# MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

SELECT BOARD

Community Power Agreement The Board approved a motion to authorize the Town Administrator to enter the "Joint Powers Agreement" of Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire under the provisions of New Hampshire RSA 53-A for the purpose of supporting member municipalities and counties in developing and implementing electric aggregation plans, pursuant to RSA 53-E, as well as related statutory authorities.

Electric Aggregation Committee The Board approved a motion to establish an Electric Aggregation Committee and appoint Jenny Locke Howley and Kathleen Bigford to the Electric Aggregation Committee pursuant to RSA 53-E:6 to oversee the development of a plan for an electric aggregation program.

Computer Aided Dispatch Contract The Board approved a motion to authorize the Fire Chief to enter into a contract with Image Trends LLC of Minnesota for the purpose of fire reporting, computer aided dispatch system. The cost is \$1,000 per year and is available in the department budget.

Henniker Perambulation Henniker has requested Bradford's participation in walking our shared town line. Representatives from Bradford are needed to do the walk. Andrew Pinard and Laurie Buchar have volunteered.

Masonic Building Porch/ Lawn
Eastern Star Wreath requested use of
the Masonic Building porch and front
lawn for wreath distribution; the Board
agreed to allow it.

# **Town Hall Update**

It's like waiting for the birth of a child. Things drag on and on, and just when you think it's never ever going to happen, it finally does.

Painters have continued to work applying second coats, touching up scratches etc. The tin ceiling on the first floor has been painted and while tin is not the finished product we hoped for, it does look nice. The final mechanical work has been completed and minimal heat is on in the building. The counter in the office kitchenette, the handiwork of Jason Allen, has been installed and the sink's plumbing has been connected. Wiring for the eventual fit-up of the audio and visual facilities in the second-floor auditorium has been completed. The railings for the accessible ramp have also been installed

By mid-October, we reached the point where there was no longer a need for Trumbull-Nelson to be on-site daily. The few subcontractors that had minor tasks to complete wrapped up their tasks and the site quieted waiting for the installation of permanent power. Attempts to get a sense of when that might be from Eversource were frustratingly vague.

Then today, October 23, Eversource appeared and began working on our permanent power! This kicks our final phase of construction into gear. Once permanent power is in place, tests for the sprinkler system, mechanical system, elevators and alarm system can be conducted. The telephone lines and data infrastructure can also be connected. The installation of blown-in insulation

in the attic will be done after all systems testing is successfully complete. This way, the insulation will not be disturbed should additional work in the attic be

necessary as a result of the testing. The final step will be a thorough cleaning of the entire building.

A couple of important Town Hall acknowledgements are overdue.

Andrew Pinard has donated countless hours of his time to design and to help install the infrastructure for the audio/visual functionality in the auditorium and first floor common areas. He has helped to run wires and install the pipe structure that will support future lighting equipment. His comprehensive approach assures us that the Town Hall is appropriately prepared to be outfitted for the variety of uses it will see in the coming years.

Nate Kimball, of Valley Excavating, has also donated time and effort to the Town Hall renovation project. Nearly 10 years ago, Nate Kimball offered to do the site work and install the new septic system as a donation to the project. He was true to his word (no surprise) and in August, fulfilled his promise. The Town is deeply grateful to both these men.

Now that it is the start of heating season now is the best time to check on your home's safety systems.

Every home should have smoke detector and CO detectors on every floor to protect the occupants. You should also test the detectors several times a year and at a minimum change the batteries twice a year even if they are hardwired as many detectors have battery back-up when we lose power.

Only one heating device can be vented into a flue. Have your chimney inspected and cleaned annually. Make sure all heating devices are serviced according to manufacture guidelines. These include, oil and gas furnaces, pellet stoves and woodstoves.

Remember to clean around heating vents and dryer vents that are close to the ground for buildup of snow and leaves. This could lead to fires and could lead to CO levels increasing in your home.

# **Police Department Update**

The holiday season is quickly creeping up on us, and with that season also comes winter which means cold temps and snow. Here are some reminders that could greatly help us out during these seasons.

