

MONTHLY BRIEFING: Town Board Reports select board

Building Permits The Board reviewed building permits for Map 16 Lot 79, Map 22 Lot 8, Map 4 Lot 35, Map 12 Lot 6, Map 19 Lot 38, Map 7 Lot 4, Map 6 Lot 70 and Map 11 Lot 56. Mr. Grenier (189 Cressy Road) appeared for clarification of his building permit application. The Board reviewed and approved the application.

Transfer Station Update Recycling of aluminum, mixed paper, and plastic netted \$1,286.33. New transfer station stickers are being ordered. Lois Kilnapp, Transfer Station Manager, submitted changes to the Transfer Station ordinance. To officially make the changes requires a Planning Board hearing or vote at Town Meeting.

Fire Department Update Since January first the Fire Department has responded to 79 Incidents (44 EMS call and 35 Fire calls). Compared to the same time period in 2023, the department had responded to 56 incidents, representing a 26% increase in call volume. Fire permits are required for outside burning. Contact the Fire Warden or the Fire Department to obtain one. As of March 15th, Mark Goldberg retired after 53 years, 34 years as Chief of the Fire Department. The new fire truck is expected to be delivered in June.

Highway Department Updates The 2023 budget is now closed with the final expense of the gravel funds encumbered at the end of 2023. 2024 expenses are on track. Fairgrounds Road repaving will go over budget. Consensus of the Board is to finish the project. A mower is available for purchase for \$39K. Contractually the cost is about \$36K to mow the entire town. Consensus of the Board is to pay

PARKING ON WEST MAIN ST. WILL BE RESTRICTED TO ONE SIDE OF THE ROAD

Bradford's Town Hall was built in 1797 as a one-story meetinghouse that stood in Bradford Center. In 1863, it was dismantled, moved to its current location on West Main Street and reconstructed with a second floor added. In the early 20th century, an addition was built onto the rear of the building which allowed a stage to be added on the second floor. The Town Hall was added to the National Register of Historic Places in 1980. State grant and municipal funds have made this renovation possible, preserving, protecting and modernizing this historic treasure for Bradford's future.

Fire & Rescue Department Update

The Bradford Fire Rescue has been experiencing above normal calls for service. As of 5/23 we have had 95 calls for service compared to 73 for the same time period in 2023. Emergency Medical Service calls are the primary driving force for these numbers.

EMT Certifications. We have had several employees take additional Emergency Medical training. Overall, we had additional 2 new EMS providers and 3 increased their provider levels. We have taken advantage of a program through State of NH employment security where we get reimbursed for 100% of the cost of the training. We will be reimbursed over \$5,500 for these EMS certifications. This is a huge time commitment of these employees. The hours in the class are volunteer hours. We get reimbursed for the cost of the training.

New Fire Engine: The Fire Engine that was approved in 2022 at town meeting was ordered in the fall of 2022. Two Fire Department members will be going down to Florida to do the inspection of the engine before it comes back to New England to have the final items added to it. It is hopeful by July-August the new engine will be placed into service at Bradford FD.

Forest and Lands Grant: Purchases are being made to complete a grant that the FD was awarded from NH Division of Forests and Lands. This was a \$4,000 50/50 grant.

Hazard Mitigation Survey: The town has been working very hard on completing the 2025 Hazard Mitigation plan. Having this plan in place is important for several reasons. First and foremost is that we will have a plan if there is a disaster or weather event that hits Bradford and secondly having a plan in place helps the town to be able to apply for grants.

Address Signs: The Fire Department is still offering the street address signs. Please feel free to contact the FD to get the form to apply for an address sign. The sign comes at a cost of \$20. Remember if we can't find you, we can't help you.

Fire Permits: Whenever the ground isn't covered with snow an outside fire permit is required. The fire permit is free and only clean wood and brush can be burned. Please contact Forest Fire Warden Steve Hansen or the FD to get a fire permit. These permits include the small campfire permits you have in your backyard.

Chicken BBQ: At the Bradford Patriotic celebration, the FD will be supporting the Parks and Recreation Road race. This year's race is in Honor of Deputy Chief James Raymond. Please register to help celebrate his life and the contributions he made to the Bradford community.

