MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

SELECT BOARD

Unpaid Taxes The Board approved a motion to begin the deeding process for property located at 17 Cilley Lane.

Revisit KRSD Building Fee The request from the School District was to decrease or waive the amount of the permit fee for the new modular building at the Elementary School. At the February 13 meeting the Board had voted that the permit fee of \$8,425 be billed. After investigating the costs of permitting Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, recommended a fee of \$1,500 which the Board approved.


Transfer Station Lois Kilnapp, Transfer Station Manager, asked if the Dump Road could be plowed during the winter whenever there is snow, whether or not the dump is open. Recycling vendors and other vendors need to have access to the transfer station on non-open days. Mel Pfeifle, Selectwomen, will ask the Highway Department to plow Dump Road between 8:00am and 9:00am when it snows.

Health Officer The Board agreed to reappoint the current officer if he is willing to continue, as there are no other officer candidates interested.

Planned Paving Steve Hall, Road Agent, discussed planned paving with the Board. Jones Road and Center Road to Cressy @ \$144,000; Fairgrounds Road to Pleasant View Road @ \$158,000 = \$302,000. Chip seal: Sunset Road @ \$20,317; Old Warner Road @ \$17,640; Breezy Hill Road @ \$3,200 = \$41,157 Total for all \$343,157 This leaves a balance of about \$36,000 in the fund.

March 29, 2023. The 2023 Town Meeting was called to order at 7:06pm and all was said and done with civility and patience by 8:31pm. Most agreed this was the shortest Town Meeting in Bradford history!






One budget amendment was proposed, an increase of \$2,000 to the Parks and Recreation line, for the lake attendant which had been left out during budget planning. The amendment passed and the entire budget passed by voice vote without a question or comment. Unprecedented!

A petitioned warrant article to raise the sum of \$50,000 "for the purpose of razing" the Masonic Building on Main Street was moved by voice vote from 24th on the list to 6th following the budget vote. Supporters spoke addressing the dilapidated condition of the

building and the safety hazard it presents when emergency vehicles enter Main Street. Those not in favor wanted time to consider building usage. A motion was made to table the article to research the condition of the building and the needs of the Fire Department. Mel Pfiefle said the building was needed for at least the next six months for storage of town records while the Town Hall is under renovation. Several others spoke for and against destroying the building. After comments and questions on both sides of the issue Beth Downs motioned to restrict reconsideration of the article. The motion passed by voice vote.

The remaining articles passed with questions and concerns answered by the Select Board, members of the Budget Committee and others. Those attending were reminded that the process of establishing town spending happens at various board and committee meetings. These meetings are all open to the public and are the perfect place to ask questions and voice concerns.

To Our Editor:

Republicans in the majority in the NH House have worked hard to maintain an ideological purity that is keeping all of us in an energy black box.

Nowhere was that more apparent than during testimony in the State House last week [March 16] on HB208 [Establishing greenhouse gas emission reduction goals for the state and establishing a climate action plan] for a Climate Action Plan to help us deal with perhaps the most serious threat we have ever faced as a society, the slow moving crisis of a changing climate.

Every other New England state has such a plan, and one would think that prudence would dictate the good sense of having one in place so that our businesses and our citizens know we are taking the problem seriously. But for Republicans, you would have thought it was a declaration of war on the most hallowed of our sacred rights and values. Testimony from Republican leaders suggested that this bill would have "the government telling you where to go on vacation," for example. Or that the investments in renewable energy called for in such a plan would amount to "taxation and theft."

It's not clear what Republicans fear about looking ahead and planning for the proper transition away from fossil fuels that we need to make to avoid the worst case scenario of a runaway climate. Instead of making a plan and getting the job done, with help from neighbors, we rely on our New England neighbors to do the heavy lifting to diversify our energy mix and avoid catastrophic climate bills for our children.

To Our Editor:

Affordable Housing is an issue facing communities across our state, including our own local towns of Bradford, Henniker, and Warner. Expanding affordable housing is key to bolstering our state's economy. My housing bill, Senate Bill 231, the Boosting Affordable Housing Act, is a \$75 million package of budget and tax incentives that will help create more affordable housing units across the state.

