MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

SELECT BOARD

Fire Station Weatherization The Board approved a motion to approve the weatherization contract with Shakes to Shingles for a total cost of \$24,386. The project is eligible for a rebate of just under \$12,000.

Highway Garage Weatherization Energy Committee member Sandra Bravo reported that the weatherization procedure for the Highway Garage will be AeroBarrier instead of the foam method originally quoted. The price remains the same. AeroBarrier is a non-toxic, water-based acrylic sealant sprayed into a structure that finds and seals all air leaks. The Board would like Michael Bruss to look at the project on Wednesday, 5/10, and the Board will follow up with a meeting on Friday, 5/12.

Incentive Offer The Board approved a motion accepting the Eversource Energy Efficiency Incentive Offer in the amount of \$19,426.33.

Fire Department Updates Year to date the department has responded to 65 incidents. Overall Fire/Rescue budget has about 71% remaining. Service of all water supply systems has been completed. Firefighter recruitment is active. Chief Nowell is working on a grant for emergency medical devices. Pump/hose/ladder testing was not done last year but will be done this year.

Fire Pond The repair of the fence and clearing of brush at the fire pond on private property off Old Warner Road can move forward. Fire Chief suggested we may want to have an easement in place and a zoning ordinance should be

Red Spruce State Champion in Bradford

Trees have played an integral role in New Hampshire, from the days when



"Bradford Pines" were harvested for the British navy to the forests that still drive our economy today. In 1950, the NH Big Tree Program began in an effort to find, record and recognize our magnificent individual trees. The list of recorded trees now includes over 1,000 county, state and national champions. NH Big Tree volunteers search the state for the largest examples of tree species and work together measuring trees in their local area nominated to the program.

George Beaton, pictured above with the Red Spruce State Champion on Knight's Hill in Bradford, and Seth Benowitz, both of Bradford, became interested in big trees about 10 years ago. George had found a list of NH's big trees and noticed that there were none listed in Merrimack County. They knew about some big Atlantic white cedar trees at the Bradford Bog and a very large ash tree was found during a boundary walk at the Nelson Farm Easement for Ausbon Sargent Land Preservation Trust. After nominating the trees they were measured by Merrimack County measurer and, subsequently, both have been listed on the UNH Cooperative Extension Big Tree listing as county champions.

Since then George has nominated about 15 trees located in Bradford and as of last year there are 3 state champions located in Bradford: striped maple, black spruce and red spruce. These Merrimack County Champions can also be found in Bradford: bigtooth aspen, American beech, paper birch, American chestnut, balsam fir, honeylocust, black locust, red maple and tamarack. Bradford had the Merrimack County champion eastern white pine along the river at the Bradford Tall Pines until recently when it was found to have died.

Kudos for KRES at Bradford



As another school year winds to a close, KRES-Bradford has an active eye

to the future. This month shows a lot of progress toward an exciting addition to the school campus... presenting the Kearsarge Regional Preschool at Bradford!

Ground breaking began in May and the concrete slab was poured to provide support for the building. The four parts of the modular structure will be stored in the parking lot until students have been dismissed for vacation. Construc-

tion is slated for completion in July. Preschool students will have access to a fenced-in playground featuring a mini pirate ship, twin to the popular structure the big kids enjoy every day.

For fifteen years, James House preschool in New London has provided developmentally appropriate learning opportunities for children with a variety of learning needs in all seven towns of the Kearsarge School District. The new facility in Bradford extends these same public services, by offering equitable distribution to the southern tier of the district. Nikki Robertson serves as Associate Director of Student Support Services, covering both Bradford and New London. Ashley Bauer-Hahn and Jennifer Paquette will be the classroom teachers at KRPS-Bradford. They will have the support of two classroom aides as well as Speech Pathologist Emily Whipple and Occupational Therapist Morgan Rice. Together they make a highly qualified and dedicated team, eager to meet their new students in late August.

It's not too late to enroll your preschooler! A few slots remain at the Bradford campus. Applications can be found at the Kearsarge Regional School District website (kearsarge.org). Look for the KRPS link. Both two-day and four-day options are available and the school will operate Tuesdays through Fridays. The Preschool will open on August 29th along with all the schools in the Kearsarge Regional School District.

Preschool hours will be as follows: Children turning 3 by September 30th,



8am - 10:30am Tuesday through Friday. Children turning 4 by September 30th, 11:30am - 3:15pm Tuesday through Friday.

