MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

SELECT BOARD

Building Inspector Walter Royal discussed certification of non-asbestos roofing. The Board agreed that certification of non-asbestos roofing would be the responsibility of the owner and not the Town. Walter asked that he be allowed to expedite heating system replacement permits in the winter. The Board agreed. Walter will draft language to reflect these changes.

Municibid The Board approved a motion to sell the leaf sucker for \$650, the welder for \$275, and the boiler for \$1,000.

Garage Doors Steve Hall, Road Agent, presented costs and his plan for installing electric door openers over the next two years. The Board approved a motion to allow Steve to move ahead with installation of electric door openers and electrical work at the Highway garage, estimated to cost \$5,390 this year.

Police Incidents Total of 717 calls for service, 13 assists, 15 open cases in court, 16 open investigations. Total numbers of cases will be fewer than last year, but court and investigations are up.

Promotion Effective December 3, Officer Glen Drewniak will be promoted to Sergeant.

New Checking Account The Board approved a motion to open a new checking account at Bar Harbor Bank and Trust to serve as the Town's operating account. Further, to close the existing checking account ending in 4870 upon request of the Treasurer.

Call for Opinions

What form of government best serves Bradford, Town Meeting or SB2? Please submit letters or articles of about 250 words to *bradfordbridge345@gmail. com* by January 20, 2024. If you have thoughts on either format, please consider chiming in on this important topic. Here is some background.

There is a petition circulating to change the way Bradford governs itself from the "town meeting" format to the "SB2" format.

Presently and for the past two centuries Bradford has made decisions about town governance with the "town meeting" format. On a day in March, residents vote by paper ballot to elect town officials and enact ordinances. Usually the next day, residents gather in person to vote on additional items, mostly budgetary in nature.

"SB2" is the governing format used by the Kearsarge Regional School District. It was instituted by the state legislature in 1995 because of concerns that modern lifestyles had made it difficult for people to attend traditional town meetings. SB2, Official Ballot Referenda, is a form of town meeting that has two sessions. The first session, deliberative session, is for explanation, discussion, debate and amendments to the proposed operating budget and warrant articles. The second session, voting session, allows voters to cast an official ballot to pass/fail proposed articles. Residents vote in an SB 2 election at a polling place throughout the day. They may also vote by absentee ballot.

How does a town adopt SB2? From the NH Department of Revenue Administration: "The local governing body must hold a public hearing at least 15 days prior to the question being voted on, (RSA 40:14, IV). The question as worded in RSA 40:14, V, <u>"Shall we adopt</u> the provisions of RSA 40:13 (known as SB2) to allow official ballot voting on all issues before the (Town of Bradford, NH) on the second Tuesday of (March)." is placed on the warrant for the annual meeting. Passage requires a 3/5 majority vote of those voting.

TRANSFER STATION

TOO MUCH FOOD

Recently many residents have been discarding lots of food into the municipal waste container (ie.compactor) at the Bradford Transfer and Recycling Center. Not only does this violate Badford's mandatory recycling policy, but it also increases our taxes by a small fortune.

We offer two options for discarding food waste and unwanted foods:

- Compost food waste ("garbage") in our clearly-labeled container. This includes mostly plant-based waste. NO MEAT.
- Or place food that could be consumed by farm animals on the compactor. Examples are baked goods, produce, beverages and meat.

Under regular circumstances, Bradford can keep the compactor container on site for seven open days. If residents recycled their food waste and unwanted foods, Bradford could have the container emptied every fourteen open days! This could save about \$7,000 for the town each year in tipping & hauling fees.

Ken and I are often surprised at how much food some residents discard. Not only does throwing away unwanted food increase an individual's personal food bill, but throwing away unwanted food increases Bradford's cost to dispose of that food placed in the compactor. If we watch our pennies, the dollars will take care of themselves!

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Write-In Biden NH Presidential Primary January 23, 2024

A group of more than one hundred Democratic organizers in NH have launched a campaign to cast write-in votes for President Biden in the upcoming NH Presidential Primary. Write-In Biden volunteers are trying to get the word out in NH that while Joe Biden will not be on the printed NH Primary Ballot, voters can write his name in at the bottom of the ballot as a write-in and are encouraged to do so in the NH Presidential Primary for January 23.

On March 9, 1920, NH held its Firstin-the-Nation Presidential Primary. In 1975, House Bill 73 passed the NH Legislature to allow the NH Secretary of State to set the primary date to keep first in the nation primary status. However, this year, the Democratic National Committee (DNC) has set the NH Primary date in February, three days after the South Carolina primary, first on the DNC calendar. In defying DNC rules, NH will not be holding its primary in February. In October this year, the DNC Rules and Bylaws Committee sent out guidance advising candidates not to file to be on the NH primary ballot. The Joe Biden campaign has followed this guidance.

In 1968, President Lyndon Johnson won the NH Primary as a write-in candidate. To vote for a person whose name is not printed on the NH ballot, write in the name of the person in the "WRITE-IN" space, and completely fill in the oval opposite your choice.





