MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

[Editor's Note: "CIP" which stands for Capital Improvement Program is mentioned several times in this month's briefing.]

SELECT BOARD

Building Permits At the August 28th meeting the Board and Walter Royal, Building Inspector, agreed that permits in process will be available to the Board on Mondays for review before their meeting. If the Board has no questions, the permits will be signed by the Board and passed back to Walter to contact the permittee. If there are questions, Walter will appear at the next Board meeting to discuss. At the September 11th meeting the Board signed 2 permits. Selectwomen Beth Downs asked why demolition at the Sunshine Farm barn happened before the permit was signed. Walter explained that while the building was being emptied, previous structural damage, of which the owners were unaware, caused the barn to collapse. The Board would like citizens to know that planning is necessary before buildings are built or changed. As of August 28, 2023, they are signing all building permits and that permits are not valid until signed.

Tractor Repairs The Board approved a motion to take \$3,028.38 from the 2015 Town Equipment Repair and Purchase Expendable Trust Fund for the repair of the transfer station tractor.

Community Power Jenny Howley, Bradford Energy Committee member, reported that the committee has investigated two community power providers and has chosen the Community Power

Town Hall Update

I had hoped to be sharing the date for a Town Hall re-opening celebration in this month's update. Unfortunately, we're not there yet though the project does continue to move forward.

The majority of the site work has been completed. The concrete for the accessible ramp and main entrance stairs was poured. The finishing touches of the main entrance porch are nearly complete. Jason Allen, Merrimack County Customs, is fabricating the railings for the ramp and stairs and donating them to the project. Thank you, Jason!

The Bradford Community Gardeners have met onsite a couple of times and begun work on landscaping. They have decorated the front of the building (at the base of the flagpole) with two barrels bursting with fall plantings. The barrels will be relocated closer to the building once construction is complete. The Gardeners have also begun long overdue maintenance on the two small shrub gardens in front of Town Hall.

Getting permanent power to the building remains our biggest challenge. A new pole to carry three-phase electricity to the building has been set. A last-minute change had to be made to one of the electric panels, which readied us for the new transformer. Eversource has been elusive in sharing the delivery date of the transformer. The work to run phone lines to the building has been scheduled with TDS.

Dear Editor,

In late August, as my husband and I were putting our kayaks in the water, my feet came out from under me, and I did a faceplant on a rock. I knew immediately there was a problem and 911 was called. Within minutes, I was being assessed and treated by the Bradford Rescue Squad members Felicia Starr and Jimmy Raymond; the Police and Fire units were right behind.

I want to acknowledge the professional, efficient, and caring service given to me, from the moment I sustained my injuries (broken nose and lacerations to my face/requiring stitches). Every step of the way was seamless and uniform. I was transported by the New London ambulance (who were excellent) and taken to N.L. Hospital. I was wheeled right in and seen by the nurse and doctor. I had CT scans shortly thereafter and then stitches. I was discharged from NL Hospital, with a referral to DHMC. The entire process was streamlined and impressive.

It goes without saying, it took a 'wake up' call, to acknowledge the wealth of services here in Bradford and the surrounding towns. They have provided my family security for so many years, and yet they fly under the radar (an insurance I expected).

The Bradford Fire and Rescue Team work 24/7, to ensure safety for our home and family. I have made donations to many other local organizations, but not to Fire and Rescue. In the spirit of giving, I hope you put them on your list, for the ongoing advancements needed in technology and equipment. They have a limited budget, which they rely on for schooling and equipment to bring us the best insurance possible.

Inside the building, the tin ceiling and crown molding on the first floor has been installed and will be painted soon. Acoustic tile have been installed in the office and work areas on the first floor. The painters are finishing up the final painting and touch up work. The wood floor in the front hall and historic front stairs have been refinished. The piping from which lights will hang over the stage has been installed.



Storm windows have been installed. The elevator and the lift from the second floor to the stage are installed and are awaiting permanent power to be tested. The well pump was tested, failed and subsequently replaced. This has allowed the plumbers to test their handiwork.

The final backfilling and spreading of gravel in the parking area will be completed in October. Final insulation of the attic will be done once all second-floor wiring and ceiling work is complete. And with luck, permanent power and phone lines will be run.



Highway Department Update

We have completed the culvert replacement and paving on Fair Grounds, Jones and Center roads. The next step will be what we call backing up the pavement which is placing gravel next to the pavement on the ditch side of the road so there won't be any drop off. The reason for doing this is to protect the pavement from cracking and breaking on the edge and also to have a smooth surface to drive on along the edge. This will be taking place the week of September 25 and will probably take 3 or 4 days if all goes well.