Although Kearsarge Regional Preschool at Bradford is public, it is tuition-based. If financial barriers exist, the staff is willing to work with any families who wish to enroll their preschooler. They offer an integrated program combining children receiving special education support as well as mainstream students, thereby creating a rich community experience for all.

Community Power for Bradford

The goal of pursuing Community Power is to save money and increase renewable energy. Community power was made possible under a 2019 change in state law that allows municipalities to buy electricity for their residents instead of traditional utility companies, giving customers another option for prices and other services.

In Bradford Eversource will still deliver that electricity, and customers can opt out of Community Power programs and stay with their utility's default electricity rate if they choose. Bradford residents are currently paying Eversource \$.21 per kilowatt hour.

The first 10 communities to launch community power programs - Enfield, Exeter, Hanover, Harrisville, Lebanon, Nashua, Peterborough, Plainfield, Rye and Walpole – are serving customers. All are affiliated with the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire, a statewide nonprofit. Early this year about 20 other communities, including New London and Warner, voted in their town meetings to join the Coalition.

The Coalition is offering a rate of 15.8 cents per kilowatt hour, which would save the average customer between \$20 and \$40 a month, depending on how much power they use. That rate includes the state's minimum amount of renewable

energy – about 23%. Some towns may use a slightly higher default rate – about 16.2 cents – which includes 33% renewable energy. Rates are expected to change after three months, as energy markets change and the coalition continues to procure electricity.

Four other communities – Keene, Swanzey, Marlborough and Wilton – are launching Community Power programs in June, with lower rates. Those municipalities, which worked with consultants from Standard Power and Good Energy, will have rates that range from a default of 11.47 cents per kilowatt hour that includes 33% renewable energy to a 100% renewable option priced 13.9 cents per kilowatt hour. Those towns will also have a basic rate of 11.1 cents, which meets the state's minimum renewable energy requirement.

In the coming weeks the Bradford Energy Committee will be presenting the Select Board with what is in our opinion the best way forward with Community Power in Bradford.

Residents are invited to Energy Committee meetings. The next meeting is on Wednesday, June 15th, 5:00-6:00pm, in the meeting room at the Bradford Area Community Center.

Highway Department News

May 24, 2023, Received from the NH Department of Transportation about the Center Road Bridge:

During a recent municipal bridge inspection, the following critical deficiency was noted:

This structure consists of eight (8) steel beams supporting an asphalt-filled steel bridge plank deck. Due to the porous nature of the steel plank deck coupled with exposure to salt-laden roadway runoff, the unpainted steel beams have experienced rapid corrosion-related deterioration with significant losses accruing at the west abutment beamends. Multiple holes have developed in the beam webs at this location, accompanied by signs of crushing at the bearings... in NHDOT's opinion there is no remaining safe calculated live load capacity for this bridge, resulting in a highly recommended posting of "BRIDGE CLOSED". This posting shall be accompanied by suitable barricades at each end of the bridge to prevent vehicular usage.

Due to these structural deficiencies, this bridge has been added to the Department's Municipal Red List of deficient bridge structures. It is in need of complete replacement or extensive rehabilitation to carry all legal loads.

Other current project include:

- To prepare Jones Road, we worked with a local tree company, Cut Above Tree Service, to remove a 103 foot pine tree that was in tough shape and becoming unsafe.
- There are "Road Work Ahead" signs posted on Jones and Center Roads giving people notice of significant work there in the near future. Also at times there may be detours or road closures allowing for work to be completed. The work will include cleaning brush/tree debris, ditching, replacing culverts, patching the deteriorated asphalt and then Pike Paving will pave up to Cressy road. This work is part of the

road maintenance program with funds approved at Town Meeting.

- Repairs are being made due to wash outs mostly in ditch lines on Marshall Hill, Hogg Hill, Rowe Mountain, and West Road.
- A culvert on Deer Valley Road has been replaced after a hole in the middle filled with gravel and didn't allow water to flow.
- Four Highway Department employees attended a certified training class last month and we all have our certificates for properly installing new as well as replacing existing culverts.
- We have screened some winter sand. I know I said that bad word, but we're prepping for later.
- We are fortunate to be able to get asphalt grindings from the I-89 project through Weaver Brothers Construction which we will add/mix to our crushed gravel to make it go further on our gravel roads.
- Road sweeping is going on as we speak and should be finished by Memorial Day weekend.
- This work is happening as we do the day-to-day aspects of the job like grading, adding gravel, patching potholes, etc.