Kudos for KRES-Bradford and KR-PreSchool

In this celebration of all things awesome about life at KRES-Bradford, we heard from the Kindergarten teachers in November. Next up, first grade! be kind and caring towards others, be able to work on a team whether playing a partner game or working on a project together, and be active and productive citizens of the classroom."

Academic goals for first grade include not only reading but also a variety of math skills including adding and subtracting. Popular science topics they study are Sun & Shadow Patterns, Animal Superpowers, Plant and Animal Adaptations, Light, Sound & Communications.



First graders study hibernation for a week in December. They get to wear pajamas and make their own bear dens under their desks. Innovative approaches like this make our local school extra effective and fun.

Jessica Caswell and Elizabeth Fenton are familiar faces at the school, having each taught there for many years (since 2006 and 1998, respectively). They say: "We love how enthusiastic first graders are to learn and experience new things. They are so proud when they discover a new skill."

Can you remember your own excitement at that age? I can see myself showing off my daily accomplishments to my family at the dinner table. I guess I was lucky to have considerate older brothers who didn't shush me when I spouted common facts they had learned years before. It may be worthwhile to reflect on how we keep that thirst for knowledge active in ourselves and others in adult life.

Beth and Jessie say: "It's amazing to watch when kids start to learn how to read. Putting sounds together and being able to read is a huge step for them. But our overall goal for first graders is to First grade has partnered with Sweet Beet/ Kearsarge Food Hub during the past few years. The students visit the farm up on West Road and help harvest carrots while exploring all the different types of plants and vegetables grown there. They prepare beds for winter and plant garlic. And in the spring, they help with weeding and harvest salad greens to serve for Field Day at their school. Activities such as these help develop various life and science skills as well as strengthen the children's sense of community.

A first-grade classroom at KRES-Bradford is a delightful place to be. Classroom pets, stimulating study centers, tidy desks, cozy nooks, children's work on display, backpacks all in a row. There is just the right balance of fun and focus under the guidance of these two talented teachers and their dedicated aides, Chris Shaw, Kate Cusick and Abbey Sweet. Who wouldn't want to be a first-grader again?




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Great Tiger Moth

Poplars have been side-stepping into the rough field in front of the house the way they always do – discreetly. Their roots stealthily tunnel and quietly periscope advance scouts. They and the birches are intent on exchanging field for forest, threatening my agrarian plans.




At a calm moment in mid-September, I wandered with loppers, intending to slow the sapling progress. Logging operations halted when I noticed two very large caterpillars motionless at the base of a young tree. They were large enough to exhibit undecipherable facial expressions. Their twelve tiny stemmata/eyes arranged in two delicate semi-circles on either side of their heads could tell them only when darkness approached to retire their main predators. They then hiked up into the leaves for a night of consumption. Caterpillars are essentially an astonishing number of muscles and five pairs of tiny hearts on either side of an elongated digestive tract.

These caterpillars were larvae of *Arctia caja moths*. This species lives anywhere on the frostier northern curves of the



planet. In Europe they are in severe decline and in England, where they are commonly called Garden Tiger Moths, they are a protected species. Here, where we don't know how they are faring, we call them by the more majestic name Great Tiger Moth. "This densely hairy behemoth is the entomological equivalent of a musk ox." So writes David Wagner in his book Caterpillars of Eastern North America.

Great tiger moth caterpillars are more huggable than their spikey cousins the common 'wooly bear' caterpillar. Grizzled gray below, brown and furrily upholstered above, they sported a lengthwise black belt studded with white spiracles (respiratory tubes). Fore and aft there were very long, silky hairs and, as an added flourish, three inkdipped paint brush tufts. An award-winning prototype for a sofa. All of this ornamentation varies a lot but probably deters smaller birds and bugs.



When hatched in a pearled raft of dozens of eggs, their first meal was their eggshells. Tiny, pale and barely hairy at all, they were easy prey for all sorts of insect-eaters. Most nestling birds are made exclusively of caterpillars. In September, there appeared to be only these two souls surviving.

Their mothly mother, using the receptors on her feet, carefully chose a plant that was high in toxins, primarily pyrrolizidine alkaloids. These chemicals are intended by the plant to discourage leaf-munching. Some insects though, including tiger moths, dine on would-be deterrents and store them in special sacs for use against moth and caterpillar-eaters. The Environmental Protection Agency should know about this. A supposedly brainless and uncertified insect can collect unlabeled and unpermitted chemicals. Actually, they *are* labeled. The adult moths that appear in mid-summer spread their wings when disturbed. This reveals bright red/orange eyes on their underwings. Their main antagonists, birds, are reliant on vision and understand these signals. Similar hazard labels include the orange of monarch butterflies and efts and the red of milkweed bugs and stop signs.

A close relation of great tiger moths, Utetheisa ornatrix, is equally protected by this diet. This tiger moth has been documented caught in spider webs. Most moths/butterflies will struggle in a web, loosing some wing scales, but usually escaping. U. ornatrix when trapped, holds perfectly still and waits. When the resident spider comes for her meal, she/he inspects and rejects it for the bad vibes it gives off. One by one, the spider snips the webbing and lets the moth free unharmed. Like freeing a whale from fishing tackle. The great tiger moth may do the same.