The FD will be doing their Chicken BBQ again this year. We are planning to hold the BBQ later in the day so as you come down for the fireworks, you can pick up your chicken dinner and eat it with your family and friends when you are waiting for dusk and the fireworks to start. We will be selling tickets for the BBQ. There may be some meals that will be available without tickets.

Blood Drive: There will be a Red Cross Blood drive in September. Stay tuned for future Bridge articles to find the specific date and times.

On June 11, as required by the lease agreement, Vail Resort will present their Annual Operating Plan to the Mount Sunapee Advisory Commission. The meeting will take place at the Newbury Town Offices (937 Route 103 Newbury, NH 03255) at 9:30am. The meeting is open to the public.

The current leaseholder, Vail Resort, is seeking to expand the parking capacity within the leased area. Friends of Mount Sunapee is opposed to this expansion.

The proposed project does not meet the criteria set forth in the 1998 lease agreement. The project calls for the removal of five and a half acres of forest and the elimination of seven thousand square feet of wetlands. This includes most of the forested area on both sides of the upper part of the main access road. Where trees once stood park visitors will be greeted by a sea of gravel and blacktop. This will permanently degrade the quality of the Sunapee State Park visitor experience.

The leaseholder is required to uphold all of the conditions set forth in the lease agreement. Among these conditions are the requirements to 'preserve and protect' and maintain the 'scenic and aesthetic qualities' of the leased area. Clearly the drafters of the lease recognized that the State Park is a special place whose unique beauty should be protected.

The proposed parking lot expansion constitutes a major irreversible change to Mount Sunapee State Park. For that reason alone it must be in compliance with the lease requirements which demand that the leased area of the park be maintained to the highest environmental and aesthetic standards. The people of New Hampshire deserve nothing less.

Climate Action through Victory Gardens

In WWII, Victory Gardens were started at homes throughout the US to produce food at a time of scarcity, to boost morale, to build community, and reduce the demand on resources needed for the war. In the 1940's, everyone played their part to fight the war. Today we have a different kind of crisis on our doorstep, which is climate change and environmental devastation caused by human activity. How can we all do our part against something that feels at once so enormous and so conceptual? Growing Victory Gardens today is a way to take climate action for many of the reasons folks did so back during WWII.

Growing our own gardens, no matter how small, not only provides us with fresh, nutritious produce, but it can also reduce food mileage, food waste, and our reliance on the global industrial food system. Home gardens have the power to sequester carbon, promote biodiversity, and conserve water. And perhaps most importantly, gardening reminds us of our

dependence on the Earth and our dependence on one another, on our community.

Gardening creates a level of self-sufficiency, but it is, at its root, a practice in community building and a reflection of our interdependence. Kearsarge Food Hub is grateful to be a part of two gardening programs, the Abenaki Seeds Project and Tray it Forward, that help plant 450 home gardens in the Kearsarge / Lake Sunapee region. In their 4th and 5th years respectively, these projects have sent hundreds of seeds and thousands of seedlings out into the community. Let the growing begin!

Book Review of The Film Club

by David Gilmour: I found this gem of a book while weeding our memoir/biography section. The title alone was attractive as I love films, but the idea of a father and son watching movies and talking about them sold me. David Gilmour is a novelist and film critic; he's watched thousands of movies and interviewed many television and movie stars. His memoir takes place during a more difficult time in his life when he was between jobs, underemployed, and searching for his next opportunity. At the same time, his 15yr old son, Jesse, was skipping school regularly and failing in most of his classes. His son wanted to drop out, and David knew he couldn't force his 6'3" son to do homework, so he made him a deal. Jesse could drop out of school for the next year, sleep in until whatever hour he wanted, not get a job, if he watched three movies a week of David's choice and then discussed them. David's thought was that this would be a type of education, albeit informal, and it would allow the two to connect on a topic together.