The Highway Department continues to respond to damage from the recent heavy downpours and flood events, While making road repairs driveway culverts have been identified as a point of concern. Culverts and clean ditches are critical to directing water flow, preventing erosion, and reducing the risk of roads and driveways being washed out. When properly installed and maintained, culverts are an invaluable resource for protecting town infrastructure, private property, and our local water bodies.

We realize that some property owners may not be aware that under state statute, they are responsible for the culverts that connect their property to any town roadway. Per RSA 236:13:

"Residents have continuing responsibility for the adequacy of the access (to Town maintained roadways) and any grades, culverts or other structures pertaining to such access, whether or not located within the public right of way."

This may include but is not limited to the installation, maintenance and repair of a driveway culvert. Professional installation and regular inspections can help ensure that they remain in good condition and able to function properly.

Fire and Rescue had a combined remainder of 50.98% with some invoices still outstanding.


The Fire Department received \$8,714.28 as a result of a FEMA grant. The town matches 5%, \$435.72, Gear purchased with grant funds is starting to be received.

As described previously in this column, the Mountain View Senior Center offers **Meals on Wheels** for those who are 60+ years old, homebound and unable to prepare healthy meals on their own. Every Monday, Wednesday and Friday, drivers deliver over 80 meals to those in the Kearsarge area who might not otherwise be able to get nutritious meals on a consistent basis. Four dedicated drivers are the backbone of the Meals on Wheels program.

Rick Ellis, who delivers 22 meals over a 48-mile route, had retired from a 22 year career as a nurse for about a year when his wife encouraged him to consider taking on the delivery job. After such a long career of helping people in need, this seemed like a perfect way to continue giving in retirement. Like the others, Rick enjoys helping his clients and knows that his interaction with them is not always about the food. He has been able to help them with everything from finding the resources to weatherize and/or heat their homes to fixing the occasional broken doorknob.

Melissa Sieradski delivers 28 meals per day on a 60-mile route. Previously, she volunteered with Open Hands, an outreach effort to help Concord's homeless population. When that program shut down, she looked for another way to help those in need and decided to join Meals on Wheels as a driver. Melissa knows that being there consistently. not only to deliver meals but to make sure her clients are doing well, is an essential part of her job. She just got a puppy, Chase, who often comes along on her delivery route. All her clients love Chase and look forward to his (and Melissa's) visits.

Sandy Wadlington, who delivers 20 meals per day over a 70-mile route, was looking for an opportunity to interact with people away from her isolated life

as a self-employed artist. She loves the beauty of the back roads she travels and the seniors she visits. It's not always an easy job, she explains, but it's important to listen to her client's needs beyond food and support them whenever possible.

Lisa MacDonald, who delivers 11 meals per day on a route covering approximately 48 miles, took on the delivery job because she loves people, especially the elderly. Lisa was grieving the loss of her sister when Melissa invited her to come along on a delivery trip to see what the job was like. Lisa immediately

clicked with Melissa's clients and decided to take on a delivery route of her own. Now, she explains, delivering food and checking in on her clients is the reason she gets up on delivery days. She often does a little extra, for example, giving out cards and flowers or candy on Mother's and Father's Day. According to Lisa, "When they smile, I smile!"

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Is It A Buyers or Sellers Market?

While we are not seeing the frenzy among buyers to the level of a couple of years ago, buyers are still very active. When a new listing hits MLS, they come out in hopes of this being "the one". Many of them have already submitted offers on other homes but were not successful. There are often still multiple offers on a property and, on certain properties with special features and appeal, there can sometimes be 20 or more, but that is more uncommon than it used to be. Properties (those which are priced properly) are still often achieving a selling price over asking, but these can be \$1,000 or \$5,000...not nearly as often the \$25,000-\$50,000+ over we had seen in the past.

The current atmosphere reflects a bit of settling down, but it is clearly still a Sellers' market! Don't think that you have "missed" the best of the market. There is another factor working to your advantage...the astonishingly low inventory of homes on the market. Earlier in September, the NAR (National Association of Realtors) reported that were only 3 months' supply of available homes, as opposed to the usual six months. Selling prices are continuing to rise because there simply aren't enough homes to meet the demand, Experts still expect a continuation of the more normal appreciation in home value continuing into the foreseeable future, i.e., + 4.18% by 2007.