I'm sure I'm missing something, but, as always, if anyone has concerns or questions, please feel free to stop in or call our shop.



Fire Department Update

Fire and EMS incidents:

Year to date 72 Incidents (39 EMS, 33 Fire), April: 11 incidents (6 EMS, 5 Fire) May: 13 incidents to date (8 EMS, 5 Fire).

Events:

- May 9th, Red Cross blood drive was well attended with 13 units of blood collected, less than our first drive.
- May 22nd, FD training continues with a swift water instructor training us in proper water rescue techniques.

The Fire Department sign program is in full swing. It's been well received and two shipments have been delivered



and many have been given out to the residents who ordered. Orders are always welcome. This program not only benefits our emergency services but it also allows delivery services to find the correct address to deliver your goods.

The Fire Department also purchased a sign for the Police Department and highway street numbers so they can be located. This service is also offered to individuals in need of financial assistance.

IT'S THE LAW - FIRE PERMITS REQUIRED

Do I need a permit to burn? YES - Every person, firm or corporation who kindles or causes to be kindled any fire or burns or causes to be burned any material, except when the ground is covered with snow, SHALL obtain a written fire permit from the Forest Fire Warden in the town or city where the fire will be kindled.

What materials can be burned with a fire permit? Only burning of untreated wood, untreated pallets, campfire wood, brush, or charcoal is allowed. Wood can be NO GREATER than 5 INCHES in DIAMETER. Construction or demolition materials shall not be burned.

What does "Open Burning" mean? The burning of any material without passing through a stack or chimney from an enclosed container. Portable fireplaces are considered open burning.

Do I have to stay with my fire? YES - "Attended" means that an individual is responsible and able to immediately extinguish the fire, and has the fire in plain view.

What is a "completely extinguished fire"? A "completely extinguished fire" means to extinguish, with water, so that it emits no smoke, heat or flames.

Recycling Low-Density Polyethylene

Do you want to keep your plastic bags and wrap out of the waste stream? Recycle them on your grocery run. Drop off containers can be found at Hannafords and Market Basket.

Low density polyethylene is a lightweight plastic material that is flexible, yet strong. Examples of accepted items are: Clean product overwraps that are free of paper and tags, plastic that covers paper towels, newspaper delivery bags, dry cleaning bags, cling wrap, bread bags, air pillows, shrink wrap, food storage bags, produce bags, shopping bags, bubble wrap, granola wrappers.

Recycled low-density polyethylene is used to make outdoor tables and chairs, benches, play sets and various other structures. Recycling these low-density polyethylene plastics helps to keep them out of the waste stream and thus reduces Bradford's municipal waste tipping and hauling fees. There is also the benefit to our natural and aesthetic environment.

Some town residents have reported that since they started recycling this type of plastic, they have less trash and make less trips to the transfer station. Those who have completely stopped using plastic make even less trips to the transfer station! Ken and I appreciate those who are thoughtful recyclers.

Wanting to do something with your family, but also wanting time alone, feeling ambivalent about how to fill this ONE day. I decided several years ago, I resented this hallmark holiday and all the expectations that came along with it and I didn't want to celebrate. I wanted to carry on as usual, like all the rest of the days in the year. Most days, as a mother, I feel loved and joyful, whereas others I feel neglected, upset, angry, and annoyed. Usually, these are moments in time that eventually pass, whereas others (the fight around understanding how to parent in this technological age) lasts much longer.

I often can't believe how desperately I wanted to be a mother, to have a family. I started a little later than some of my peers, right around my thirties, and I expected to be pregnant within the year. This did not happen. Instead, the next six years of my life were spent in doctor's offices undergoing a variety of medical tests, feeling under incredible stress, changing my diet, going to acupuncture, and at one desperate moment, I hung a picture of a unicorn in my bathroom thinking this magical creature would assist in my fertility. It did not. As I entered into my fifth in vitro fertilization attempt, we started to

entertain the idea of adoption. Serendipitously, we were introduced to a woman who was twenty and in her seventh month of pregnancy. Our IVF attempt did not work, but we were so lucky to be in the delivery room with Whitney and our son, Jonathan, who is now 14 years old. The adoption process was a surreal experience. We witnessed the supreme love and also loss that Whitney experienced. Later, I did go on to have a successful pregnancy during our last IVF attempt. I think it was because I had actually relaxed, and already had a child, that aided to my success, but who knows. What I do know, is that it's okay that I miss my child-free life, even though I pursued with fervor what is my current life. Time alone and having a job is necessary for me to be a decent mother. I savor the beautiful moments, but realize this happens in between the humdrum, the routine, and sometimes the boredom (watching baseball games).