David knew he was taking a big chance, that perhaps Jesse wouldn't return to school, or would find some menial job that he would stay in for too long, and he would remain in the family's basement and David would forever lament his decision. David also knew that Jesse was intellectually curious, and that perhaps, movie watching would entice other interests. Movies inspire conversation,

they broaden perspective, they teach history, they immerse you in a time and place and allow you to lose yourself within them for several hours. When you watch a good movie, it stays with you, it changes you. One of the biggest pleasures of reading this book was to read about the types of films David chose and the conversations that followed. "We talked about the sixties, the Beatles (too often but he indulged me), drinking badly, drinking well, then some more about Rebecca ("Do you think she'll dump me"), Adolf Hitler, Dachau, Richard Nixon, infidelity, Truman Capote, the Mojave Desert, Suge Knight, lesbians, cocaine, heroin chic, the Backstreet Boys (my idea), tattoos, Johnny Carson, Tupac (his idea), sarcasm, weight lifting, French actors, and e.e. cummings."

I struggle in my relationship with my son, now, who is 14 years old. He is a bright, funny, interesting boy who now prefers to stay in his dark bedroom, coming out to have meals, and then retreating back. Our relationship feels more tense and less affectionate, and I yearn for a deeper connection. He is a teenager and I know it is natural for him to be finding his way towards independence. We talked recently about his grades, and what they mean for college, and he said to me, quite confidently, "Who says I'm going to college." Sometimes books find your way into your heart at just the right time.

Jesse Gilmour is a successful adult who is filming his first documentary about the effects of prison on the male psyche and is writing his first novel. He also has a podcast called, The Gilmour Podcast.

David and Jesse watched 111 movies during their film club and here is a list of a few of them.

Absolute Power, Basic Instinct, Bicycle Thieves, The Big Sleep, High Noon, Chinatown, The Dead Zone, Dr. No, Fast Times at Ridgemont High, Full Metal Jacket, Giant, Internal Affairs, Jungle Fever, Last Tango in Paris, Manhattan, Mommie Dearest, Plenty, Psycho, RoboCop, Roman Holiday, Scarface, The Stepfather, Thief, Tootsie, Unforgiven, and Who's Afraid of Virginia Wolf.

Helen L. (Bagley) Lynam, 98, of West Road, died at Granite **CRVNA** Hospice House in Concord on April 29, 2024.

She was born in Bradford, NH, on May 16, 1925, the daughter of Horace F. and Lena L. (Heselton) Bagley.

Helen spent her early years in Bradford and later met her future husband, George H. Lynam. They married and moved to Massachusetts where she worked in a New Bedford, MA, factory making men's suits. She moved back to Bradford in 1985 to care for her mother.

She was an incredible seamstress making all of the clothing for her children, quilting and using up every piece of scrap material around. Sewing them into potholders, table runners, wall hangings and so much more. She had several sewing machines and used them all well into her 98th year. Often she would make things by hand. She was generous with the finished products and might give someone something after coming for a visit.

Helen was a member of the East Washington Baptist Church and was the holder of the Boston Post Cane for being the oldest resident in Bradford. She was a former member of the Grange and Rebekahs.

She was predeceased by her parents, her husband, two sons, Gordon and Gary, a granddaughter, Lisa, and all of her siblings. Helen is survived by three daughters, Gloria Cynar of Fairhaven, MA, Judith Yeary of Gulf Breeze, FL and Debra Charpentier of Bradford, NH; daughter-in-law, Pam Lynam of Bourne, MA; nine grandchildren; many great grandchildren and nieces and nephews.. Legislative Update

Representative Tony Caplan

The current biennium is rounding the final curve with results showing the Democratic caucus' hard work in the minority. Democrats in the House have defended the party's priorities of managing the economy to benefit working families, protect our rights as Americans and protect the environment for future generations. Now it's up to us to get the word out on how those results translate into improvements in our towns and the state as a whole.

In my own work this session, I am proud to have been the prime sponsor of HB 1431 that sailed through the chamber in a unanimous voice vote, passed the Senate with minor modifications, and seems destined for the Governor's desk once we concur with the Senate version. HB 1431 establishes the need for our electric utilities to engage in a public process of proposing 10 year plans every 5 years that take into account expected electricity demand along with all the benefits of including all possible energy efficiency projects, added renewable resources, grid modernization and other ways to reduce the need for building out physical infrastructure. This plan will also save money, and spare our children from the worst effects of climate change. Working in a bipartisan fashion with the Republican head of my committee, Rep. Michael Vose, to get this across the line has been an education in political wrangling. I hope that Gov. Sununu will want this as his legacy and put his name to it.