SO, if you have been thinking about selling, we'd be happy to help you assess whether this is an appropriate time for you to sell. There is always some seasonality to the market, but the numbers of active buyers do mitigate that somewhat.



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Bradford Community Power Moving Forward

On September 18th the Bradford Energy Committee hosted a public information session on Community Power with a presentation by the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire. The Coalition shared how Community Power would help Bradford residents and businesses save money on electric bills, and how joining the Coalition would provide additional benefits of being part of a New Hampshire community driven organization.

On September 25th the Bradford Select Board approved two motions regarding Community Power. The first motion vas for the town of Bradford to join he Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire. There is no cost or obligation to the town when joining the

> Coalition and membership provides a way for Bradford to access the many resources that the Coalition has to offer for pursuing Community Power. The second motion was to establish an Electric Aggregation Committee for the town. Jennifer Howley

and Kathleen Bigford were appointed as the two members of this committee. The Electric Aggregation Committee's main responsibility will be to work with the Coalition to create a Community Power plan for Bradford.

Next Steps and Timeline:

- October 2023 January 2024: The Coalition will assist Jenny and Kathleen in creating a Community Aggregation Plan which will be submitted to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC) for approval.
- Later in 2023 and early in 2024: Two public hearings are required to ensure Bradford residents understand the plan and process.
- March 13, 2024. There will be a Community Power warrant article for the town to vote on at the 2024 Town Meeting.
- March June 2024: Once a warrant article is passed and the PUC approves the Community Aggregation Plan, a public outreach and education campaign will be launched to inform residents of their power supply options and prices.
- Summer of 2024: Officially enroll residents and launch Bradford Community Power!

In October the Energy Committee will be putting together some online resources to share information and answers to frequently asked questions.

Coalition of NH. The Energy Committee and the Coalition have arranged for a public information session on Monday. September 18 at 6:00 pm at the BACC. The Board approved moving forward with the process and agreed to the September 18th meeting.

Appointment The Board approved a motion to appoint Rebecca Herman to the Local River (Warner River) Management Advisory Committee. This is a new appointment.

Parking Andrew Pinard appeared to voice concerns about parking and turning around in and around his property on Church Street. Andrew suggested signage on the road that can be seen in all seasons, and that there be a public detail to regulate parking for occasions requiring parking in the area. Mel Pfeifle, Selectwomen, said that the signage improvements are a good idea and that organizers of events are told that a public detail paid for by the organizers is necessary. Property lines of the town need to be investigated to define parking possibilities. Steve Hall, Road Agent, has ordered signs to be placed to indicate where parking is permitted.

Expense Review All expenses are within range. About 33% of the budget year remains and many departments have 40% remaining.

Police Department Ed Shaughnessy, Police Chief, reported that police calls are about the same as last year. The department has 41% of the budget remaining with 35% of the budget year left. Dispatch for next year will be going up about \$10k due to infrastructure upgrades in hardware and software. Ed informed the Board that cruiser replacement remains necessary at every six years rather than nine as was recently discussed in the CIP Committee. There are currently three police vehicles.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT **COMMITTEE**

Town Website Kris Foss reported she and Karen Hambleton, together with Fire Chief Bryan Nowell and Maureen Brandon sat through demonstrations from Revize and Civic Plus. The pricing proposals received so far are reasonable and have the features we are looking for.

Comprehensive **Economic Development** Strategy, US **Economic** Development Administration (EDA) Application Based on the meeting with the EDA representative for NH/ Maine and VT, it does not seem like Bradford will qualify for

EDA funding opportunities. Although we meet two of the three criteria for funding, we fail to qualify based on economic factors. We will continue to look for funding opportunities.


PLANNING BOARD

Name Change Carol Miese reported that at a meeting with ZBA representative Jim Varney and Planning Board member Steve Chase all agreed that the name of the Shore Protection Regulations should be changed to Surface Water Overlay District. There could be a shortened list of regulations.

CAPITAL IMPROVEMENTS PROGRAM COMMITTEE

Masonic Hall The Masonic Hall funding requests were removed from the CIP spreadsheet. Pam Bruss suggested that the plan should be to fundraise to pay for this. The group discussed how to put savings in place for the future of the Masonic building. Pam will add a small savings amount (possibly \$5,000) every year or alternating years.





ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Inquiry An attorney representing property owners on East Main Street appeared to get guidance on the permitting process to convert a barn into two dwelling units in the residential/ business zone. The Board advised that completing a variance application initially would probably be appropriate. A special exception application may be necessary.