New Hampshire's Housing Finance Authority is a great resource for financing and state-matching funds for affordable housing projects. SB 231 would allocate an additional \$25 million over the next two years to this Affordable Housing Fund.

Using federal pandemic relief funds, Gov. Sununu dedicated \$100 million to Invest-NH, a one-time flexible resource to help cities and towns bring affordable multifamily rental housing onto the market. Communities that approve qualifying projects can apply for grants from InvestNH, as well as grants to help update local zoning rules and tear down dilapidated structures. SB 231 would add an additional \$30 million in state funding to InvestNH, allowing the program to build on its early results.

SB 231 would dedicate an additional \$10 million to fight homelessness, \$8 million for local shelters and \$2 million for towns without shelters that are responsible for housing the homeless in their communities.

Finally, SB 231 would create the Historic Housing Preservation Tax Credit, which is aimed at not only protecting New Hampshire's historic buildings but turning them into housing options for low and middle-income Granite Staters. The bill provides \$5 million dollars in tax credits, to encourage historic conversion to housing. There are a number of buildings in our community that would benefit from a program such as this, and that opportunity will soon be available for all.

In total, the Boosting Affordable Housing Act would dedicate \$75 million over the next two years to a variety of solutions to the affordable housing crisis. I look forward to seeing this important legislation benefit Granite State families.

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Bradford Police Department News

Drug Abuse Resistance Education (DARE) at Kearsarge Regional Elementary School at Bradford

Part of the mission of the Bradford Police Department is working with the community to better the lives of our community members, particularly some of our younger residents in town. This has been done through many means, from hosting a trunk-or-treat, throwing balls at the dunk tank with Chief Shaughnessy, or reading at Bradford Elementary during Read Across America Week every year.

However, one of our biggest outreaches, thanks to a partnership between Bradford Police Department and the Bradford Elementary School, is the inclusion of the DARE program. The program has been a part of the education of 5th grade students at Bradford Elementary school since 2007 when Patrolman Shaughnessy introduced the program to the school. However, DARE has a long history in America and beyond.

In 1983, the Los Angeles Police Department established a partnership with the Los Angeles Unified School District to create a drug resistance education program for elementary school students. The thought behind this was to put a local, human face to the idea of drug prevention. LAPD shared this program with those who asked for it, and since its inception in 1983 it has spread internationally.

Many people think that DARE is all about drugs. This was largely the case at DARE's founding in 1983, but the program has continued to adapt to help young people educate themselves on resistance strategies. The DARE program consists of 10 lessons, and only one focuses on alcohol and tobacco use. The remaining lessons are about empowering students to make educated, safe choices. The lessons explain how to implement strategies to resist bullying and peer pressure. This is all to say, DARE is about a lot more than drugs!

Since the introduction of DARE, DARE America has been updating the curriculum to keep it modern and accurate to both drug use and laws, as well as implementing the most modern and up to date teaching styles to keep students engaged and interested. Chief Shaughnessy has proudly been teaching DARE in Bradford for 15 years and this year he will officially hand the reigns over to the newest member of the Bradford Police Department, Officer Jacob Hubbard.

Officer Hubbard has been serving as a police officer since June of 2019 and has only recently completed his DARE training and certification. Graduating from the training on November 18th, 2022, Officer Hubbard is now equipped with the training and skills necessary to step into a classroom.

Officer Hubbard has a young daughter and newborn son. He has a great understanding and appreciation of the value that children play in our society and how early intervention and providing these growing people with the social-emotional tools to be understanding and assertive communicators. Officer Hubbard has big shoes to fill, but will look forward to being Bradford Elementary School's DARE officer for years to come.

Highway Department News

With the road postings, muddy roads, potholes, and soft shoulders, be careful driving on dirt roads and getting too close to snow banks because the snow banks are made (pushed back) with the big trucks with wings allowing them to stay in the travel way. If a vehicle were to follow the snow banks in the spring it could be possible to find oneself in a ditch. You may ask why do they push those banks back? Well, here are a few reasons: 1. Pushing the snow back is allowing more room on the traveled way, 2. Shelving allows melting of the banks quicker because the snow isn't as deep, and 3. The melting snow hopefully melts into the ditch that we try to clean and maintain each year as opposed to melting into the roads. This is one of the major uses of the grader.

