to the Federal Emergency Management Administration; we are continuing work with Henniker on renewing the contract for ambulance service; working with Select Board and Budget Committee to finalize 2023 budget; scheduling required service and testing of our equipment and engines with the National Fire Protection Association; conducting a review of statistics for grants and the planning process.

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If not for houses, where would all the ladybeetles that are parked in the upper corners of our ceilings spend the winter?

I have a desk job and a seasonal progression of insects travel through this parched, bright landscape of cellulose and 100% cotton rag. Most are dining on a progression of near microscopic wildlife. In spring, tiny red spider mites will race across my papers. Slender-legged cellar spiders reappear. In damp summers I'll find large numbers of my least favorite insects, paper lice, which will be eaten by one of my most favorites, the pseudoscorpions that indulgently carry their young on their backs. In the deep of winter, after the flies have worn themselves out, an occasional Western seed beetle sadly stalks the window frames. Right now, it's a horde of ladybeetles motoring unconsolably this way and that.

All of these creatures are something of an intrigue and something of a problem. Their bodies caught between my papers leave brightly colored gore or an awkward Rorschach image of legs. Spider droppings and discarded dinners fall on whatever lies beneath. The ladybeetles in their fright or for spite squirt foul-smelling vellow insults.

But ladybeetles are endearing like 1960s VW bugs – they are the pandas of the insect world. Their bright simple shapes remind us of cute children's drawings, which remind us of cute children, which perhaps reminds us of ourselves as cute children charmed by bugs. Books, note cards and refrigerator magnets are adorned with spotted red beetles. At some point however a bazillion live smiley faces all over your windows can put you in a slightly altered state of mind.

Often called 'ladybugs', the hardened wing coverings protecting a pair of fragile wings identify them as beetles. As the only insects in the Northeast known to congregate in winter, their intention is to overwinter as adults in order to eat aphids in spring, mate, lay eggs, and start it all over again. Each may live a lengthy two or even three years. One beetle will find a promising hibernaculum and release an odor to attract friends. There they will huddle till the warm weather of spring arrives. Houses with their many perforations seem at first like prime real estate to them. But the warm indoor air convinces them of an early spring and they turn to the sun for direction – focusing on light fixtures and windows. Nothing in this specie's previous 200 million years of existence prepared them for this predicament and they are still working out the kinks.

They are applauded for eating aphids and other soft-bodied pests. In their short lives from larvae to adult, each beetle can consume at least 5000 insects. Lady-

beetles are one of very few insects that most people can name. This recognition coinciding with the demonstrable human benefit caused the birth of a multimillion-dollar gardening supply industry. The only feasible way of supplying the demand is by unsustainably harvesting beetles from mountainous western states where they amass in tremendous numbers to wait out the hot valley summers. When released on foreign turf, such as New England, the confused beetles promptly fly away as they would in their native setting. Tip: buy lab-raised insects and know that there are other species that are even better aphid-eaters - such as lacewings, hoverflies, and certain small wasps. If you grow the tiny flowers the adults nectar on, don't use pesticides, and they will stay and work for you for free.


There are hundreds of species of ladybeetles, many of which are common in the Northeast and there is an introduced variety, the Asian multicolored ladybeetle. The foreigners are tan to reddish orange with zero to eighteen black spots. A black "M" or "W", depending on your vantage point, on a white background is emblazoned on the pronotum just behind the nearly invisible head. It appears from my indoor survey that they are doing very well here. I have found very few two-spotted ladybeetles which are redder with only two large black spots, few Eastern convergent

ladybeetles, and rarely the charmingly named twice-stabbed ladybeetle which are black with two red spots. Interbreeding occurs and sorting out the exact parentage of my incarcerated beetles would be difficult.

The question remains though: if there were no houses, where would they be right now?

building permit fee for the new building at KRES Bradford not be waived.

Collapsed Building Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, shared a citizen's concern about a property that has recently had a building collapse. As the property is privately owned, Karen suggested sending a letter reminding owners of zoning regulations that stipulate how long ruins may on a property.

Campers as Residence Chief Nowell informed the Board that without a designated address, safety response is unsure where to go. Zoning regulations need to be clarified. This may apply to an estimated 20 sites in town. Karen will ask Matt Monahan to review the regulation. She will also consult town counsel for their assistance in how to proceed.