Let's start with the Holiday Season. The holidays are a time where typically friends and family get together to hangout and celebrate. If hosting a large gathering please have a parking plan. Some roads in town do allow for on-street parking. If you do plan for onstreet parking please limit it to one side of the road only with vehicles facing the correct direction. This ensures that emergency vehicles can safely get by and pedestrians can safely cross the road with a clear line of sight for themselves and vehicles to see them. Also, if consuming alcoholic beverages, please have a designated driver at the ready. Making an arrest during the holiday season is not something we set out for, yet some still call us Scrooge when it happens, but our #1 priority remains ensuring the roads are safe.

The Winter season in NH typically means colder temps and snow, ice, or some combination of the two. Here are a couple helpful hints heading into that season. Please make sure your driveway and walkway are shoveled out. This helps first responders when responding to an emergency. If they are not, please let dispatch or 911 know if you are calling in an emergency. It's also nice to know if the driveway is icy so no people fall or vehicles slide or get stuck. Also, if you would like to add yourself, a close friend or a family member to our inclement weather call list please contact the station. We will need the name, physical address, phone number and heat source of the person you are adding.

The Town of Bradford also has a town ordinance for parking on town roads during a snowstorm. Specifically, the ordinance states, "No vehicle shall be parked on a public way in the Town of Bradford during and after a snowstorm until the said public way has been plowed and is suitable for proper vehicle traffic. It shall be the responsibility of the owner to remove said vehicle should said snowstorm occur during the midnight hours. This shall include all public ways throughout the Town." This helps ensure that our roads get plowed out properly. The penalty for violating this ordinance is a fine between \$25-\$50 and your vehicle can be towed at your expense. If the weather forecast is calling for some sort of precipitation, please plan to move your vehicle off the roadway before going to sleep. I get it, most weather people are wrong a lot of the time, but help us out and move those vehicles to be on the safe side.

The Bradford Police Department would like to wish everyone a safe and happy holiday season. If, at any time, we can be of assistance to you, please do not hesitate to call us.

# **Bradford Center Flash Back**

Sometimes, it's fun to reflect on what life was like in the past. Sometimes, new insights can be gained and the present might make more sense in the context. Bradford Center Meetinghouse is one of those places that may provide some perspective. Because the building was never repurposed, it retains all of its original features and architectural integrity and it's easy to let your

mind imagine what it was like long ago. Here's a glimpse inside.

One hundred and eighty-five years ago, neighbors were hard at work building this stunning, yet simple, edifice, trying to beat the winter weather. Money had been raised in advance by the sale of pews. Each family wanted to claim their spot and each row was designated by an ornate number. There is a chart still hanging on the wall that lists names like Cressy, French, Presby, Shattuck, Howlett, Davis, Bagley... demonstrating who were the key players in the community by their proximity to the pulpit. The bell, voke and wheel in the belfry were purchased from subscriptions paid by the parishioners and hauled up from Boston that same year. It still rings today as an invitation to gather for community events.

So, three hundred folks gathered here on a cold December day to hear sermons and appreciate what they had accomplished in creating a community of immigrants working together. Other than the Abenaki, they all had come from away. They warmed their feet with wrapped bricks brought from their

> hearths, as there was no heat in the building. Some sixty musicians raised their strings and voices in praise and hope and good will. The walls in the hall still resound with their music every time a visiting performer remarks on the exquisite acoustics inside. You can hear this for yourself at our annual Christmas Eve pageant.

The Center is where our town

began. The Meetinghouse that still stands here replaced the building that was dismantled, moved to the village near the new railroad line and reframed in 1863. You now know this rebuilt structure as our magnificent Town Hall. The renovation of which is nearing completion! After many years of planning, hard work and patience, townspeople will once again enter an edifice that represents who we are as a community. We have countless viewpoints to negotiate, just as they did when the Bradford Center Meetinghouse was built. (At that time, there were many different denominations sharing the space for worship.) We have climate and politics and hardship to navigate in order to reach our goals, just as our predecessors did. But we also share a sense of the fortitude and compassion that propelled them to make Bradford their home. Let's celebrate our commonality this coming holiday season.