This is the time of year the town roads get posted for weight limits (6 Ton Limit) trying to keep the ruts to a minimum while the frost begins to leave the traveled roads. Bradford roads have been posted as of February 15 and probably will be in place for some time. Unfortunately, trucks and heavy equipment with deliveries are not allowed to use the road system in Bradford until the posted signs have been removed.

Frost heaves and bumps will also be a part of the mix while we will be putting signs out to advise travelers of the obstacles and, if we missed something, please feel free to call the shed at 603-938-5916 with concerns or questions.

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Bradford Fire to the Rescue During Blizzard Hey Bradford Residents,

I wanted to take a moment and share a story from the most recent [March 14] snow storm that pounded the area.

While on patrol, I saw two vehicles in the driveway of the fire house. Not knowing if a passing motorist was looking for help or a possible walk-in medical emergency, I stopped over to offer help. Turns out there was no emergency or motorist assist needed, but it was two Bradford Fire & Rescue members who were getting ready to clear the snow from in front of the bays. And why were they doing this? Because those two members were going to hang at the station to ensure a fast response time if needed. Crazy awesome. These two were later joined by Chief Brian Nowell.



With the storm slamming us left and right, downing trees and wires, causing road closures and whatever else, it was awesome to have them readily available and helping with limited response time.

Fast forward a couple hours and I end up at a wire down across Oakdale Road and a tree down blocking the road just up past that. Bradford Fire & Rescue respond-

ed with cones and barricades to safely block the roadway. I told them the highway department is tied up but they are going to try and get to us to cut the tree up to open the road. Chief Nowell and crew got out a chainsaw and cut up the tree, limb by limb, and cleared the road to make it passable for residents and emergency vehicles. Why? Chief Nowell said this is what firemen do when called upon. It was awesome to see a group of department members so eager and willing to help out and get involved.

And then afterwards, during some down time, they invited me over to the station where they were hanging around waiting for more calls, but cooking lunch, just like you see on TV :) For those interested in knowing, we had grilled cheese sandwiches and tomato soup. There may have also been a cookie or two that met their demise.

Kudos to Bradford Fire & Rescue and what is happening over there under the leadership of Chief Brian Nowell.

Ken, who is a skilled pruner and sculptor of trees, has been pruning our special crabapple tree. Beth and Ken have served to make our Bradford transfer station more beautiful, and their work is much appreciated by all.

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

Bradford Fire & Rescue Report

As of March 20, 2023,

Chief Nowell completed one year as Chief on March 15, 2023. In addition to fire prevention the Department completed inspections and review plans for property change of use.

There were a total of 19 calls: 5 emergency medical services, 14 fires.

Six calls were during the March 14 storm for downed wires and trees on wires and assistance to the Highway Department. The station was staffed during the day for quicker response. [Editor's note: See "Bradford Fire to the Rescue During Blizzard" by Ed Shaughnessy].

Other activities: The Department continues to train every Monday night; servicing our department equipment and engines; attending meetings with Kearsarge Mutual Aid and Capital Area Mutual Aid; and, attending Forest Fire Warden and Deputy Warden training at the Fire Academy.

Town Hall Update

In the past month, the renovation at Town Hall has been progressing steadily. On the first floor, all the studs are up giving life to spaces that offices, meeting rooms, hallways, closets and bathrooms will occupy. Behind the soon-to-be walls and ceilings, the plumbing and electrical work is complete. Wiring for data and phone is on-going. The elevator shaft has been framed and sheet rocked. Installation of the insulation is scheduled to begin in early April.

The repair, restoration and painting of the tin ceiling on the second floor has been completed. The ceiling looks like new! Andrew Pinard volunteered his time and designed a plan to meet the future audio/visual needs of the auditorium. Outfitting the audio/visual equipment needs of the auditorium is not within the scope of this project, however, the wire and conduit will be in place and can be easily connected when funds are raised to equip the space.

In the basement, the floor plans were modified slightly to allow for the addition of a separate electrical room. This room is between the sprinkler pump room and the climate-controlled records storage room. HVAC ducts have been run through the basement ceiling to feed the upper floors.