Budget The Board approved a general budget total of \$2,824,566.

BUDGET COMMITTEE

Fire & Rescue Department Overall Fire Dept. budget is increasing 29% year over year. Beth Downs spoke to the general budget increase saying she objects to any cut in the Fire Department budget. Forty years of neglect have led to this point and Chief Nowell is having to make up for the neglect while running a department. Laurie Colburn asked the Chief if \$15,000 could be trimmed from the budget. Chief responded that there are some creative ways to make it work. In 2022 the department was able to secure a grant for

\$50,000 and had a donation of \$48,000 for a total of \$98,000 which is half of the budget request for 2023. A motion to recommend the Fire Department budget be funded at \$180,000 finding creative ways to make up the difference failed. Following discussion, the Board approved a motion that the Fire Department budget be funded at \$167,000 with the possibility of \$25,000 added from the CIP Fire Dept heavy equipment expenditure.

Highway Department The 2023 request of \$708,187 represents an 18.4% increase. Drivers of the increase are labor resources, fuel, supplies, winter salt and spring repairs, road patch supplies, culverts, chains and blades and dust control. Tim McKenna asked what the cost of buying gravel would be. The estimate that Steve gave is from Henniker Gravel: 3000 yards is \$60K, sand and other material additional. Cost of blasting at the Transfer Station site would be \$246,800, or \$82,267 per year. The Board approved the Highway Department budget request of \$708,000.

Police Department The Select Board felt that the Police Department could reduce their overtime line by \$5248, effectively funding it at the level of the 2022 expense. They have changed their budget to reflect that. After discussion the Budget Committee approved a motion to reduce the Police Department budget line to \$599,026.

Planning and Zoning The Select Board felt that with Matt Monahan carrying out most of the Planning Board tasks of the Recording Secretary, the part-time wage line could be reduced by \$2000. They

have changed their budget to reflect that. The Board approved a motion to reduce the Planning and Zoning budget line to \$15,500.

Public Hearing The Budget Committee held a public hearing on 2/9/23. Budget Committee Chair Laurie Colburn opened the hearing by recommending a total budget of \$2,797,366. She explained that this is a roughly 13% increase year over year with the major drivers of the increase fuel, wages, and supplied. Chris Frey asked if this kind of increase would happen every year. Laurie Colburn and Mel Pfeifle both commented that the only choice to bring down costs is to cut services.

Planning and Implementation Strategy The Committee discussed their planning documents EDC Master Initiatives List and EDC Planning Framework. Committee Member Libby Curtis Webb asked to sponsor a project from the Master Initiatives List, "Refresh Bradford Pines Recreation Area and develope promotional plan to increase recreational use and as a tourism draw". She has already met with Bill Duffy to leverage GPS work done recently as a resource for updated trail maps and has begun reviewing materials she received and gathered. The committee feels this could be a low-resource / high-impact project to be prioritized.


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Town Hall Update

The project has been underway now for about 6 weeks. The project team meets weekly to discuss and resolve issues. The final part of the demolition phase was completed in early February. It included removing the tin ceiling on the first floor and removing asbestos on the east wall of the second-floor stage. To achieve fire code on the first floor, a layer of sheetrock will be installed between the tin ceiling and the lathe behind the original ceiling. The stewardship agreement we have with LCHIP requires we follow the Secretary of the Interior's Standards for the Treatment of Historic Properties. Thus, the tin ceiling will be rehung.

With demo complete, the interior framing has begun and the drawn plans have come to life. We were able to refine the location and height of the Town Clerk's service windows making them more functional, shift an interior wall and expand a closet for greater storage. The plan for exterior windows has been under discussion. A sample of the proposed storm window was sent for our reference. The location of operable and in-operable windows is under review as well.

In preparation for the electricians' arrival on site, the location of electric outlets and data cable connections were finalized. The plans for the doors and door hardware were reviewed with an eye to security and functionality. There will be a combination of doors with keyed locks and doors with swipe access. The lighting plan has also been reviewed and the number of fixtures reduced in some spaces. Lighting will be ample and warm, but not-overpowering.

Lastly, the site plan is inching closer to finalization. There are many factors influencing the final plan – the location of the septic, the depth and placement of the sprinkler cisterns, a decision optimizing the underground electric feed to the building and lastly, the accessibility ramp.