# **Bradford Community Power Moving Forward**

The town of Bradford has joined the Community Power Coalition of New Hampshire! Being a member of the Coalition has no cost or obligation to the town, but Bradford is now able to access the many resources that the Coalition has to offer for pursuing community power. A community power program will give the town the ability to buy electricity for residents instead of the traditional utility companies, giving customers options for lower prices as well as options for renewable energy.

The Select Board has appointed Jenny Locke Howley and Kathleen Bigford to serve on the newly approved Electric Aggregation Committee to oversee the development of a plan for an electric aggregation program.

Next step: Stay tuned for the date, time, and place of the two required public hearings to ensure Bradford residents understand the plan and process. We're planning the first hearing for early December and the second one in January 2024.

# Pigs to the Rescue: Who knew they could help the climate?

The Bradford Energy Committee (BEC) and Kearsarge Climate Action (KCA) have worked together on a number of issues affecting the climate – weatherization, solar energy and energy efficiency, to name a few. We generally don't delve into food waste but were recently approached by Hannaford's supermarket and the Center for Ecotechnology (CET) to help. Hannaford and CET received a United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) grant to investigate "Business Food Waste Diversion in the Kearsarge Area". The purpose of the grant project is to engage with local businesses and schools to promote best practices and provide guidance on affordable food waste diversion options.

Our task was to identify businesses and schools in the Kearsarge area that generate food waste. I spoke with seven organizations in the Bradford area and found that a portion of food waste from five of them is fed to pigs. One location composts its food waste, and one organization disposes of their food waste in the trash


First a few facts:

According to the USDA's estimate, in the US, between 30-40 percent of the food supply is wasted, as are the resources to produce food not consumed by humans. These wasted resources include land, labor, energy, and other inputs used in producing, processing, transporting, preparing, storing, and disposing of discarded food. When food is buried in a landfill it rots producing methane gas, which according to the US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) is more than 25 times as potent as carbon dioxide at trapping heat in the atmosphere. This amounts to almost 8% of the total man made greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions.

Below is a food recovery chart prepared by EPA listing the best ways to manage food waste.

# Food Recovery Hierarchy



According to the Food Recovery Hierarchy, reducing the amount of food waste produced followed by diverting that excess food to food pantries, etc, are the number 1 and 2 best ways to minimize GHG emissions from the food chain. Feeding animals is the third best way and this is where pigs come to the rescue. Feeding animals with excess food keeps that waste out of landfills.

# MONTHLY BRIEFING: **Town Board Reports**

**BACC Update** Selectwomen Beth Downs and Town Administrator Karen Hambleton met with Suzanne Demers of the Community Action Program to discuss what is possible for the future when the Town Offices move out. Plan: Calculate the cost of using the building. put together a group to formulate a plan after January 1, 2024.

Town Hall Update The sitework is done. The Community Gardeners have done some work pruning and defining the garden spaces. The painters are working on the finishing touches. The hardwood flooring in the up and downstairs hallways is refinished. Since delivery of the pad transformer is not expected for quite a while, Eversource has approved the installation of temporary-permanent power and installation is being scheduled. The Board approved a motion that the Town Hall Expendable Trust Funds be drawn down to \$100 and funds used for the Town Hall renovation. (2015 Town Hall Restoration Trust Fund and 2019 Town Hall Repair and Renovation Trust Fund).

# ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT **COMMITTEE**

**Town Website** Kris Foss reported she and Karen Hambleton, together with Fire Chief Bryan Nowell and Maureen Brandon sat through demonstrations

from Revize, Civic Plus, and Munibit. The pricing proposals received so far are reasonable and have the features we are looking for. Kris reported that Ridgelight Studios has offered to take photos this Fall around town for no charge to use photos and aerial shots for website and EDC use.

Budget for 2024 The group discussed submitting a budget for the EDC for the first time. Items on the list include membership in Main Street America, which provides resources for Economic Development as well as funding opportunities; Additional photo shoots/media to promote Bradford, and Bradford businesses and recreation opportunities, and supplies. Kris Foss to submit the budget request to Karen Hambleton to be included in the process.