As the spring season winds down and summer is set to begin on June 21st, there are a few things that the Police Department would like to remind everyone about.

French's Park is a fabulous little hidden gem located on Lake Massasecum. It is a great spot for Bradford residents to enjoy some time in the sand, swimming in the lake or bbging in the picnic area using the grills on site. Rules of the park are posted when entering through French's Park Road, Reminder, one must have a Town of Bradford sticker affixed to the window of their vehicle when parking. If you need a sticker, please stop by the transfer station during business hours to have one affixed to your window. Please do not place your sticker on your dashboard and please do not lend it out to out-oftown friends so they can use the facility. Out-of-town guests should be in your vehicle with you. A penalty for parking

without a sticker can result in a citation for violation of a town ordinance.

Lake Massasecum has a public boat launch on the south end of the lake. Once boats are launched, cars/trucks/ trailers need to park in the posted areas on the northbound and southbound sides of Route 114 or backed in the lot directly across from the boat launch. A penalty for parking in violation of the signage can result in a citation for violation of a town ordinance.

Please remember to pick up after your dog(s) and that dogs must be on a leash when off your property. Also, Warren Brook Park on Old Warner Road (Home of Bradford, Newbury, Sutton Youth Sports) is private property and a petfree facility.

Bradford is a lovely town, as are those around us, so please drive responsibly and soak in the views.

Nature's Way at SHEI: Holistic Wellness Program for People Living with Paralysis or Other Physical **Disability**

Sunset Hill Educational Institute (SHEI), a small nonprofit in South Sutton NH, is offering a holistic wellness-based program for people living with any form of paralysis or other physical disability, called Nature's Way at SHEI. The program was developed by Andy Jeffrey, board certified Holistic Health Coach, in conjunction with the SHEI/Nature's Way Advisory Council. This program will be held at the SHEI facility on its barrier-free grounds that include wheelchair accessible pathways and restroom.

Program content will focus on the lessons nature has to offer, such as: resiliency (the ability to successfully adapt to challenging experiences) and a growth mindset that nourishes purposeful living, a skill that can be obtained no matter your level of physical ability. Throughout the program, you will discover various forms of breathing/visualization techniques that quiet the mind, and encounter empowered opportunities to share experiences with peers that will build a supportive community for you beyond these lessons. These Nature's Way program lessons will be guided by peers of physical disability, two women living with paralysis due to spinal cord injury, in a small group setting that is outdoors in a beautiful location with mountain range views. Town Hall Update

The interior of the Town Hall has changed significantly in the past month. The walls which were previously only framed-in have now been sheetrocked. This gives perspective to the spaces and rooms within the building. All of the windows have been restored and returned to their original location. The basement and the second floor have been sealed with AeroBarrier.

The last few cosmetic decisions have been made including flooring and carpeting. With the exception of a couple small areas to receive carpeting, all the hardwood currently in the building will be refinished. The auditorium paint colors have been selected as have bathroom and kitchenette fixtures. The transaction windows for the Town Clerk/Tax Collector and the Selectmen's Office have been finalized and ordered.

The preparation of easements by Eversource has taken over four months and held up the start of the site work. Once the signed easements are received, Eversource will order the new transformer and schedule the work. In the process of mapping out the dig zone for the sprinkler cisterns, it was determined that several trees will need to be taken down.

The project is also waiting for approval from LCHIP before finishing the ceiling in the meeting room on the first floor. Part of the stewardship agreement following the acceptance of LCHIP funds in 2015 requires the Town to seek LCHIP approval before alterations to the building's historical defining features are made. Also awaiting LCHIP approval are the removal of the old concrete wall with broken railings on the west side of the building, and the design of the new main entry on the east side of the building.

Looking ahead to June, interior work will include sealing the first floor with AeroBarrier and beginning the painting. Preparation for the site work, which includes installation of the sprinkler cisterns, septic system and underground electrical feed to the building, will begin as soon as tree work and easements are confirmed.



investigated. The Board had a consensus that an easement should be pursued. Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, will work with the Town's attorney.

Police Department Updates In 2023 there have been a total of 1,416 incidents. April incidents were 299. Communication equipment is ordered per the 2023 Warrant article. The Select Board supports the reinstallation of the speed bump on Old Warner Road by the ball fields, Chief Shaughnessy will check with the highway department to have this done. Sgt. Flanagan is updating business and seasonal residents contact information so folks can be contacted in case of an emergency or alarm.