ENERGY COMMITTEE

Municipal Weatherization The required documentation from the Highway Garage project was submitted to NHSaves for the Town to receive the incentive payment of \$4,316.65. We will track heating oil and electricity use and costs over the next year. Work at the Fire Department is expected to begin this month. Completion of the library weatherization is in the CIP plan for 2024, the BACC is scheduled for 2025. The BEC will not ask to add any energy-related costs to the CIP plan at this point. The scope of work may change for the BACC once the Town Hall is reopened. Grants may be available depending on how the BACC is used.

Food Waste With Kearsarge Climate Action and Hannaford support the Center for Ecotechnology is reaching out to a sample of local food waste generating businesses and schools to understand the handling of food waste. Following the study the feasibility of implementing a Business Food Waste Diversion program in the Kearsarge Region will be determined. BEC member Sandra Bravo agreed to be the Bradford Town Coordinator and has started reaching out to food waste generating businesses in Bradford.

MASONIC BUILDING **COMMITTEE**

Funds for Testing Kris Foss reported that she had been before the Select Board to request funds for the asbestos, lead and septic tests/reports prioritized by the Committee to enable the Committee to have accurate, up to date primary source information when looking for quotes for the various options the Committee is investigating. The Select Board responded that they were not prepared to spend any money on this building. Kris clarified that the Committee would have to use "worst case scenarios for costings/quotes" without access to these tests/reports.

CIP Options Kris attended the first CIP meeting and presented our funding request. Based on the Select Board's direction, two options were presented to the CIP Committee. Option 1 would be to tear down the building, fill, level, pave and create a parking lot with landscaping. Cost (worst case) would be \$120,000.00 Option 2 would be to sell the building and have the buyer move the building at their cost, to fill, level, pave and create a parking lot with landscaping \$60,000.00 minus any proceeds from sale of building.

Paving The Committee received a quote in the amount of \$33,000 for the paving of the whole area with 3 inches of base and tar but not the breaking of

the pavement. This would give 9 spaces on the site of the Masonic Lodge and 2 on the other side. Extra spaces could be put along side of the Fire Department if two or three trees were removed.

Bradford Historical Society Vote

Tracey Quigley reported that at the last Bradford Historical Society meeting a vote was taken regarding moving the Masonic building to the BHS area and it was voted down. BHS did not feel the group at this time could take on another building project of that size.

KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

Athletic Restructuring Proposal

There is a need for an Assistant Athletic Director to continue facilitating an extraordinary experience for students. The current structuring of the Athletic Department is allowing them to just stay afloat, stating that the Department should be moving forward.

Grants The Board approved motions to accept and expend two grants from the Department of Natural and Cultural Resources - NH State Council on the Arts for Bradford Elementary in the amount of \$4,355.00, and for Simonds Elementary in the amount of \$2,285.00.

Mold Remediation The Board approved a motion to approve the purchase recommendation for mold consulting/ remediation plan for the High School from The Lawson Group in the amount of \$13,331.31.

Laundry The Board approved a motion to approve the purchase recommendation for District wide laundry services from Cintas in the amount of \$44,656.56.

Stairs and Ramps The Board approved a motion to approve the purchase recommendation for stairs and ramps for the Bradford Preschool from Merrimack County Customs in the amount of \$18,450.00.

Many trees had an especially hard time this year. Hard frosts in May caused the new leaves on oak and beech to sag and fail in some areas. This tragedy also hit all the moth and butterfly caterpillars associated with these trees that had just begun their munching. And this in turn will have impacted nesting birds – most of which feed their offspring on caterpillars. Some fruit trees were damaged or their flowers dropped. Healthy oak and beech recovered and after a pause. unfurled new leaves.

Now we are seeing a lot of browning of maple leaves where we, and they, were hoping for bright fall colors. This has largely been caused by the long, wet spring and humid wet summer. A great time for fungi who throw their spores aloft in such conditions. Anthracnose is the main culprit where we are and this name encompasses several kinds of fungi. This is a biotrophic pathogen in that it can only survive on living organisms. Most trees have concluded their photosynthesizing for the season and these unsightly fungi are not going to do long-term damage except possibly with the newly transplanted or already weakened trees.

In theory, one could remove all the fallen leaves that might still harbor the fungi and temporarily rid the environment of it. Better to enjoy fall as it is and see what weather next year brings.

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