# ZONING BOARD **OF ADJUSTMENT**

**Budget** The Board approved a motion to include \$1,200 for secretarial services; \$180 for seminars; \$50 for supplies, other line items remain unchanged from 2022-23.

Consultation Nick Vertefeuille from Horizons Engineering came before the Board for a preliminary conceptual consultation for Map 22 lots 29/30. Lot line adjustment is necessary to accommodate a driveway. An application for variance will be needed.

Master Plan Subcommittee Board member Carol Troy suggested that the board review the previous master plan survey sent to residents to determine how to structure the next survey. The current master plan is seven years old. Renewal is scheduled every 10 years. Topics discussed that could affect Bradford's future are levels of commercial zoning, cluster housing, tiny homes, and agricultural uses.



added to the plan.

Highway The engineering costs just for permitting for the culverts on Deer Valley Road and West Road will cost \$131,000.

Fire Department Chief Bryan Nowell explained the need for hoses and nozzles replacement and the timing for that need. He estimated that cost would be between \$5,000 to \$10,000 in the next year or two, then staggered after that so there is a replacement cycle. Bryan suggested saving for this so there is not a huge amount at one time.

## **ENERGY COMMITTEE**

**Municipal Weatherization** Waiting for incentive payment of \$4,316.65 for the Highway Garage. Work at the Fire Station is expected to be completed in October. The Fire Department has done an incredible job prepping the firehouse to be ready for this work.

Food Waste Update on Business Food Waste Diversion Program in the Kearsarge Region. Results of outreach to the following businesses and schools located in Bradford: Pizza Chef - solid waste, Wicked Sweet Café - pigs, Sweet Beet Market – production of organic compost, Dunkin - some to pigs, Rosewood Inn - pigs, Appleseed restaurant – pigs; Kearsarge Regional School District (7 schools) – there is no uniform policy on management on food waste. At some schools food waste goes to pigs.

## **CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

**Budget** The Board approved a motion to submit the same budget as this year (\$1000) for next year.

**DES Complaint** Blaisdell Lake Rd, Map 3, Lot 36: Homeowners have removed trees on both sides of the stream on the property, and there are no erosion controls in place. This stream has native Brook Trout and runs directly into the Warner River. Commission member Ann Eldridge will pursue the filing of a complaint form with DES.

Restoration Plan The four corners (County Rd., West Rd., Rowe Mtn Rd., and Center Rd.) restoration plan has been submitted and approved. However, the deadline of 9/30/23 has passed. Becca suggested that we ask the Department of Environmental Services (DES) for a status report.

## LIBRARY TRUSTEES

Water Tank The hot water tank in the Library broke. A new one was purchased and installed.

# PARKS AND RECREATION

Community Involvement Fair Thursday. November 9, 2023, from 6-8pm at the BACC.

Christmas Event The committee discussed partnering with the FD, Library, and Bradford Community Church to host a Christmas event together on the same evening. Ideas discussed include Jingle Bus, community dinner, tree lighting, story time with Santa, food drive, Christmas photo booth and more. Looking at December 8 for event.

Polar Plunge 2024 The committee discussed hosting a second annual Polar Plunge at French's on New Years Day.

## KRSD SCHOOL BOARD

**Sprinklers** The Board approved the purchase recommendation for wet and dry NFPA 13 sprinkler coverage at KRES New London in the amount of \$282,700.00 from John L. Carter Sprinkler Company, Inc. to be paid across two fiscal years (\$150,000.00 from FY 23-24 and \$132,700.00 from FY 24-25).

**Budget Reductions** Superintendent Feneberg presented the Board with reductions to the 2024-25 budget as requested. He stated that the District is prepared to propose slightly over \$500,000.00 worth of reductions. He said that each principal was involved in making the reductions. Additional reductions were discussed which include removing \$100,000.00 from the New London Playground line, removing \$75,000.00 for pavement sealing and striping at Simonds, and removing \$25,000.00 by cutting back on the number of interactive monitors to be purchased to replace aging projectors. School Board member Ken Bartholomew stated that a number of these reductions are only deferrals. He said that deferred replacements catch up. He stated that by the end of the 2024-25 school year, when this budget runs out, things may be in critical need of replacement.