As I watched these survivors for a week in September, they became emboldened or perhaps more urgent - no longer climbing down to hide at the foot of the sapling during the day but risking the daylight and migratory birds in order to eat non-stop. Eventually, driven by some internal clock, they rolled off to construct a cocoon with silk and spare caterpillar fur. Wrapped somewhere in the fallen leaves, they will wait out the winter hoping for not too dry, not too wet, not too warm, and not too cold until spring unlocks their appetite and they climb again. And again, by the end of May perhaps, another switch will engage and they will build a case in which to pupate. They will repurpose all their caterpillar parts into moth parts and retain their accumulated chemical weapons. If they are lucky, they will emerge with new vision and will startle themselves with flight.

MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports

(Continued from page 1) **Tax Rate** The Board reviewed the tax rate breakdown supplied by the Department of Revenue and discussed the impact of using some Fund Balance to reduce the tax rate. The most that the Town could use and remain within the DRA guidelines would be \$60,733. The Board opted to conserve the Town's Fund Balance. The Board approved a motion to set the tax rate at \$27.80 per thousand using \$0 from Fund Balance.

Highway Block Funding There is \$222.05 remaining from the \$76K in Additional Highway Block Funding received in 2022. Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator, suggested that it be used for road patch (or other road work/supplies) before the end of this year. The Board agreed by consensus.

BUDGET COMMITTEE

Community Center Committee discussed how much other towns are using the BACC and if Bradford should reach out for some support. Raising the rent for the Community Action Program was also discussed. The Committee found this budget in order.

General Government Buildings

The Committee has a question about the computer repair line item. Karen Hambleton explained that this includes the regular maintenance contracts, moving the town from a .org to a .gov domain, and moving all the equipment and setting it up at the Town Hall. The Committee found this budget in order. Executive, Community Center and Town Hall, Karen Hambleton, Town Administrator clarified and explained line items for these budgets. The Committee asked about a line item for the Economic Development Committee of \$1500. Karen explained that the EDC has requested money in support of furthering Town enrichment projects. The Committee found this budget in order.

Warrant Articles The committee will vote on the Warrant Articles at the January 11, 2024 meeting.

Special Exception The application for a Special Exception to expand the number of units on property at 123 East Main Street was accepted as complete with additional information and sketches of the location of the well and septic system on the property to be provided at the site walk and hearing. Site walk is scheduled for Tuesday, January 2, 2024 at 4:30. Public hearing on Wednesday, January 3, 2024 at 7:00 pm at the Bradford Area Community Center.

CONSERVA-TION COM-MISSION

Dock Construction The Board approved the application from Steve Chase for the construction of a seasonal floating dock for property located on Oakdale Road



at Map 21, Lot 14. The Board felt Steve gave an exceptional proposal, with great concern to minimizing impact to the uniqueness of the lake.

Hazard Mitigation Doug Southard has volunteered to represent the Conservation Commission on the committee to develop the hazard mitigation plan. Becca Herman will also participate if needed.

Deer Valley Road Culvert Ben Nugent of NH Fish and Game, Steve Hall, and Karen Hambleton are working together to apply for a grant through the US Fish and Wildlife Bipartisan Infrastructure Law to replace the Deer Valley Road culvert. The plan is to combine applications for five culvert replacements, including Deer Valley Road, in surrounding towns under one grant.

Complaint A complaint form has been filed with DES for property located on Blaisdell Lake Road, Map 3, Lot 36.

Bradford Bog George Beaton has single handedly replaced 34 planks along the boardwalk, and 16 planks at



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the tower. Three cheers, and resounding applause for George's dedication and generosity of time and labor!

ENERGY COMMITTEE

Community Power Update Bradford's Electric Aggregation Plan (EAP) is due January 1. CPCNH will return it to the Town by January 8th. We then submit our EAP to the Public Utilities Commission (PUC). The second public hearing is scheduled for January 9th. Committee members Kathleen Bigford and Jenny Howley will submit a warrant article to the Select Board for consideration at the Town Meeting 2024.

Hazard Mitigation Plan Sandra Bravo will represent the energy committee for the hazard mitigation plan.

Fees NH RSA 261:153 (2022) enables towns and cities to adopt a \$5 fee to vehicle registrations to fund EV chargers in your municipalities. This could help Bradford raise money to fund Energy related projects such as EV charging stations. Sandra will explore if the committee wants to pursue this as a warrant article.



Town Hall Update, January 2024

The process of winding up the project has slowed some, however, it does move forward. Once we have a certificate of occupancy, we will choose a date to celebrate the Town Hall's reopening.

In early December, Eversource installed the pad transformer and connected our permanent power. New door hardware for the historic front doors had to be ordered and has taken a while to arrive. Preliminary inspections were conducted and a final punch list was created to identify all the outstanding issues. Trumbull-Nelson and the subcontractors continue to address the outstanding issues, one of which is lighting in the first-floor meeting room. If you've seen the lights on at night, it is because the electricians are working the bugs out of the switching connections. Final inspections are scheduled for early January.