After much detailed work, the site plan is complete. Locations for the septic system, which has been approved by the State, the sprinkler systems cisterns and the underground electric feed to the building have been carefully arranged beneath the parking area. The underground propane tank will be located on the west side of the building. Once the underground details were completed, the location of the accessible ramp was finalized as well.

Lastly, approximately half of the windows have been removed and taken off-site for repair, restoration and painting. If you have any questions about the project, please reach out to the Selectmen's Office.



(Continued from page 1) **Dirt Road Plowing** Steve Hall is aware of complaints about dirt roads not being plowed. Due to the rain and refreezing, trucks are sinking into dirt roads. The road crew has been making "shoes" for the plows so that they don't dig in.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Project List Review Matt Monahan, Central NH Regional Planning Commission, gave an overview of the type of information that can be found in a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) report. Matt discussed the importance of adding projects for consideration if we will want to apply for EDA funds in the future for them. Projects to be submitted before the 4/21/23 deadline include Bradford Town Hall 2nd floor renovation, assessment, and planning (Feasibility Study) for the Naughton property use, solar panels on town property, and creating a town business incubator. Additional projects to be added based on the EDC project list include a town website redesign, Main Street visibility and beautification, and promotion of local recreational areas including Bradford Pines.

Case Study Mel Pfeifle suggested that the EDC develop a case study as a demonstration of the value of RSA 79E and Economic Revitalization Zone (ERZ) opportunities for a small business interested in a Main Street location in Bradford. The committee agreed this would be a valuable study and could be used as a use case for specific businesses or how properties along Main Street may benefit from the use of ERZ and RSA 79E.

PLANNING BOARD

Directional Sign A question was raised about a sign for Sweet Beet Farm at the intersection of County Road and West Road. The process is to include the sign as part of the site plan and obtain permission from property owner. Pam Bruss has asked that the farm work with the Center Meetinghouse to make it look nice.

Accessory Dwelling Unit A question has been raised about rental of an Accessory Dwelling Unit. Pam Bruss mentioned that rental is not mentioned in the regulations for Accessory Dwelling Units. The sense of the Board is that there isn't anything they can do.

Table of Uses The purpose of the Table of Uses is to make the zoning ordinance clearer. Agriculture does not appear on the Table of Uses. The group discussed and questioned the uses and how to decide what would be allowed. No decision was reached on listing agriculture in the table.

Farewell At her last meeting as chair and member of the Planning Board, the Board thanked Pam Bruss for her leadership. Pam said she would be available for the Board.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Legislation The Board approved a motion to support the NH Association of Conservation Commissions in opposition to NH HB2; AN ACT relative to state fees, funds, revenues, and expenditures, elimination of state licensing and certification of wetland scientists, soil scientists, Foresters and certain other professionals.

Wetlands The owner of property at 493 Center Road will be meeting with the Selectboard March 27, arguing that recent road work by the Town created the wetlands behind their house. The Conservation Commission believes that the evidence shows clearly that the stream and associated wetlands on the property have been there for decades if not centuries, predating any road work in the area. **Trail Maps** Discussion of updates to the Bradford Trail Map included adding new protected properties, removing the Selected Historic Sites due to space limitations, adding a prominent disclaimer noting that parking is very limited at most of the trail heads, and indicating on the map locations where parking is available, including the Tall Pines and the Bradford Bog.


PARKS AND RECREATION

Independence Day Celebration updates registration is open for the 5k Road Race. Patty Heffner will contact Bradford Squares to coordinate a square-dancing demonstration as part of the evening's activities. Select Board has signed contracts with NorthStar Fireworks and Nick's Other Band.

CEMETERY COMMISSION

Repair Projects The Board discussed various projects that need to be done at cemetery locations that include hiring a licensed plumber, install a pressure gauge on the pressure tank, and lower the water pressure in the tank, fence and gate repairs, and debris cleanup.

Green Burials The Board is looking into how large a section can be designated for green burials only. The two cemeteries that could contain a green burial section would be Sunny Plains or New Pond. Once determined which cemetery will be used for this, we will properly mark off the section so that it is easily known.



KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

Boiler Upgrade KRHS The Board approved the purchase recommendation for Siemens to replace a boiler, for the amount of \$564,751.

Cleaning Staff The Board approved a motion to approve the purchase recommendation for Metrowest Cleaning Systems (current vendor) for more cleaning staff at NLES for \$44, 801.


Lead Testing The Board approved the purchase recommendation for Secondwind, our contracted vendor for district wide LEAD testing, for the amount of \$15,791.


Michael Lacross, long-time KRES-Bradford custodian, soon to retire.

Obituaries Alan P. Ritchie



Alan P. Ritchie, 69, a pillar of the Lake Sunapee region ski industry, passed away at Dartmouth Hitchcock Medical Center surrounded by members of his immediate family on February 26, 2023.

Alan was born in Newport, NH, on March 14, 1953 to parents Warren and Myrna (Simons) Ritchie, the second of their four children. He attended local schools including the former Newbury Center School (now the town office building) and Kearsarge Regional High School where he was a member of the school's very first graduating class in 1971. In October 1979, Alan married his beloved wife of 43 years Pamela (Carsley) Ritchie.

Alan was active in multiple sports throughout his life, but skiing became the focus of his professional career, having virtually grown up on skis at Mount Sunapee. He started as a member of Mount Sunapee's ski patrol in 1971. In 1976, he accepted a position as Assistant Ski School Director at King Ridge Ski Area, was later promoted to Ski School Director, and then to Director of Marketing and Ski Services.

In 1983, Alan returned to Mount Sunapee, joining the snowmaking operations team. The next season the State of New Hampshire awarded him a three-year contract as the owner and Director of The Ski School at Mount Sunapee, where he introduced new programs. Afterwards, he joined the Mount Sunapee Ski Club's racing program as an alpine ski coach.

In 1998 - the first season the ski area was leased and operated by Triple Peaks, LLC - Alan moved to Mount Sunapee Resort's grooming operations, later becoming Grooming Supervisor and Assistant Mountain Manager. Then in 2007, Alan was promoted to Mountain Operations Manager with responsibility for snowmaking, grooming, lift operations, vehicle maintenance, and ski patrol. During his tenure, Alan played a key role in developing several summer activities, including ziplining and mountain biking. In 2018, Alan received the John W. McCrillis award and was also recognized by New Hampshire Governor Christopher Sununu for his dedication to the sport of skiing. Alan retired as Mountain Operations Manager in 2019, returning on a seasonal basis through 2022 as head groomer in winter and mountain bike trail developer in summer.

While Alan is best known for excelling in multiple roles in the ski industry, for many years he also led a highly successful career away from skiing in the off-season. He worked in the construction industry after high school and then established a professional house painting business in the late 1970s. He then founded A.P. Ritchie Builders, building several houses in the Lake Sunapee region, including the house in Newbury that he and Pam would make their home for over 30 years. Alan also branched off into constructing commercial playgrounds around northern New England and as far south as Maryland.


Outside of work Alan lived a very active life with his wife Pam. Theirs was a love story - spending time together in all forms, whether reading, gardening, working together on home repair and improvement projects, outdoor sports, helping family and friends, volunteering in support of various causes, or simply appreciating the beauty nature provides.

this decision-making tool is intended for renters, homewoners, and landlords. It was designed to help individuals and communities receive the most money for energy assistance possible from the \$8.8 billion in grants available."

Elevation, the non-profit organization that created the tool, has a mission to "embrace the transformative power of technology to elevate your mission and vision for a more just, peaceful, and healthy world for all."

Answering the survey-type questions will provide guidance on saving energy and opportunities to sign up for further information.

Keep in mind that funds for rebates and tax credits will be available in late 2023. New Hampshire will receive just under \$70 million. In mid-2023 The New Hampshire Department of Energy will file an application for these funds. Once an application is received by the Federal government, it must be reviewed and approved which can take some time.

So, if you can put your plans and purchases on hold until later this year, significant savings will be available.

The Bradford Energy Committee will keep you informed about when and how to get these savings. Also more energy-related information will be coming your way in future Bridge articles.