Benefits The Board approved a motion to change the present benefit waiting period of 60 days to the first of the month after the date of hire.

Transfer Station The question has been raised about residents of other towns using the Bradford Transfer Station.

The Board decided that residents of other towns can continue to use Bradford Transfer Station until regulations are clear and published. Karen will ask Lois to research rules.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE

Naughton Property Committee member Kris Foss presented further about the potential use of the Naughton Property and presented a map of the downtown areas. She stressed that this needs to be an overall vision from the EDC and other town committees and boards that includes a wider look at the downtown area as a place where townspeople gather for shopping, recreation, community engagement and business. This is not a stand-alone project proposal from a foundation, but instead, a vision aligned with the town's Master Plan and based on the evolving needs of the town. The Committee agreed to continue shaping the vision, in collaboration

with other committees and boards.

Solar Update Energy Committee member Kathleen Bigford gave the EDC an update on the solar project the Energy Committee was exploring. Currently, due to a variety of cost and grid capacity issues, the Energy committee has decided against pursuing solar at this time. Instead, they are exploring Community Power. There are 10 municipalities in NH participating already and seeing a return in electricity rate savings for their residents

PLANNING BOARD

Election of Officers The Board approved motions to make Katie Olohan Chair and Carol Troy Vice Chair.

Schedule Currently Matt Monahan's schedule in Bradford is the mornings of the first and third Wednesdays of the month. There is little to no activity for Matt on those days. Suggestion is to adjust Matt's schedule to the Wednesday following the Tuesday Board meeting and on an as-needed basis.

Site Plan The Board reviewed the site plan application for Ashley Miller, Map 11/ Lot 58 for the proposed use of residential/cottage rentals and tent site rentals. Dan Higginson answered questions from the Board regarding the application. Dan explained that the in-

tent is not to have permanent residents. There would be no use of the address to register a car A site walk was completed on May 17.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Election of Officers The Board approved motions for Brooks McCandlish to be Chair and Nathaniel Bruss to be Vice Chair.

Buildable Lot The building inspector has not decided on the buildability of the lot located at Map 3/Lot 21, Ring Hill Road. Laura Hallahan, realtor for the lot and Dennis Mitchell, an abutter, appeared and asked for clarification about the 2-acre rule. Brooks McCandlish spoke for the Board saying that the Board cannot make a judgment without a formal application of complaint. However, when there is no building inspector decision, the ZBA can decide. The lot appears to meet the requirement for grandfathered non-conforming use and appears to be buildable based on the intent at the 1974 subdivision.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Native Bees Program Alaina Bandanza will give a public presentation on native bee species found at the Bradford Bog while performing research there





this past spring and summer. It will take place at Brown Memorial Library on Saturday, June 10 from 10-11am.

Bradford Pines Natural Area Many thanks to Seth Benowitz and George Beaton for creation and installation of the signs along the trails which read 'Please leave all plants and animals where you find them'. Sadly, George reported the demise of the NH State Champion White Pine at this site.

Permit There are continued erosion concerns for the Chivers property on Breezy Hill Road due to the leveling of property to increase landing sites for the piles of logs stored there. Commission members Brooks McCandlish and Ann Eldridge will compose a letter to DES regarding the need for an Alteration of Terrain permit.

Complaint A concerned citizen notified the Department of Environmental Services (DES) on 4/26/23 regarding the Twigs business site along Rte 103 being underwater due to flooding from

rain. Twigs has 20 days to respond to the complaint.

ENERGY COMMITTEE

Community Power Committee members Jenny Howley and Kathleen Bigford have met with leaders of the successful initiatives in Warner and Keene to switch to community power suppliers. To begin the process of pursuing Community Power for the town of Bradford, Kathleen and Jenny have given the Select Board their "Community Power 101" sheet as an introduction in advance of a formal presentation from the BEC on the benefits of community power to town residents. With Select Board approval, the Committee will make a formal recommendation to contract with a supplier (a non-binding contract) and begin the long process of planning, public meetings, and final town vote as a warrant article at town meeting 2024.

Library Weatherization The 2021 weatherization of the library resulted in a 25% annual reduction in heating oil use during the 2022 heating season.

LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Trustees Following the March Town elections the Board of Trustees now has an extra Trustee Robin Steiner has agreed to be an alternate which will restore the Board to the 7 required by bylaws.