# -OUTSID

It's late October, Halloween time. Trees are tossing off their spent leaves. Fans of manicured landscapes would say it's a mess out there. The dying upright stems of Monotropa uniflora - 'ghost plants' or 'corpse flowers' - are standing in stiff, dry bunches like shaggy straws protruding from the duff.





In summer, ghost plants were, in a sculptural and slightly macabre way. quite attractive. They appeared bentnecked, white and waxy with subtle tones of pink. At that time, they looked like a clump of tiny septic field vents, or more poetically, like a band of lost saxophonists supine in the leaves and blowing soft tunes. These pale plants looked and felt like mushrooms. They know a lot about mushrooms... because they must.

Ghost plants were once 'normal' green plants properly photosynthesizing – using their leaves to assemble their food with sun and air and with minerals and water added from roots sensibly planted in the ground. Surprisingly, they are most closely related to rhododendrons and are included in the Heath family. Somehow and for some reason, ghost plants changed course and changed lifestyle. They still have tiny, translucent vestigial leaves, thus retaining membership cards in the kingdom of plants. Long ago they sidled up to other plants and traded in their chloroplasts for raiding the supply lines between trees and their fungal partners. Scientists have eavesdropped into the conversations, hoping to translate the interactions. We are a nosy species.

Less than a foot tall, the unassuming

ghost plant settled our raging debates over the importance of the underground connections between plants and fungi. In the late 1980s, these plants demonstrated that some organisms have total dependence on the 'wood wide web' – the massive circuitry out of our sight between plants, fungi, and soil organisms. Ghost plants served as the 'periscopes into underground relationships.'

Perhaps 10% of plants have made this same radical departure from direct photosynthesis to complete dependence on mycorrhizal (fungal) connections. This includes all of the huge family of orchids each of the 25,000 species needing at some point in their lives to resort to theft. Upon germinating, ghost plants send out feeding tubes from their seeds that insinuate themselves into the partnership of fungi, usually a species of Russula and trees, often beech. There is, of course, a name for these freeloaders - mycoheterotrophs. Perhaps they perform some unseen function for the mushrooms and the trees. Perhaps they supply something from the air or can tell a good joke. We can't stand the thought of someone getting something for nothing.

Ghost plants are ephemeral and fast-growing in the right conditions – a dry spell after rain will do. Their flowers are five petals fused into a cup. Once they have been pollinated, often by bumblebees, their now-blackening flowerheads turn upwards and they toss their tiny seeds hopefully into the wind. Getting all their nutrients from others, they can, and do, grow in the dark.

The soil disturbance of extensive or repeated logging and the introduction of some invasive plants and imported animals such as earthworms can doom the below-ground connections. Thus, the presence of ghost plants and other fungal reliant plants indicates a still-healthy forest.

Another common name for the ghost plant is Indian pipe – so named for a resemblance to some native American tribe's peace pipes. We could use more peace pipes right now.

# **Assurances of Recycling**

Due to the state of the economy and to the sheer volume of things now being recycled, it has been more difficult for us to find vendors who are actually in the business of selling their recycled product and therefore, will buy the materials that we collect in Bradford's recycling programs. The Northeast Resource and Recovery Association (NRRA), which was covered extensively by the Bradford Bridge staff, markets most of Bradford's recyclables and they are committed to selling these commodities to environmentally responsible companies. We have been most appreciative of their integrity and help with our recycling programs and issues.

Through research and relationships with other transfer and recycling centers, state agencies, and associations, we have been able to locate and secure other vendors to receive our recyclables to potential vendors. We also consider the overall environmental impact of the recycling process of our selected vendors.

Ken and I appreciate that the town of Bradford has supported our recycling programs, has been patient as we have had to change what materials we are able to efficiently and economically recycle, and has worked well with the various vendors we have been able to secure.