We are at the stage of the session where we are now voting on Senate bills and they are voting on our bills, and this is known as silly season. The results can be revealing and may give voters a clue on who is taking care of business and who is letting the Concord crazy get to them. What jumps out to me is the way Democratic priorities have become the focus of bipartisan bills, which shows we are winning the larger argument. For instance, yesterday's session saw Rep. Kelly Potenza, R, defending the House's bill to place a moratorium on new landfill siting, which had been killed in the Senate, by adding it back on to a Senate bill for disability pensions for victims of violence. It was a success. Senators take note: the people care about the environment again. Another big example – Rep. Terry Roy, R, defending the House bill, which had been killed in the Senate, to add gun restrictions on people adjudicated as mentally ill, by adding it back onto a bill for a new state prison. It was a huge bipartisan success, although it sparked a literal floor fight as Roy was accosted and chewed out by a spitting mad fellow GOP rep.

But by continuing to vote down common sense measures yesterday such as SB 456 to expand rural health care and SB 217 to incentivize educators in underserved areas of the State, Republican representatives showed they are more than willing to let ideology stand in the way of progress for real people.

the contractor and consider purchasing a mower at another time.

Brown Shattuck Devin Pendleton shared a bid to remove a dead tree at Brown Shattuck. Before moving forward, the Board requested that the property line be verified to determine ownership. The Board also asked for additional bids for taking down the tree.

Unanticipated Revenue The Board approved a motion to accept \$265.32 in unanticipated revenue per RSA 31:95-b from the State of NH as reimbursement from the Highway Safety Grant #24-002.

Intent to Cut signed for Map 4 Lot 15.

ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

Special Exception A public hearing was held on May 1, 2024 for the application for a special exception by Beata Bzura, Map 11, Lots 14 and 18. The applicant proposes a project to build a seasonal wellness camp for 20 adults in two phases. Phase one will span three years with phase two starting in year four. Opponents of the camp stated that they are concerned about increased traffic in an area zoned for rural residential and already poor road conditions on Massasecum Avenue. In a 3-1 vote, with Nathaniel Bruss voting Nay emphasizing that this is a property on a class VI road, the board approved the application for a special exception with the following conditions: 1- All state and local require-

ments must be met for septic, water quality and stream crossing. 2- All requirements of the Bradford Fire Chief and NH Fire Marshall must be met. 3- This is approval only for a wellness retreat as presented to the Board on May 1, 2024. Any change in use or expansion would require

another application. 4- This approval is for five cabins holding a total of 10 people in phase one, and ten cabins holding a total of 20 people total in phase two. Phase one cabins will no longer be in use during phase two.

PLANNING BOARD

408 Fairgrounds Road The Board approved a motion for a subdivision and lot line adjustment of Map 5 Lots 12 and 114 for applicants Kathie and Roy Joseph Messer of 408 Fairgrounds Road.

Condos Peter Weeks of J.E. Belanger of Dunbarton appeared to discuss the conversion of Fisherfield Apartments on West Main from rental property to condominiums. The proposed plan is to convert 32 rental units to 32 condominiums. Property consists of three lots. Consensus of the Board is that a site plan will be necessary.

CONSERVATION COMMISSION

Culverts Ben Nugent of NH Fish & Game and Greg Swick of Trout Unlimited were present to report on their efforts to

obtain culvert replacement grants through the BRIC (Building Resilient Infrastructure for Communities) program. Four culverts in Bradford have been identified as in serious need of replacement: on Deer Valley Rd., Davis Rd., West Rd. and West Main St. Ben is trying to put together a package that would include other towns including Newbury. He is looking for other partners to support the grant request.

Fundraiser Over 30 items have been donated for an auction or raffle fundraiser to support the Summer Camp Scholarship Program. The BCC will have a booth at the Bradford Independence Day Celebration on Saturday, June 29, 2024 to display items and publicize the scholarship program.

Adopt a Road Doug Southard reported on the Adopt a Road Program for monitoring Class VI roads. It was noted that although the Selectboard and Road Agent have been kept abreast of the program, it is not widely known about in town. It was proposed to reach out to the Fire Chief and others, and to GIS map road conditions and problem areas.

Turtle Crossing Signage has been procured and is in place. Total cost for signs was \$108.


